Leading scorers for IC are Bob Stiles, 7G-2A, Dan Bernardin, 3-6, Dave Axenfeld, 4-1, and Hugo Gualianone, 3-1.....Stiles had the lone score in 1-0 win against Cortland earlier.....Starting goalie Bob Thompson was injured late in season but might play today.....He has 63 saves in 12 games and allowed 17 goals.....Goalie Craig Stewart has played in four games and has 26 saves, allowing only 1 goal.
