THE COLLEGE

The State University College at Cortland, New York, is located midway between Binghamton and Syracuse on U.S. Route 11, in the center of the state. The college campus is located on a beautiful hilltop, about 1,200 feet above sea level overlooking the seven valleys which converge in this city of some 20,000 residents.

Its main campus of approximately 175 acres and more than 30 buildings includes eight new residence halls, two college unions, two dining halls, a campus school with kindergarten through ninth grade, an education building, field house, and a science building.

The college also owns Huntington Memorial Camp on Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks. The camp includes more than 400 acres of forest land and sandy beaches, plus 18 buildings which are used by the college in its physical education and recreation education programs and also by the campus school as an out-of-door classroom.

The Health, Physical Education and Recreation Building, is considered one of the most modern and functional buildings of its kind in the country. Athletic facilities, both indoors and out, are provided for Cortland's twelve varsity sports teams—football, soccer, cross-country, basketball, wrestling, swimming, gymnastics, baseball, track, lacrosse and tennis. The college also has a varsity golf team which plays at the local Country Club.

The James M. McDonald Building also is an important part of the campus, providing facilities for a student infirmary.

Newest additions to the campus are an education-campus school building, a library, a science building and a 175-bed dormitory. Construction is now under way for a new fine arts center, a lecture hall center and another science building and a new classroom-office building, plus additional dormitories for 800 beds and a dining center of 500 seats—to be constructed before 1967.

A field house, completed in the spring of 1962, is 330 feet long, 130 feet wide and has an arched roof. Eventually, Cortland will build permanent stands where the temporary stands are now located, in the area between the track and the new field house.

Cortland's enrollment of 3,200 students, which is expected to increase to 3,800 in the future, comes from every county in the state. The students are prepared to teach in the areas of elementary education, high school english, social studies, mathematics and science, physical education, health education and recreation education. Freshmen have been accepted in the new liberal arts program this fall. A summer session, extension programs and the graduate division are also a part of the academic program.

The college was established in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School by the state legislature. The original building was located at the site of the present Cortland County Courthouse. It burned in 1919 and the college opened its present main building in 1923. Cortland became a four-year college in 1941, added a graduate program in 1947 and became a part of the State University of New York in 1948.

MEET THE VARSITY BASEBALL COACH:

Robert Wallace has yet to post a losing season since he took over the baseball coaching assignment in the spring of 1958 from veteran coach Carl (Chugger) Davis. His first season the record was 10-4, then in 1959 the squad was impressive with an 11-2 mark, fell to a 7-4-1 in 1960, 9-3 in 1961, posted a 10-6 record in 1962, 8-5 in 1963, 15-2 in 1964, and finally a 14-5 in 1965.

Wallace was a Cortland graduate and played three years on the varsity football team as quarterback. He taught physical education at Painted Post High School and coached football, wrestling, and track. His football team was co-champion twice.

He came to Cortland in 1956 as backfield coach under Davis. He has also coached the freshmen and varsity basketball teams. In addition to his teaching and coaching duties, Wallace is assigned to screening candidates for Cortland's physical education program.

MEET THE FRESHMAN BASEBALL COACH:

Francis J. (Fran) Woods, is now in his ninth season as coach of the freshman baseball squad. A native of Cortland, Fran attended St. Mary's High School where he participated in basketball and football. He is also a graduate of Cortland and competed in football and baseball while a student on the hill. His first coaching position was at Utica Free Academy where he taught physical education and coached the football, basketball and track teams. One of his basketball teams won the league championship and one of his relay teams captured the Section III Championship in track.

A member of the Cortland faculty since 1957, Woods served as backfield coach for the junior varsity football team and as coach of the freshman soccer team, in addition to his baseball assignment.

1966 VARSITY BASEBALL OUTLOOK

In a pre-season interview with head coach Robert Wallace, he pointed out that the Red Dragons are an inexperienced club. Of the 26 athletes trying for positions, only 5 are seniors while 9 are juniors and 12 are sophomores.

Coach Wallace has observed two problems of great concern since the team began workouts March 1. They are the effectiveness of the pitching staff and a replacement for State University of New York Athletic Conference all-star catcher Dick Cameron. Dick was graduated in 1965 and is presently at Penn State working on his master's degree.

In the pitching department, Coach Wallace has lost Al Garod, Bill Johst and Paul Duda—all through graduation. The pitching duties in 1966 will rest with junior Rick Page of Clinton, Ken McClenathan, a junior from Auburn, and Elwood "Woody" Osterhoudt, a senior from New Paltz. Two sophomores who show early season promise are Al Greenberg of Brooklyn and Robert Yarris of West Islip.

Senior Marty Minter of Jamaica, who was the leading hitter in 1965 with a .450 average, will be back at short-stop. SUNYAC all-conference selection Joe Mushock of Vestal will be returning to left field.

Coach Wallace, starting his ninth year at the helm, guided his 1965 team to a 14-5 record. In addition to the regular schedule, the Red Dragons will play five exhibition games in the New York City area during the week of April 10. The five games are with Adelphi, Fordham, New York University, Suffolk Community College, and Fairleigh Dickinson.

The freshman team, coached by Fran Woods, open a 10 game baseball schedule on April 23 when Cornell invades the "Crown City" for a 2 p.m. game. Last year, the freshman nine compiled a 10-2 won-lost record.

1966 VARSITY LACROSSE OUTLOOK

Head lacrosse coach Al Pisano views the 1966 season as a rebuilding year as he faces the toughest lacrosse schedule in the history of the school with an inexperienced team.

Only two seniors saw a great deal of action last year. They are captain-midfielder Tom LaPuma of Frankfort, and midfielder Mike Messere of Syracuse.

The majority of the 1966 team is comprised of juniors. Expected to see action are: midfielders Dick Speckmann from Oceanside; Al Rhines of Watertown; Al Tepper from Brooklyn; and George Revis of Ludlow, Vermont. Other juniors include: attackmen Dick Felser of Lake Ronkonkoma, Paul Rose from Baldwinsville, and goalie Terry Grace from Levittown.

Since practice began on March 1, coach Pisano has been observing some highly talented sophomores. Attackmen Bill Wallace of Watertown, Dick Rowcroft of Roosevelt, Harry Blank of Baldwin, and Drew Snyder of Camillus are bright spots in the season outlook for coach Pisano.

Cortland, 1965 tri-champs of the William Kelso Morrill Division of the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association, finished the season with a 5-4 record. They tied for the championship with Union College and R.P.I.

MEET THE TRACK COACH

The highly versatile Dave Miller moves into his seventeenth year on the Cortland faculty and coaching staffs. In his coaching career, Coach Miller has exhibited his talents as coach of the wrestling, football, soccer, cross country and track teams.

In addition to his track chores, Dave is also head coach of the varsity wrestling team.

This past winter, Miller guided his wrestling team to their fourth State Championship in six years.

A Cortland graduate, Coach Miller returned to the "hill" as a coach in 1948 after coaching football, basketball, and wrestling in the Sherburne school system.

1966 VARSITY TRACK OUTLOOK

The varsity track season will open April 29 when the Red Dragons invade the University of Buffalo for a 3:30 p.m. contest. In an interview with head coach Dave Miller, he described the 1966 season as a rebuilding one.

The 100, 220 and 440 yard sprints look to be the weak events for the year. Bob LaCour, a junior from Floral Park is the only experienced runner. Sophomore Steve Carlson of Olean is showing early season promise in this event.

Five athletes capable of breaking 50 seconds in the 440 yard sprint are: sophomores Bill Michaelis of Woodside and John Repsher of Poughkeepsie. Junior Roger Lattimer of Goshen is the only hold over in this event. Seniors Jack Jones of Groton and Bob Gregor of New Hyde Park are additions to the 440 yard sprint to add depth.

Providing the nucleus in the distance events will be juniors Dennis Fries of Arcade and Bob Fitts of Mamaroneck along with Gregor and Jones.

On paper, the broad jump looks to be the strongest event. Juniors Tom Rogan of Poughkeepsie and Terry Gaskill of Uniondale along with senior Pete Warner of Oyster Bay will provide the opposition.

In other field events, athletes trying for positions include: Bob Cameron of Fort Edward, Jim Anzalone of Hamburg, Doug Pens of Cortland, Charles Okraski of Utica, Louis Hall of Southfields, and Stan Kozenewski of Ilion.

MEET THE TENNIS COACH

Alan Stockholm, a new addition to the staff at Cortland, will assume the duties of varsity tennis coach while R.H. (Barney) Williams is on sabbatical. A graduate of East Stroudsburg State College, Al received his master's degree from the University of Maryland. While at East Stroudsburg, he played three years of varsity basketball.

Before coming to Cortland he taught one year at the University of Maryland on an assistantship. He was athletic director at Allegany Community College in Cumberland, Maryland for three years.

A native of Montrose, Pennsylvania, Al is married and the father of three children.

1966 VARSITY TENNIS OUTLOOK

A new coach and new tennis courts make the athletes look at the 1966 season with a good deal of optimism.

In the early season seedings, the first five places are clearly defined.

Dick Gordon, a senior from New York City, has nailed down the top position. Paul Reinhardt, a sophomore from Troy has second position. The next three positions are still a question.
