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# CORTLAND STATE WELCOMES THE UNDEFEATED FOOTBALL TEAMS OF 1932 AND 1933

In the 59-year modern day history of Cortland State football, there have been many successful teams but only three Red Dragon squads have enjoyed undefeated seasons. We have the pleasure today of honoring the first two of these unbeaten Cortland teams - the 1932 and 1933 football squads.

Five decades ago this autumn, these same players catapulted Cortland among the ranks of the Eastern small college gridiron powers. Fourteen games without a loss. Outscoring their opposition 238 to 42. Eight shutouts of Red Dragon foes. Like a rolling stone, the Dragon team gathered momentum and could not be stopped. With many of the squad members from the '32 and '33 teams, Cortland continued to topple opponent after opponent in 1934, when the Dragons lost just one game, and in 1935 when Cortland went undefeated again. Just one loss in four years of football!

Cortland's grid successes in those years coincide with the arrival of a new coach on the College campus during the autumn of 1932. He was of medium build and spoke with a Southern drawl. He came from a small Missouri college where they established one of the first athletic sportsmanship/scholarship awards in the nation and named it in his honor.

Indeed, the late Coach Carl "Chugger" Davis made a lasting impression wherever he went. He motivated the Red Dragon players in the early 1930's and, by the time "Chugger" finished coaching 28 years and 105 victories later, he had touched the lives of two generations of Cortland student-athletes. Today, the Red and White football teams play their home contests on a field which bears his name.

In fact, the nickname "Red Dragons" which we use for the Cortland State teams today was adopted for the College's football team during the 1933 campaign.

Spearheaded by a new coach, armed with a new nickname and propelled by some of the best gridiron players in the state, Cortland's 1932 and 1933 squads made the Red Dragon name a football power with which to be reckoned.


"As a matter of fact," stated a November 13, 1933 Syracuse Post-Standard sports editorial, "there's only one Central New York eleven of collegiate ranking that we know of that is really entitled to championship claims, and you might not be able to guess its name, either. The state conference doesn't conduct a "championship," and even if it did, no one would be able to say with certainty whether the honor belonged to Hamilton, which has the best record, or to Clarkson or St. Lawrence. The big three in the Central New York territory are of course away out of the picture this year. So what?

"Well, there's one team in the section which has just completed its second season of unbeaten football, Cortland Normal is the name. Playing teams in its own class, this fine unit has gone through two whole seasons without a black mark on its record. And just where, among the teams playing strictly in their own class, are you going to match an achievement like that? Not among the big fellows, anyway.


"You have to hand it to Coach Carl Davis and his trusty band from Cortland, who put the capper on their record last Saturday with a 26 to 0 defeat of Oswego Normal. It takes just as much "stuff" to be bantam weight champs as it does to get away with the heavyweight honors."

Today, 50 years later, we welcome back our 1932 and 1933 conquering heroes -winners and still champions.

The Red Dragons rolled up a total score of 164 points to their opponents' 16...such a total makes it evident that the team was outstanding on defense as well as on offense throughout the season.

Hartwick game, the season's opener, awakened the hopes for another brilliant season...the whole squad looked good...a scoring spree enjoyed by the whole backfield...40 to 0 the final score...left no doubt as to the quality of the new team.

The following week found the team journeying to Mansfield in high spirits...the result of a 13 to 0 triumph...Leo Donovan's brilliant line play was the outstanding feature of the game...the team as a whole looked tremendously powerful...accompanied by brilliant line play they really showed the "class" that is oftentimes only hoped for in much larger schools.

Ithaca came to Cortland the following Saturday with one of the heaviest and most powerful elevens ever seen on the Hill...the score 6 to 6 hardly gave evidence of the fierce battle that took place...during the game the Red Dragons received their first serious injury, Milt Latimer suffering a broken leg which kept him from participating the rest of the season...outweighed by many pounds per man the team brought to the fore the

instruction of Coach Davis in overcoming that handicap.

A two day trip to Trenton, New Jersey, proved most enjoyable for the boys as is seen in the final score of the game, 54 to 0...from the start the "Skeeters" were "outplayed, outsmarted and outguessed."...Bergstrom was brilliant...taking an opening kick-off, he showed his heels to the entire Trenton team and ran for a touchdown...perfect blocking and tackling aided him a second time in running a punt back ninety-five yards for another touchdown...the combination of Ross and Hall was almost impossible to penetrate.

Stroudsburg arrived here the next Saturday bringing to the Hill a team with an enviable record, having made impressive showings against several large colleges...undaunted by their opponents supposed prowess, Coach Davis's charges proceeded to blast their hopes to a "fare-thee-well," hanging a 26 to 10 defeat on the boys from "Penn's Wood"...Ollie Cook, the featherweight back, proved to be the big inspiration of his team, giving his mates the needed incentive time after time when things looked black, by tearing through, twisting, turning and consistently gaining...condition proved to be a deciding factor in pulling the hot coal from the fire, again proving that Coach Davis's efforts and late night toiling were not in vain.

The hardest battle of the year came the following week from a rather unexpected but not underestimated source...Arnold College managing to hold the Red Dragons scoreless for the first time and the only time all season...Carter was the outstanding backfied man, the only one able to get away for any consistent gain...Ross breaking through and blocking a punt and the brilliant end play of Bob White were the outstanding features of line play...through stalwart defense defeat was averted...Arnold stopped practically every scoring possibility...much credit is due the plucky little eleven from New Haven...Bergstrom did some pretty ball toting in mid-field...but the team lacked the final punch to push the ball over.

The finale of the season was a journey to Oswego where Max Ziel's proteges were handed a 28 to 0 licking...the whole line play was the outstanding thing of the game, every man working with his teammates as a single unit...Streubing backing up the center of the line proved to be the bulwark of the defense.

Next year's team loses, by graduation, Bergstrom, Cook, Houck, McDonald, and Ockershausen from the backfield; the line loses Brooks, Hall and White. Coach Davis will be hard pressed to fill the shoes of these brilliant seniors but the spirit instilled by him will prevail and then...well...on to another great season.
