BASEBALL OUTLOOK

With seven starters and a solid pitching staff returning from last year's 12-7 team, Coach Bob Wallace, embarking on his 13th campaign, has reason to entertain thoughts of a sixth SUNYAC championship.

Last season's edition of Dragon diamonders wound up third in league play and captured the Quantico Marine College Baseball Tournament crown, sweeping through four southern teams en route to the title. Only infielders Bill Ketcham, .163, and Don Congdon, .271, are no longer on hand.

Last year's ".300 Club" outfield is back intact. John Anselmo, with a team-leading .326, Paul Chartrand, .317, and Ken Torrey, .300, all juniors, should comprise one of the stronger fly-shagging sets in the state.

Starting infielders Ed Gremli, .274, Bob Church, .236, and Tom Stevens, .222, are back at first, second and catcher, respectively, and are strong defensive players. Veterans vying for the other jobs are Doug Doyle, Bill Palmer, Lou Foro and Gerry Ruovo.

All six of last year's pitchers are back, giving Wallace the most depth he has ever had in this vital department. Heading the list is All-America candidate Fred Bruntrager, a tough left-hander who had one of the best e.r.a.'s in the nation last year at 1.08 for 62 2/3 innings worked. His 5-3 record wasn't indicative of his effectiveness as he was often the victim of poor support. He broke his own school record for season strike-outs, whiffing 73 for a better than one-per-inning average.

Right-hander Steve Remington, 4-2, 2.13, heads the remainder of the staff which includes lettermen Dick Lewin, Fred Ciampi and Dave Clover. As a group, the corps had a 2.07 e.r.a., one of the stingiest in the northeast.

A nice problem for Wallace is that he has a number of sophomores, up from a 10-2 record, who are complicating the battles for starting berths. Infielders Ron Bonagura, Gary Fields, Mark Rotker, Tony Sorrentino, Harry Waller and Dick Zmudosky have all been impressive in early workouts. Ken Miller, Bill Husak, Dale Harris and Mike White are top pitching prospects along with JC transfer Bob Pultorak.

The ten-school SUNYAC is broken into two divisions for the baseball race. Joining Cortland in the East will be New Paltz, Oneonta, Potsdam and Plattsburgh, while in the West are Geneseo, Buffalo State, Brockport, Oswego and Fredonia.

COACHES

Varsity: Bob Wallace returns from a one-semester leave of absence to direct the Cortland varsity baseball fortunes for the 13th season. His first year on the Hill was spent with the frosh, giving him 14 years of service at his alma mater.

While on leave Wallace, who is an assistant professor in the Physical Education Department, toured Europe visiting physical education schools on the continent. Bob will bring a career coaching record of 131-51-1 to the lines with him this year, a healthy 72 percent victory clip which puts him among the nation's leaders. In his 13-year tenure Wallace, dean of the conference coaches in consecutive years served, has never had a losing season and has annexed five league crowns. He has had a number of graduates sign pro contracts and has sent a handful of Cortland grads into the coaching ranks-like Tom Previt of conference member Fredonia. Bob was a two-year starter at quarterback prior to his graduation in 1953 and also played baseball. He is an assistant varsity football coach and has also handled both freshman and varsity basket-ball chores, never suffering a losing season.

Freshman: Al Stockholm has just completed his third season as varsity basketball coach, directing the Dribbling Dragons to a third-place SUNYAC finish, and begins his second season with frosh baseball.

Al's baseball experience includes three years as a starting first baseman at East Stroudsburg after transferring from Bucknell. After graduation in 1961 he coached two years at Allegany Community College, Cumberland, Md.

A native of Montrose, Pa., AI received his M.A. degree from Maryland in 1963. He coached and taught at his alma mater before coming to Cortland and is currently working on his doctorate at Indiana. He is an assistant professor in the Physical Education Department.

FROSH BASEBALL OUTLOOK

It will be hard to better last year's 10-2 record--both losses coming in extra innings at the hands of Ithaca, 3-2, 2-1, with virtually no recruitment between seasons.

Forty-two frosh drew gear and an early evaluation by coach Al Stockholm would indicate that the team will have to rely primarily on defense to win. Catcher appears to be the strongest individual position with Ken Goebel and Cliff Staves both looking good at this point. Fortunately, the other end of the sixty foot, six inches isn't looking too bad either. Jim Hardy, John Worthing and Garry Sherman have been throwing hard and will probably be the nucleus of the pitching staff.

Looking for starting assignments at the corners are Don Hockheiser and Duke Shipman at first and Blair McFarlane and Tony Dimuro at the hot spot. The keystone combination will come from either Ken Usher or Dick Miller at second and Jim Stepp or Gary Weeks at short. Top outfielders are Tom Deering, Roger Lounsbury, Mark Greven and Keith Greiner.

"Hitting looks uncertain now," says Stockholm, "and if it doesn't develop we'll need strong pitching and defense which it looks as though we might have."

GOLF OUTLOOK

This year's golf team may well appear to have taken its cues from Amy Vanderbilt and not Arnold Palmer: it is likely that the Dragon duffers will prove to be the most obliging of hosts and the most inoffensive of guests.

Coach Larry Martin returns from a two-year leave of absence to inherit but one letterman from last season's squad that went 3-6 in duals and placed third in the conference tournament.

Bruce Goldmacher is the lone holdover and looks like a good bet to hold down the number one spot. Bruce MacDonald and Wally Litua are returning squadmen who could help. Mike Heib, Ron Carlson and George Homokay are junior college transfers who will add depth as should upperclassmen Jim Nugent and Joe Castrilli.

Freshman candidates who have shown potential enough to threaten

for one of the six varsity spots include Lewis Boice, John Sentar, Kevin Van Dusen and Don Letourneau.

Cortland Country Club will again serve as home course for the college golfers.

COACH

Varsity: Larry Martin returns to Cortland for his fourth year as golf coach after a two-year sojourn to Springfield College where he earned his doctorate in physical education. Martin received both his bachelor's and master's degrees from State University College at Cortland after putting in one year at St. Bonaventure. As an undergraduate, Martin started two years at end in football and won two letters in golf. After graduation he spent ten years in the Northern New York prep system, spending two years at Gouverneur, four years at Massena High and four years at Canton Central. In the course of this span Martin served as head coach in football, basketball, baseball and golf in addition to the athletic directorship at Canton Central. He returned to Cortland in 1963 and coached the freshman football team for two years before moving up to the varsity as line coach, a post he will hold again next fall. An assistant professor in the Physical Education Department, Martin and wife Jackie are the parents of three boys and one girl.

With 20 sophomores and 13 juniors listed on the roster, this could be a rebuilding year for Cortland's defending Central New York Lacrosse League champions. If so, there is plenty to build for as the NCAA has recently announced that the 1971 season will culminate, for the first time, in post-season play-offs, to determine a national champion.

Meanwhile, Coach Jack Emmer, replacing Al Pisano who has moved to the head spot at West Point, will welcome back eight lettermen, including five starters from last year's 11-1 team, rated 8th in the nation at season's end.

Only a 9-8 loss to Ivy League champ Cornell marred the Red Dragon slate last year but graduation on the Hill has claimed two first-team All-Americans, Stan Kowalski, the best of four outstanding departed midfielders and Mike Waldvoegel, one of two strong defensemen. Last year's leading scorer, sophomore, John Eberenz, has dropped out of school.

Among the returnees are senior Rich O'Leary, attackman, and Donny Hallenbeck, junior middie, both All-America candidates.

Steve Steigerwald, a junior, returns at midfield and will probably be joined by junior letterman Ed Zambraski and Hallenbeck in the starting line-up.

Senior Dave Urick is the only returning defenseman who saw much action last year at the position that looms as the number one problem for Coach Emmer to solve. Vying for the other two starting spots are senior squadman Larry Zalkin and juniors Marty Rugliss and Mike Cappeto.

Goalie could be the strong spot for the team. Junior Bubba King, who started last year, is being pushed hard by junior Pete Roy who sat out last season after being named second-team All-America the year before.

That unknown quantity, the Sophomore, probably holds the key to success for this year's squad and there would appear to be some good ones coming up from last year's undefeated (8-0) Baby Dragons. No less than 12 are being counted on to see heavy duty.

Sophs counted on to attack are Paul Wehrum, probably the outstanding newcomer to the team, Ken McEwen and Bert Severns.

Craig Clancy, Paul Cody and Bruce Casagrande are the sophomore middles who should help considerably.

Emmer is guardedly optimistic despite the team's greenish tint. "A lot depends on our sophomores and how they come along," says the former Rutgers All-America defenseman. "We expect to be able to run with anyone in the midfield but our defense lacks experience and we're looking for a third attackman to go with O'Leary and Wehrum–Jerry Shore, a senior, may be the answer there."

The team is shooting toward two goals. The early-season aim is to beat neighboring rival Cornell, a trick that no previous Cortland squad has ever been able to pull off. "We think we have a shot at them this year," continues Emmer, "especially since our frosh beat them last year."

The second and overall goal is to again capture the league crown. Unfortunately, Syracuse, Colgate, Hobart, Union and RPI will again be on hand, all with ideas of their own, none of which include successive loop titles for the Dragons.

COACHES

Varsity: AI Pisano, who built Cortland into a college lacrosse power, is a tough act to follow but Jack Emmer has given every indication that he will be equal to the occasion. Although very probably the youngest, at 25, head coach in the nation, Emmer has quickly proven to his squad that he is a thorough student of the game. The native of Mineola, N.Y., is one of the better athletes to come out of Rutgers University in many years. He not only was a second-team All-America defenseman in lacrosse, he also holds nearly every game, season and career receiving record in football at the New Jersey institution. He captained both teams as a senior. Drafted 13th by the New York Jets, he was one of the final cuts and subsequently played two years with the professional Long Island Bulls. He continues to play lacrosse for the Long Island Athletic Club which could qualify him as a candidate for the All-America Commuting team. Interestingly, the team he coaches will play an exhibition against the team he plays for this season. Jack comes to Cortland after two successful seasons with the preps, one each at Levittown Division and East Meadow High. A bachelor, Jack also is on the varsity football staff and is an instructor in the Physical Education Department.

Freshman: You don't have to be a graduate of Mineola High School to coach lacrosse at Cortland but it seems to help. Varsity coach Jack Emmer is a grad of the Long Island school, as was Al Pisano before him and as is newcomer to the coaching ranks, Stan Kowalski.

Like Emmer, Stan begins his new job with an impressive set of credentials in his hip pocket. A midfielder, he is one of the best to ever play lacrosse in this area. He made the progression from Honorable Mention as a soph to Second Team as a junior and last year was named First Team All-American.

The native of Albertson, N.Y., was also a first-rate defensive halfback in football, starting for three years and earning All-ECAC honors.

Stan is currently working on his master's in physical education at Cortland and teaching three days a week at St. Mary's High School. He directed the school's junior varsity football team to an undefeated season.

Last year, as a senior, Stan was the recipient of the annual Beta Sports King Award for best Cortland athlete as voted by the student body, was elected to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, and was named to "Outstanding College Athletes in America." After the lacrosse season he was chosen for and played in the North-South All-Star Game in Baltimore.

Stan would like next year to get into a full-time teaching and coaching position on the college level. Unmarried, he plays lacrosse weekends for the Long Island Athletic Club.

Out from the freshman football squad are Rocky Conte, Al Tatelman, Paul Mueller and Jack Verdi. Although without lacrosse experience, they are improving as a group and could help with experience.

Kowalski appraises the team as having a lot of desire and hustle and promises that the squad will be in top shape. "It's been a Cortland tradition since I've been here to be in better shape than our opponents. When I played we were often able to run other teams off the field in the last quarter when it really counted."

TENNIS OUTLOOK

You wouldn't think that depth would be the strong suit of a team that has lost its top four players but that's the way Coach Barney Williams sees it for this season's tennis campaign.

Indicative of the quality of players on hand is the likelihood that neither Captain Bob Van Schaick nor John Reif, only letterwinners back, will be among the top three singles. Both will be counted on in doubles, however, especially Van Schaick, who seems to play considerably better doubles than singles.

To further open up the battle for positions is the fact that freshmen will be allowed to play varsity for the first time and there are a number around who are still in the bidding for spots.

The top three positions will probably be filled by Bruce Schnittman, number one frosh last year; Bruce Kugler, a senior red-shirt; and freshman Sven Gudmundsen. It's still a toss-up as to who will play where.

Others making strong bids for starting berths include freshmen Ned Joyce and Marc Tow, squadman Dave Carr, soph Mark Riley, squadman Larry Carp, and junior John Spinola who returns to Cortland after a hitch in the Marine Corps. Spinola was number three varsity singles the year before his enlistment.

"This is the best depth we've had in many years," says Williams. "We should do all right until we run into teams that are really loaded. Lack of a strong number one will hurt us. Whether or not we get over .500 will probably depend on how well our doubles players work together."

COACH

Varsity: Reuben H. (Barney) Williams begins his thirteenth season as head Cortland tennis coach. He came to Cortland from Park College, Missouri, in 1957 and assumed coaching positions in tennis and junior varsity basketball. He later served as head basketball coach for five years. A native of Chambersburg, Pa., Williams graduated in 1947 from West Chester State where he played football, basketball, tennis and track. He currently serves as an associate professor in the Physical Education Department.

TRACK OUTLOOK

Some people are wondering whether Coach Joe Pierson is Coach Joe Pierson at all. Or is he a Hollywood script writer? Here is the final indoor track scene that he arranged: Going into the final event of the NYSCTFA finals, the mile relay, Cortland trails Buffalo State 42-36½. Only one way to win. Cortland has to win for six points and they can't place-even a fifth place gives them one point and the title. The final score, a la Twentieth Century, 42½-40 in favor of the good guys.

Or how about the week before that at the Union Invitational? Springfield ahead of Cortland 27 to 20-1/3 going into the final two events, the mile and two-mile relays. They can't place in the top five in either event, Cortland has to be at least second in both. Easy. The guys in white (ignore the red trim) by 28-1/3 - 27.

With the addition of the two melodramas, the Red Dragons ran their indoor win skein to four, having earlier taken the Cortland and before that the Rochester Invitationals on consecutive weekends. These wins and the coincidental presence of some pretty fair material would seem to give the team a good deal of impetus into the outdoor season.

Not surprisingly, the cast will be just about the same, add a handful of freshmen who will be eligible to compete varsity this year. Eighteen lettermen will be around, led by junior Bob Devins who does well in more events than Flipper. Distance-man Murray Banks and all-round pointmaker Doug Bayly, highest scorer in the College's history, are the key losses from the team of a year ago that was 6-0 in duals, 1st at LeMoyne Relays, and 2nd in both the SUNYAC and NYSCTFA finals.

The jumping events look strong. Devins is the school record holder in the long jump, 23-6, and along with Bob Alspaugh has done 6-6 in the high jump. Jimmy Keough and Wayne Paige are improved in the triple jump.

The sprints look solid with Devins, Dan Houtman, and Jim Ramsey all owning 9.8s; they will also be three-fourths of the 440 relay team.

In the middle distances Pete Defina should do well in the 440 while Ed Hines, Roy Pfeil and Roy Berry are all experienced 880 men.

Ed Faulkner will double in the mile and two-mile and will receive help from freshman Bobby Oates in the longer distance. Two juniors, Gary Drennen and Geoff Scarth, are 14-foot vaulters and should win their share of points while pointing for 15 feet.

Terry Horton will be back as defending conference champion in the 440 intermediate hurdles.

Also back to defend their conference championship will be all four members of the mile relay team--Pfeil, Horton, Defina and Roy Champagne.

In the weights, Jeff Calder will be around 50 feet in the shot while Ed Ferraro and Tony Steigerwald will be entered in the discus and inexperienced but promising Bill Bagley and Keith Agate go in the javelin.

Weaknesses in the high hurdles and possibly the javelin don't deter Pierson from optimism. "We should be the team to beat in both conferences. We're stronger than last year and for the first time we're not just one man deep. We're mostly a junior squad, too," he added.

COACHES

Head Coach: Joe Pierson is in his fourth year, both at Cortland and as head track coach. His teams have snared three indoor titles but are still looking for their first outdoor championship. Joe is a 1961 graduate of Southern Illinois University where he competed in the long jump and high jump. He earned his M.S. from S.I.U. in 1965. Upon graduation he taught and coached at Carbondale, III., High before accepting a "uniformed civilian" position at West Point where, for three years, he headed up research--especially pertaining to athletic injuries--for the Physical Education Department in addition to handling the conditioning programs for the football and basketball teams. He returned to teach at his alma mater for one year before accepting his present post. He is an assistant professor of physical education.

Assistant Coaches: Roger Robinson, head Dragon football coach, again will work with long jumpers, triple jumpers, high jumpers and pole vaulters. He is in his seventh year at Cortland and is an associate professor of physical education. Roger spent six years as assistant football and freshman track coach at Harvard before moving to Cortland.

Dave Miller, in his 20th year on the staff, has coached about every sport offered at the college. Dave, a professor of physical education, will be working the weight events this spring. As a Cortland undergrad, he was a sprinter and subsequently head track coach for 18 years.
