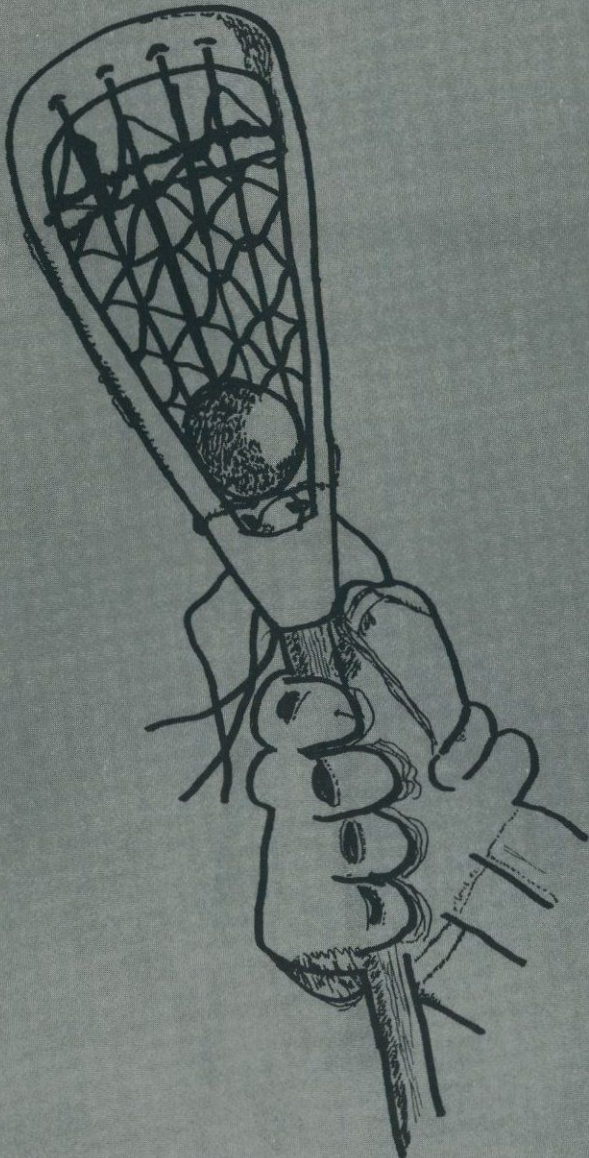

NCAA College Division Tournament Will Be Annual Lacrosse Event

The championship lacrosse game at Cortland today is the culmination of the first College Division lacrosse tournament ever conducted by the National Collegiate Athletic Association. Eight teams were selected on the basis of season records and overall caliber of play. Seedings were determined on the basis of ranking in the national polls at the time tournament invitations were extended.

Only four teams were seeded: 1 - Towson State, 2 - Hobart, 3 - Cortland State, and 4 - Washington. Completing the tournament slate were Adelphi, Baltimore, University of Maryland-Baltimore County, and Roanoke.

The NCAA has been conducting lacrosse tournaments for the past three years without any distinction between College and University Division teams. Plans now call for annual tournaments in each division.

Of the eight teams selected for this first College Division tournament, only Cortland has participated in any of the previous NCAA events. In 1972, the Red Dragons defeated Navy in the opening round and lost to Virginia in a semi-final battle here at

Davis Field. A crowd of 7,000 was in attendance, the largest sports crowd ever at Cortland.

It was also in 1972 that the U.S. Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association first conducted a tournament for College Division teams. Twelve teams were picked including four of the teams which were invited to compete in this year's NCAA tournament, Adelphi, Hobart, Towson State and Washington. Hobart won the title, defeating Washington in the finals, 15-12.

In 1973, the USILA tournament was repeated with 16 teams involved and Cortland State won the championship. Washington again made the finals before losing to the Dragons, 13-8. Adelphi, Baltimore, Hobart and Towson State were among the 16 team field.

With the advent of an NCAA College Division tournament, there is no USILA competition this spring.

Winners of previous NCAA lacrosse tournaments were Cornell in 1971, Virginia in '72 and Maryland in '73.

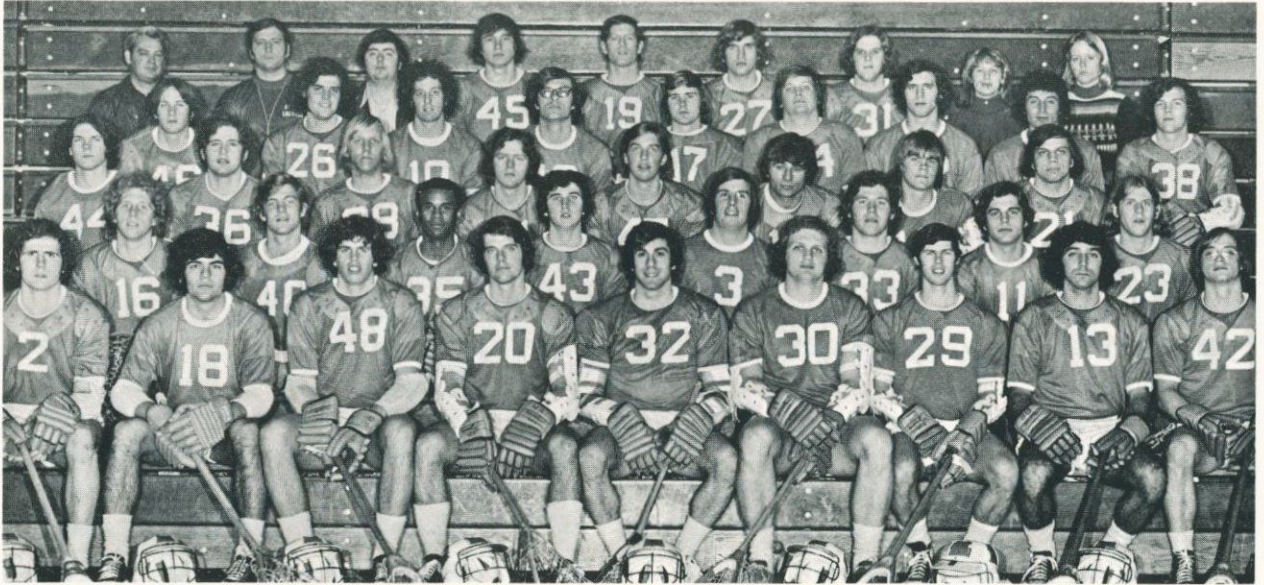

Lacrosse Hall of Fame At Johns Hopkins

The Lacrosse Hall of Fame is located on the Baltimore campus of Johns Hopkins University in quarters provided in the Newton White Athletic Center. When the Hall opened in 1966, it marked the first time that a central location was provided to house the many historical photographs, trophies, equipment and other memorabilia that reflect the origins and development of the sport of lacrosse. The museum is open from 9 to 5, Monday through Friday.

Approximately 1200 square feet of space contains all kinds of reference material. Included is a library collection of books and films, magazines and newspaper articles, and a complete file of lacrosse guides. High school, college and club lacrosse data are catalogued and filed for quick and easy reference.

The Hall of Fame also has an index of names and addresses of 10,000 former lacrosse players throughout the United States. The geographical index is particularly helpful to schools and organizations interested in obtaining assistance to start lacrosse programs in different areas.

In addition to serving as a museum center, the Hall of Fame serves as a headquarters of the Lacrosse Hall of Fame Foundation which is devoted to fostering the growth of lacrosse on a national scale.

There have been 110 former lacrosse players named to the Hall of Fame and that is one of its primary purposes. As officially described by those who helped establish the Hall of Fame, it is intended to "honor men, past and present, who by their deeds as players and coaches and by the example of their lives personify the great contribution of the game of lacrosse to our way of life, and to enshrine the names of such individuals in the Lacrosse Hall of Fame forever."

One of the better known citizens of Cortland, George Latimer, was named to the Hall of Fame in 1973. He won All-American honors at the home (close attack) position during his playing days at Rutgers, 1930-32. He also played football at Rutgers.

The National Collegiate Athletic Association—the NCAA—is now in its 68th year and hasn't stopped growing yet.

The NCAA stands for many different things, but it is best known for its service to its member institutions.

The NCAA has more than 750 members and has established 33 annual National Championships in 18 different sports—including four new championships in Division III. Although best-known to the public for its Championship program, the NCAA does much more than conduct this national series.

The Association serves as the governing body of intercollegiate athletics. It is truly the athletic voice of the nation's colleges and universities.

It enforces a detailed code of regulations, is a means of professional communication for administrators and coaches and is a source of films, records and statistics.

It started in 1905 when President Theodore Roosevelt was about to ban intercollegiate football because of the violence of play.

Football representatives from 13 institutions met in December of 1905 to bring about reforms in college football. Later in the month, at a second meeting, the group formed the Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

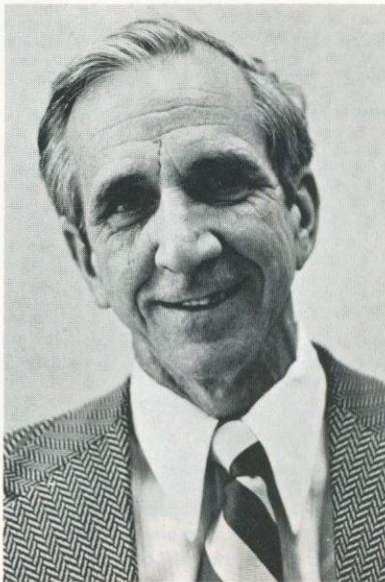
On March 31, 1906, it was officially constituted and in 1910 the ICA became the NCAA.

The NCAA moved from a discussion group to an important and vital force in the conduct and administration of intercollegiate athletics when the membership voted itself legislative and executive powers shortly after World War II.

The change quickly shifted the NCAA's main responsibility from playing rules to considering and acting upon any athletic problem which has spread across regional lines and becomes national in character.

The enforcement program of the NCAA is designed to assure compliance with the legislation, the member institutions and allied conferences have adopted.

At annual Conventions of the Association, the NCAA is the nation's colleges and universities themselves speaking and acting on athletic matters at the national level.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME BECOMES COLLEGE-COMMUNITY UNDERTAKING

The NCAA College Division lacrosse championship event has turned into a joint undertaking on the part of the Cortland community and Cortland State College. More than 20 persons attended the first meeting of the planning committee in March. Since that time, four sub-committees have been at work on details related to the game today and the championship game dinner last evening.

Support was generated throughout the community in a variety of ways. Dinner tickets were available through all branches of the First National Bank and the Holiday Inn. The Chamber of Commerce office handled tickets for the game and the dinner. Game tickets also were sold at the Elks Club, Shamrock Inn, Tavern, Huddle, Lido's, Red Dragon, Palm Gardens, Preble Hotel and Willowbrook Country Club.

Resolutions were passed by the Chamber of Com-

merce and the Cortland County Legislature congratulating the College on being selected as the host college for this first lacrosse title game in the NCAA's College Division.

The Chamber resolution, noting that "the general community has benefited in large measures from the diversified intercollegiate sports program at the College," urged community support for the championship event.

The County Legislature document, pointing out that the College "has regularly opened intercollegiate events to the people of Cortland and has often made its facilities available for use by the public and special groups," extended a "special message of appreciation" to the College in behalf of the people of the County.
