THE COLLEGE

The College of Education at Cortland, New York is situated midway between Binghamton and Syracuse in the center of New York State. The college itself is built on a beautiful hilltop, about 1200 feet above sea level overlooking the seven valleys which converge in this city of some 18,000 inhabitants.

As an institution for education of teachers, the College of Education at Cortland has a long history. It was founded in 1863 as a State Normal and Training School, giving a two-year course to prospective teachers. When the original building burned in 1919, it was replaced by the present main building located on the hill in 1923. At that time the course was lengthened to three years and the specialized physical education course was established.

In 1941, the state legislature and the Board of Regents made Cortland a college, giving it four year courses leading to a Bachelor's degree. Six years later in 1947, the college was authorized to begin graduate instruction leading to a master's degree.

1948, saw the college made a part of the new State University of New York. Since that time the enrollment has steadily increased to it's present enrollment of 2250 students who come from every county in the State.

The College campus consists of over one hundred acres. In addition to the Main Building there is a temporary gymnasium annex and classroom annex. To the east of the main building are the two residence halls. Between these two buildings is the Student Union Building, Brockway Hall, named in honor of George A. Brockway, who contributed substantially to its erection. Here much of the social life is centered. The new Health and Physical Education Building was dedicated in 1953 and features the latest in gymnasias, swimming pool and classrooms. Two new dormitories have just been put into use and two more will be completed by the end of the first semester. A new student social center will go into use at the same time also. A library building has been started and plans are under way for the construction of an education building, a campus school and a science building. All this is part of a ten million dollar expansion program.

The new athletic facilities have been completed. The baseball diamond and track were dedicated last Spring. The football field and soccer field will be used for the first time during the Fall of 1959 with the lacrosse field being put into use the following spring.

In 1948, Mr. Archer M. Huntington donated his camp located on Raquette Lake in the Adirondack Mountains, as a memorial to his father, the late Collis P. Huntington, a railroad builder, financier and philanthropist, who attained national fame during the nineteenth century. The camp is comprised of over 200 acres of timber land, embracing three and a half miles of shore ~~line~~ and having a group of eighteen buildings.

MEET THE VARSITY BASEBALL COACH

Bob Wallace, a Cortland State graduate, took over the baseball coaching job in 1958 and posted a respectable 10-4 record. Last spring his team compiled an impressive 11-2 slate. Wallace is a 1953 graduate of Cortland and before joining the staff of his alma mater he taught physical education at Painted Post High School and coached football, basketball, wrestling and track. His football team was a co-champion twice. He came to the Cortland staff in 1956 as backfield coach, a post he still holds. He also coached junior varsity and varsity basketball at Cortland. During his three years as a varsity athlete at Cortland he played quarterback on the football team.

1960 VARSITY BASEBALL OUTLOOK

Wallace has lost six of his starting eight fielders from the 1959 team which in small college circles ranked eighth in the country in hitting and had the second best record in the East among independents. All of the first-string infield, two outfielders, plus three pitchers are among those who have graduated. The team's leading hitter, shortstop Tom Major, who batted .474 and was 18th in the country, was among the group who have departed. Although Wallace expects his hitting will not be as strong as last year, he feels the fielding should be as good. The pitching will depend a lot on how soon Chris Sweeney (4-1) can regain last year's form. He is bothered by a sore elbow and has been taking it slow in practice. Eliot Leibowitz (3-0) may have to carry the bulk of the pitching along with southpaw Tom Lattimer, who made a brief appearance last season.

MEET THE JUNIOR VARSITY BASEBALL COACH

Francis J. (Fran) Woods starts his third season as coach of the junior varsity baseball team. A native of Cortland, Fran graduated from St. Mary's High School where he competed in basketball and football and then he received his degree from Cortland State where he played football and baseball. His first coaching job was at Utica Free Academy where he taught physical education and coached football, basketball and track. He produced a league champion in basketball and also the Section III relay champion in track. A member of the Cortland staff since 1957 he has served as backfield coach for the jayvee football team and as junior varsity soccer coach.

1960 JUNIOR VARSITY BASEBALL OUTLOOK

After four weeks of indoor practice Woods believes his team looks stronger than the 1959 group in hitting, fielding and pitching. He has seven pitchers, four of them freshmen and three sophomores. This year's team will carry only freshmen and sophomores. Four of the pitchers, Paul Fardy, Jim Spadinger, Terry O'Brian and Dave Foster appear to be the strongest members of the staff, with Paul Limmer, Joe Mayer and Dave Payne showing promise. Basing his judgment on the use of the pitching machine and the batting tee, Woods thinks the hitting will be stronger. Indoor drills also indicate that defensively the team should be sound. He hopes the team can work outside before Easter.

MEET THE VARSITY TENNIS COACH

Barney Williams brings an impressive background to his assignment as the tennis coach. He has been a tennis coach for ten years and also a tennis professional for 12 years. During the summer for the past six years he has been the tennis professional at the Waccabuck Country Club at Waccabuck in Westchester county. He has been playing tennis since his high school days. After his graduation from West Chester State Teachers College he coached at Stevens Institute in New Jersey and then at Park College in Missouri before joining the staff at Cortland. In addition to tennis, he also coaches freshman basketball. Since 1953 he has been a member of the United States Professional Lawn Tennis Association.

1960 VARSITY TENNIS OUTLOOK

Williams still has his No. 1 singles and doubles player, Henry Veix, but he has lost the second, third and sixth singles players, Tom Condon, John Nyilis and Harold Long. The loss of this trio not only hurts the singles, but also will be felt in doubles competition where all three were strong. Larry Siegel, No. 4 in singles and No. 2 in doubles has returned. Charles Marshall, No. 5 in singles and No. 3 in doubles also is back. Dick Fern, who saw action in doubles last season, also is on hand. Gene Eddy, Jim Henneberg and Stuart Pitcher also were on last year's squad. Among the promising newcomers are Pete Katz, Neil Seiden and Julius Gundersheim. The latter missed action last year because of an injury.

MEET THE TRACK COACH

Dave Miller is one of the veterans of the Cortland coaching staff, coming here in 1948. He has been a versatile member of the coaching fraternity, having coached teams in football, soccer, cross country and wrestling, in addition to track and field. He coached track his first five years here then was absent from the cinder sport for five years, two of them for graduate study. He returned to the track assignment last year and found a "rebuilding" job on his hands. He is also currently the wrestling coach. After graduation from Cortland State, he coached at Phelps Central and, after four years of military service, coached at Sherburne where his football and basketball teams were league champions.

1960 TRACK OUTLOOK

This year will be the second in the current "rebuilding" process. Miller hopes for an improvement over the results of 1959 and if some of last year's promising freshmen continue to develop, these hopes could be realized. Craig Chilton, Gary Fish, Steve Goodwin, George Schatzle, Howard Wells and Bill Yelverton were all good frosh prospects last season.. Veterans like Tom Chapman, Lou Currie, Larry Perkins and Gary Thompson are also on hand for another season. One of the promising newcomers is Harry Schwarze, who appears to be a strong contender in the shotput with tosses of 45 feet or more. Eight other newcomers also have indicated they may be welcome additions to the roster. One sour note among the good ones is the news that high-jumper Lynn Hemink is hobbled with a bad ankle.

MEET THE VARSITY LACROSSE COACH

Bill Tomik is starting his third year as the lacrosse coach and he has not had a losing season in his two previous campaigns. His squad posted a 4-2-1 record in 1958 and a 4-4 mark in 1959. An experienced mentor he has taught and coached on the junior and senior high school and college levels in soccer, football, wrestling, swimming, track, golf and lacrosse. He is also the gymnastics coach here. He coached at Hamilton College for three years and then produced championship golf and swimming teams at Hamburg. He competed in track and gymnastics and played football at North High in Binghamton and was an honor graduate of Cortland State where he played soccer and was on the gymnastics team.

1960 VARSITY LACROSSE OUTLOOK

The 1960 squad will be without 11 lettermen from last season's team. Included in this group of veterans are the entire mid-field, three of the four starting attackmen and the goalie, Tony Bromante, an All-America honorable mention. Tomik will have nine returning lettermen from the 1959 squad plus some promising players from last year's junior varsity team. The returning veterans and those from the jayvee will probably make this year's team the most experienced squad in Cortland history. A pre-season appraisal without benefit of outdoor practice, would indicate that Cortland will be strongest defensively with the scoring potential a question mark at this stage. The goal vacancy will be a hard one to fill in the same capacity as last year.
