THE COLLEGE

The State University College at Cortland, New York, is located midway between Binghamton and Syracuse on U. S. Route 11, in the center of the state. The college campus is located on a beautiful hilltop, about 1,200 feet above sea level overlooking the seven valleys which converge in this city of some 20,000 residents.

Its main campus of approximately 175 acres and more than 30 buildings includes eight new residence halls, two college unions, two dining halls, a campus school with kindergarten through ninth grade, an education building, field house, and a science building.

The college also owns Huntington Memorial Camp on Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks. The camp includes more than 400 acres of forest land and sandy beaches, plus 18 buildings which are used by the college in its physical education and recreation education programs and also by the campus school as an out-of-door classroom.

The Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building is considered one of the most modern and functional buildings of its kind in the country. Athletic facilities, both indoors and out, are provided for Cortland's twelve varsity sports teams--football, soccer, cross-country, basketball, wrestling, swimming, gymnastics, baseball, track, lacrosse and tennis. The college also has a varsity golf team which plays at the local Country Club.

The James M. McDonald Building also is an important part of the campus, providing facilities for a student infirmary.

Newest additions to the campus are an education-campus school building, a library, a science building and a 175-bed dormitory. Plans are now under way for a new fine arts center, a lecture hall center and another science building and a new classroom-office building, plus additional dormitories for 800 beds and a dining hall center of 500 seats--to be constructed before 1967.

A field house, completed in the spring of 1962, is 330 feet long, 130 feet wide and has an arched roof. Eventually, Cortland will build permanent stands where the temporary stands are now located, in the area between the track and the new field house.

Cortland's enrollment of 3,000 students, which is expected to increase to 3,800 in the future, comes from every county in the state. The students are prepared to teach in the areas of elementary education, high school English, social studies, mathematics and science, physical education, health education and recreation education. Freshmen will be accepted in the new liberal arts program in 1965. A summer session, extension programs and the graduate division are also a part of the academic program.

The college was established in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School by the state legislature. The original building was located at the site of the present Cortland County Courthouse. It burned in 1919 and the college opened its present main building in 1923. Cortland became a four-year college in 1941, added a graduate program in 1947 and became a part of the State University of New York in 1948.

THE 1964 FOOTBALL COACHING STAFF

ROGER I. ROBINSON is in his second year as head coach at Cortland. Undertaking his first year in 1963, the Red Dragons compiled a 4-3 record.

Robinson came to Cortland after six years as Harvard University's defensive backfield coach. In addition to his football duties, he coached the freshman track team.

A native of Endicott, New York, he competed in football, basketball and track at Union-Endicott High School before enrolling at Syracuse University where he also played football. After time out for World War II, he returned to college and was one of the East's outstanding backs in the 1946 East-West Shrine game.

Robinson's first coaching assignment was as assistant backfield coach at Rochester. He served two years (1948-1950) as line coach for Andy Kerr at Lebanon Valley (Pa.) College. From 1951 to 1956 he was head coach of football and track at Port Jervis, New York High School. He moved from there to Harvard.

ROBERT J. WEBER line coach, starts his 13th season directing the Red Dragon forward wall. A graduate of the University of Iowa in 1947, he coached football in high schools at Washington, Iowa and at Iowa City, Iowa. His last two years of public school coaching were particularly successful as his teams lost only one game and captured the conference championship. After completing work on his doctorate at Iowa, Weber joined the physical education department in 1952. In addition to football, he has coached golf and basketball. His football playing experience includes the University of Iowa, plus two years with service teams at Fort Benning, Georgia and in Germany. In addition to coaching and teaching duties, Weber also serves as the Director of Athletics, a post he has held for the past eight years.

ROBERT WALLACE backfield coach, played four years of varsity competition under coach "Chugger" Davis and proved to be one of Cortland's outstanding quarterbacks. A 1953 graduate of Cortland he joined the staff of his Alma Mater in 1956 and was assigned to the backfield coaching duties, a post he has held since then. Before coming to Cortland, Wallace was in the physical education department at Painted Post High School and coached its football team to two co-championships.

Wallace coached the varsity basketball team here for one season during the absence of head coach Pete Corey. In 1958 he took over the varsity baseball assignment, fielding strong teams in each of the past five seasons.

LARRY MARTIN freshman coach, is a native of Cortland and a graduate of Cortland College. Like Robinson, Martin is starting his second year as coach. He came to Cortland after serving ten years in the North Country--two years at Gouverneur, four years at Massena High, and four years at Canton Central where he was director of athletics and coached the varsity football and basketball teams. He also has his master's degree from Cortland.

ARTHUR J. RIEDEL joined the coaching staff in 1962 as the assistant freshman coach. A Cortland graduate, he played football and basketball here and since 1956 has been a physical education teacher and coach at Baldwinsville in the elementary and junior high school. Riedel, who also holds a master's degree from Cortland, is an Admissions Counsellor.

AL PISANO assistant line coach, has joined the Red Dragons this year. A graduate of Cortland, Pisano has coached football and lacrosse at Berner High School on Long Island. He received his master's from Penn State. While at Penn State, he coached the freshman lacrosse team. In addition to his coaching chores here, Pisano is on the physical education staff.

HARRY BELLARDINI assistant backfield coach. Like Pisano, Bellardini is new to the coaching staff this year. Bellardini did his undergraduate and graduate work at Cortland. Before coming to Cortland he was on the staff at Corning High School, where he coached football, wrestling and track. Bellardini is on the physical education staff of Cortland Colleg's Campus School.

VARSIITY FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

Head Coach, ROGER I. ROBINSON, starting his second year will not boast nor cry in predicting the 1964 season. He does state however, that he is depending on the talented sophomores for added depth. He feels that he will need the depth to meet the strong competition this coming year.

The passing game should be much improved over last year mainly due to the fact of the fine offensive end work and pin-point passing by quarterbacks Tom LaPuma and Dick Speckman.

Players to watch this coming season are senior halfback Paul Duda from Watertown. Duda, regarded as one of the best backs Robinson has coached is a "triple-threat" in his running, passing and punting game. Tom Sharp, Tom Nugent and LaPuma also received praise from Robinson.

Led by Captain and center Tim Sullivan, the line has experience and better over-all knowledge of the offense and defense.

Jim Okesson, John Schworm, Toby Hargroave and Ray Ruckdeschel are all expected to see action at the end position.

Bob Knapp, Pet Vartuli, Doug Parsons, Gene Gnida are locking well at tackle and guard positions respectively.

The nine game schedule, the first in the history of Cortland, will find the Red Dragons at home five times while on the road four times.

MEET THE VARSITY SOCCER COACH

T. FRED HOLLOWAY one of the veterans of the Cortland Coaching Staff, has been a member of the Physical Education Department since 1936. He celebrated his 27th season as the varsity soccer coach last year and made it successful one by guiding his team to a 9-1-1 record. Holloway earned his bachelor and master's degrees from Springfield College and his doctorate from New York University. He coached at Springfield, Pittsburgh and the Foxwood School before coming to Cortland. He has coached in most sports and while in college competed in cross-country, gymnastics and soccer.

MEET THE FRESHMAN SOCCER COACH

FRANCIS WOODS is a native of Cortland. He was graduated from St. Mary's High School where he competed in basketball and football. He is also a graduate of Cortland and while here played football and baseball. After graduation he joined the staff at Utica Free Academy where he taught physical education and coached football, basketball and track. He directed his basketball team to a league championship and his track team to a sectional championship in the relay. A member of his Alma Mater's staff since 1957, he has also served as backfield coach of the jayvee football team and as the freshman baseball coach, a post he still holds, along with the freshman soccer team.
