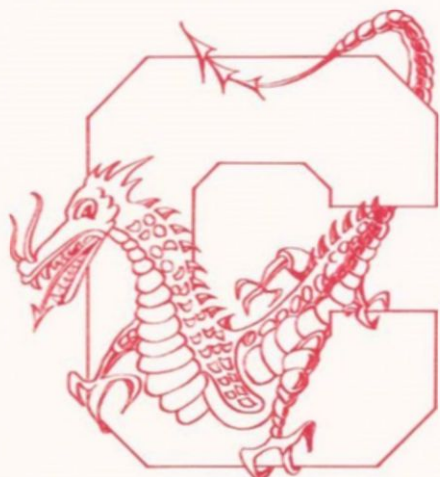

FOOTBALL

COACHES

Varsity: Roger Robinson is in his seventh year as head football coach with a six year record of 35 victories and 15 defeats. He has never had a losing season at Cortland. Coach Robinson came to Cortland in 1963 as head football coach and associate professor of physical education. He received his B.S. and M.A. degrees in physical education from Syracuse University. Prior to coming to Cortland, Robinson spent six years at Harvard University as backfield coach and freshman track coach. His first coaching assignment was as assistant backfield coach at the University of Rochester. He also served two years as line coach for Andy Kerr at Lebanon Valley (Pa.) College. From 1951 to 1956 he was head coach of football and track at Port Jervis High School. He moved from there to Harvard.

Larry Martin is returning to Cortland after a two year absence while he completed work on his doctorate at Springfield College. A native of Cortland, Martin received bachelor's and master's degrees from the College at Cortland. After graduation he spent ten years in the North Country - two years at Gouverneur, four years at Massena High, and four years at Canton Central where he was director of athletics and coached the varsity football and basketball teams. He returned to Cortland in 1963 and coached the freshman football team for two years before moving up to the varsity as line coach.

John Emmer is beginning his first coaching assignment at Cortland. A 1967 graduate of Rutgers, Emmer was a standout athlete there and was captain of both the football and lacrosse teams. Jack set every major pass receiving record at Rutgers before graduating including most passes caught and most yards gained receiving in a single game, season and career. The Mineola native had a tryout with the New York Jets after graduation and was one of the last players cut from the squad. He then played as a flanker-back for the Long Island Bulls. Prior to accepting his present position at Cortland, Jack taught for one year at Levittown Division High and one year at East Meadow High. In addition to his football coaching duties at the College, Emmer will be an instructor in the Physical Education Department and head lacrosse coach.

Freshmen: Andy Grieve came to Cortland in 1965 and assumed the duties of freshman football coach. A graduate of N.Y.U. and Ithaca College, he spent seventeen years in the high school ranks coaching and teaching in both New York and Pennsylvania schools. In his last position, Grieve was director of health, physical education and recreation at Sherburne, where he was head football and basketball coach for nine years. Andy also is coach of the freshman basketball team and an assistant professor of physical education.

Vince Gonino, freshman line coach, is a native of Watertown, N.Y., where he participated in wrestling, football and track in high school. He graduated from Ohio State University where he was a standout wrestler, winning two Ohio AAU championships and capturing two awards in Big Ten Championships. Before coming to Cortland, Vince taught and coached at Whitehall High School in Ohio and Keystone Junior College in Pennsylvania. This is Vince's fifth year at Cortland. He also is the varsity wrestling coach and an instructor of physical education.

1969 OUTLOOK

The Red Dragons could be stronger overall than last year. Coach Roger Robinson will have experienced players returning to man most positions although replacements will have to be found for several key players. All-Americans Rod Verkey and Ray Viladesau, at end and tackle respectively, quarterback Don Congdon and tailback Jim Bensley, the team's leading rusher, have graduated.

Junior John Anselmo has the inside track at quarterback but he will be pressed by sophomore Bill Husak. The ground game will be handled by seniors Larry Bucchioni, Larry Burud and Eric Bradshaw and juniors Joe Bramante and Tom Butcher. The top sophs to watch for are Pete Diffenderfer and Dave Owens.

Starters return at five offensive line positions including center Bill Connor, guards Bob Donnelly and Phil Grebinar, tackle Pat Nugent and split end Earl Rogers. Nugent, at 6-1, 255 pounds, has the talent to become Cortland's third straight All-American. Rogers is another top-notch player. He could hold every Cortland pass receiving record by the time he graduates.

The weak spot on the team is the defensive line. With Bob Gould moving over to offense, end Jim Nelson is the only experienced player returning. The holes will have to be plugged by sophomores, led by big Len Schlacter at 6-3, 215 pounds. The Dragons will have plenty of experience at linebacker and in the defensive backfield. Led by Captain Dave Urick, the best all-around defensive player on the team, Coach Robinson will have no less than eight players who started at least one game last year competing for the six starting berths.

SOCCER

COACHES

T. Fred "Prof" Holloway is the dean of the Cortland coaching staff as he begins his 31st year as head coach of the Red Mule kickers and his 33rd year in the Physical Education Department. In the thirty years that his boys have been representing Cortland on the soccer field the Red 'n White has won 165 games while losing only 77 and tying 18. He coached an undefeated team in 1960 and has guided teams to the NCAA tournament on four different occasions. Cortland boasts 17 All-Americans under Holloway tutelage and his teams have captured the State University of New York Athletic Conference crown five times since the conference was initiated in 1959. Prof received his B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from Springfield College and his doctorate from New York University. Prior to coming to Cortland in 1936, he was an instructor at Springfield, and at the University of Pittsburgh, assistant headmaster and director of physical education at the Foxwood School in Flushing, N. Y., and served as the New England field representative for the American Red Cross. In addition to his soccer coaching duties at Cortland, he is a professor of physical education.

John Willmer is beginning his first coaching assignment at Cortland. An associate professor of geography at the College, Willmer played for the University of Edinburgh Royal Military College in Scotland, the British Army team and Exeter College of Oxford. He also is a graduate of two English Football Association coaching schools. Prior to coming to Cortland in 1967, he coached at Trinity College (Canada), Achimota and Adisadel Colleges in Ghana and the University of Nigeria where his team won the West African University Championship in 1965.

1969 OUTLOOK

Chances of improving on last year's 5-6 record will depend on several problems being overcome, according to Coach T. Fred Holloway. Last year's team lacked depth and the sophomore talent developed late. If the same thing happens again this year, the Red Mules will have a long season.

Cortland lost three outstanding players in Era Mugisa, Bob Leahy and Pete Pepper. All three made the All-State and SUNYAC Conference teams. These players will be hard to replace.

"Prof" has one top-notch player returning in senior goalie Bob Van-Schaick. He has the potential to be an All-State player. Other veterans who will be counted on for help are Joe Chick, Jan Delano, Roy Pfeil and Ken Witick. Sophomores Bruce Casagrande, Walt Nadolny and Tony Sorrentiono also could make their presence felt.

The Red Mules started very slowly last season and staged a second-half comeback winning their final three games and narrowly losing a tough, 3-2 decision to Brockport, the top-rated team in the State. Four of the six losses were by one goal. If the team is able to generate a stronger offense, look for Cortland to rebound with a winning record.

CROSS COUNTRY

COACH

Jack Boehm came to Cortland in 1966 as head coach of cross country and his teams have compiled an outstanding record of 15-2-1 the last two years. He received B.S. and M.S. degrees in physical education from Indiana University and is currently working on a doctorate at the State University at Buffalo. Prior to coming to Cortland he served as an instructor of physical education at Niagara University for one year. He coached two All-Americans in his first year at Cortland — Bob Fitts in cross country and Bob McMurray in swimming. In addition to his duties as head coach of the cross country team Jack is an instructor of physical education and head coach of the swimming team.

1969 OUTLOOK

It will take an all-out effort on the part of the Red Dragon harriers if they hope to match the record of last year's team. In 1968 Coach Jack Boehm's runners compiled an outstanding 8-1 record in dual competition and won the SUNYAC Meet and the LeMoyne Invitational.

Cortland lost two top-notch performers in Murray Banks and Ron Fleury. Banks was the top individual performer in the LeMoyne Invitational and the SUNYAC Meet and he never finished below third in a dual meet. Fleury won only one meet but he was a consistent runner who could be counted on to score the big points when they were needed.

The top returnees are seniors Ed Faulkner and Dick Daymont and junior Gary Freeman. Faulkner was a slow starter and he didn't develop until late in the season. He has been working very hard over the summer however and should be much stronger this year. Daymont and Freeman also were slow starters who developed late. They contributed valuable points late in the season and were labeled as the most improved runners on the team by Coach Boehm.

Others who are counted on for help are juniors Bob Cooper and Don Myers and sophomore Ed Reid. Myers was a transfer last year and had to sit out the season. He has the potential to be a top-flight runner. Several freshmen, particularly Bob Oates of John F. Kennedy High School in Bellmore and George Pfeiffer of Maryvale High School in Cheektowaga, could make their presence felt.
