### The C-Club Hall of Fame

The C-Club Hall of Fame was established in 1969 as a means of recognizing alumni who competed as athletes at Cortland State and who have since distinguished themselves in their professions and their communities.

New members have been inducted annually for the past 21 years. The 1989 ceremony on October, 14, 1989, will bring the C-Club Hall of Fame roster to 94 alumni and six honorary members.

### State University of New York College at Cortland

Located atop one the rolling hills in central New York's "City of Seven Valleys," the State University of New York College at Cortland was founded in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School, which included among its earlier students inventor and industrialist Elmer A. Sperry of Sperry-Rand Corp. frame.

Over the decades, the campuses expanded and in 1941, by an act of the legislature and the Board of Regents, the institution officially became a four-year college providing courses leading to a bachelor's degree. In 1948, Cortland College was a founding member of the State University of New York

Today more than 5,600 undergraduate and 600 graduate students are pursuing degrees within the colleges two academic divisions -Arts & Sciences and Professional Studies. Twenty-three departments with a faculty of more than 300 offer the Cortland State student body some 100 major programs from which to chose including economics, biology, sociology, elementary and secondary education, physical education, health education and recreation to name a few.

The College's main campus covers 191 acres and includes 30 major buildings. Fourteen of these structures are residence halls providing on-campus housing for 2,600 students. Cortland also operates its Outdoor Education Center at Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks, the Hoxie Gorge Nature Preserve outside Cortland, and the Brauer Memorial Geological field station near Albany on the Helderberg Escarpment.

At Cortland State athletics are viewed as having an important role in the educational mission of the College. During the fall, winter and spring seasons, Cortland participates in 24 intercollegiate sports - 12 men's and 12 women's - in an attempt to provide a broad program which meets the needs, interests and abilities of its students.

Cortland State is particularly proud of its long tradition of intercollegiate athletics and its high standing in small college athletic circles. In support of this heritage, the College offers its student athletes - some 800 annually - a number of outstanding and indoor facilities for intercollegiate competition, as well for educational and recreational purposes.

The Park Center for Physical Education and Recreation opened in 1973, features a main gymnasium with a 3,600 seating capacity; an Olympic-sized swimming pool with gallery seating for 1,500; an ice arena which can accommodate 2,500 spectators; racquetball and squash courts, a wrestling room, and modern athletic training facilities. Nearby Lusk Field House, with its new tartan-textured surface, is home for the indoor track teams, varsity practice sessions and recreational activities. The Red Dragon football and lacrosse squads compete on Davis Field, with its 5,000 seating capacity.

Edward Bosse '51 8 Wicklow Terrace Delmar, New York 12054

A former three-sport standout at Cortland College, Edward Bosse has thoroughly distinguished himself as a golf professional in New York State during the past two decades.

The golf professional at Colonie Country Club in Vorheesville, N.Y. for more than the last 20 years, Bosse served as the New York State Professional Golfers Association of America (PGA) tournament director for eight years. Nationally, Bosse remains active as a member of the PGA Rules Committee. A golf consultant for Philip Morris, Inc., he was Northeast New York "Golf Professional of the Year" on three different occasions and Northeast New York "Player of the Year" three times. Bosse has qualified and played in three National PGA Championships and six National PGA Senior Championships.

In the Northeastern New York Professional Golfers Association, Bosse has served as president, board member, tournament chairman and rules chairman during his 20 years in the area.

City of Albany Mayor Thomas Whelen asked Bosse to design a new golf course, scheduled to open in the Spring of 1990, for that city. Active in community projects, Bosse has directed golf benefit tournaments for the American Cancer Society, Multiple Sclerosis and the United Way of Northeastern New York.

A native of Lancaster, N.Y., Bosse came to Cortland College in 1948. He earned the prestigious Red Letters in football, as a defensive back, and in golf. He also earned a letter in basketball. A Delta Kappa fraternity brother, Bosse was active in the Hellenic Council and the Newman Club.

"I feel the educational and athletic experiences offered at Cortland were and still are exceptional," said Bosse. "The education I received at Cortland helped me interact intelligently with my membership of which 90 percent are college graduates. The athletic experience at Cortland prepared me to compete on a local and national level."

In 1951, Bosse earned a bachelor's degree in physical education He coached football and basketball at South Huntington (NY) High, then returned to Cortland to assist coaching football and basketball while guiding the varsity golf team from 1953 to 1955. His 1953-54 Red Dragon junior varsity basketball team finished with a perfect 17-0 record.

Bosse worked as assistant golf professional at the DelRay, Florida Country Club and as the Binghamton (NY) head golf pro before taking the position at Colonie Country Club.

Bosse and his wife, Sally Ann, have two children, Kristen and Scott.

#### Milton "Dutch" Hess '51 102 Fuston Avenue Albertson, New York 11507

The director of athletics and chairman of boy's physical education for Great Neck (NY) Public Schools from 1966 to 1984, Milton "Dutch" Hess cites his Cortland College education as a motivating factor in his 33 years as a physical education teacher.

"I was fortunate to have attended Cortland in those years following World War II," he recalled. "Administrators who were true professionals led a faculty that was committed to excellence, both on and off the playing fields. On was allowed to learn and to reach one's potential, always aware that there was support when needed. My philosophy towards teaching and coaching and towards working with others was nurtured and developed in those grand years."

Raised in Ilion, N.Y., Hess arrived at Cortland College in January of 1948. He earned varsity letters as a center and linebacker in football, and as a lacrosse midfielder. The Beta Phi Epsilon fraternity secretary, Hess was also vice-president of the Men's Athletic Association before graduating cum laude in 1951 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. He later earned a master's degree in 1956 and director's certification in 1958 - both from New York University.

Hess taught and helped coach football, basketball and baseball at Baldwinsville (NY) High for a year before beginning his long association with the Great Neck school system. Hess coached basketball for 28 years, soccer for 11 years, lacrosse for nine seasons, wrestling for three years and was assistant track coach for a dozen years. In addition, from 1955 to 1981, Hess was an Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Division I football official and served as president of the New York chapter.

Through the years, Hess has been active with many Section VIII and North Shore Athletic League committees. He has served on the New York State Association of Blind Athletes Board of Directors, has coordinated officials for the New York State Games for the Physically Challenged and has been both an official and consultant for the Tri-State Wheelchair Games. He was Long Island coordinator for the New York State Senior Games and assisted with the 1984 International Games for the Disabled.

A past recipient of the Cerebral Palsy Educator Award, the Long Island Recreation Service Award and numerous Distinguished Service Awards, Hess has had a Sportsmanship Award named in his honor by the LIBOA. Since retiring from Great Neck in 1984, Hess has worked as an instructor in the Graduate program and as director of intramurals and recreation at Adelphi University from 1984 to 1988.

He and his wife, Ginny Dobbins Hess '51, have five children, John, Barbara, James, Daniel and Amy.

Allan Van Nostrand '54 430 Ackerson Boulevard Brightwaters, New York 11713

As head tennis coach at Bay Shore High, Allan Van Nostrand's teams have consistently achieved local, regional and national acclaim. His players have captured 10 county championships, 16 league titles and more than 400 career victories - including a streak of 173 consecutive wins during a nine-year span which stood as a national record.

"My experience as an undergraduate at Cortland greatly influenced my career as both teacher and coach," noted Van Nostrand, both a tennis professional and a Bay Shore social studies teacher for three decades. "Ralph Brown's approach of weaving history around the personalities of great men became the cornerstone for my interest in and love of history. Gus Timmel's compassion and easy going coaching style helped set the tone for the kind of coaching personality I developed later."

Van Nostrand, a Brightwaters, N.Y. native, competed in basketball at Cortland College but, along with his brother, King, excelled at tennis. He won the prestigious Rider College Invitational singles title for Cortland – the equivalent of the NCAA small college championships in the early 1950's. Listed in Who's Who in American Colleges, Van Nostrand earned a bachelor's degree in education in January, 1954.

The next two years were spent in the U.S. Army Air Force in the Far East, where Van Nostrand won the All-Service Doubles Championship in Guam and the Far Eastern Doubles Championship in Japan in 1954.

He returned to Bay Shore High in 1955. Van Nostrand taught and coached there until his retirement in 1986. During his 26 years as head tennis coach, Van Nostrand was named New York State Coach of the Year, Section XI Coach of the Year and the National High School Athletic Coaches Region I Coach of the Year. He was President of the Suffolk County Coaches association and chaired both league and sectional tennis organizations.

The Van Nostrand brothers have remained active tennis professionals through the years. In the early 1970's, the tandem ranked among the top seven nationally the 35-year-old bracket of men's doubles competition. As recently as 1986, Van Nostrand captured the 55-year-old men's singles title in Bermuda. In 1983 and 1984, Van Nostrand co-chaired the Pro-Am Charity Tennis Tournament for the South Side and Good Samaritan Hospitals. When he retired from Bay Shore High in 1986, Van Nostrand established an annual \$300 fund for each incoming freshman class, the money to be used and monitored in the stock market by the class during the four high school years. The class then receives the proceeds its senior year.

Van Nostrand and his wife, Mary Constance Stark '51, have four children: Susan, Lynn, Allan and Amy.

#### Barbara Southwick '68 413 Harborview Court Moriches, New York 11955

As president of the New York State Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance in 1986-87, Barbara Southwick oversaw a "grass roots" revision of the state-wide physical education curriculum. She also initiated a two-day Fitness Assessment Program in Albany to showcase physical education New York State. More recently, she has helped re-write the Middle Country Schools curriculum and has assisted rewriting one in the Sag Harbor School District.

Indeed, Southwick has demonstrated a concern for students of all capabilities, an affection fostered during her Cortland College years, since she began teaching elementary education at Middle Country Schools in 1968. For the past decade, she has taught adapted physical education in the district.

Through the years, Southwick has been at various times: a member of the New York Special Olympics Board of Directors, coordinator of the Suffolk County Special Olympics, a Games for the Disabled volunteer, board member on the U.S. Association of Blind Athletes, a member of the Town of Brookhaven Advisory Committee for the Handicapped, and active with the Games for the Physically Challenged.

In return, Southwick has received numerous merit, service and humanitarian awards, including The United Cerebral Palsy Sports Association Award, the Town of Brookhaven Youth Service Award and the NYSAHPERD "Amazing People" Award.

Southwick revealed a tenacity in earning her undergraduate degree at Cortland. A native of Bayside, N.Y. and Bayside High graduate, the former Barbara Greene attended Cortland College from September 1955 until June 1957, when she left school to concentrate her fulltime efforts on her marriage and her family. She returned to Cortland in the summer of 1967 and, in 1968, earned a bachelor of science degree in education.

"Coming back to Cortland after 10 years of raising three daughters was a difficult experience," said Southwick, now a Selden Middle School teacher. "Utilizing movement education, then becoming popular, at the Campus School, and the strong program in adaptive physical education really helped me formulate my teaching strengths and philosophies upon entering the field."

During her first stint at Cortland, Southwick competed on the gymnastics team. She has continued that early interest in gymnastics with workshops on the sport. In addition, Southwick serves as head bowling coach at Centereach High and assistant junior high track coach at Selden Middle School.

Southwick, who earned as master's degree in special education from Adelphi University in 1976, has three daughters, Stacie, Stephanie and Synthea.

**Rol Randall** 37 Miller Street Cortland, New York 13045

The sportswriter and later sports editor at the Cortland Standard from 1928 to 1976, Rol Randall, who becomes the sixth honorary C-Club Hall of Fame inductee, began covering Cortland State athletics a few years before the then-Cortland Normal School teams adopted their nicknames of "Red Dragons" and "Red Mules." He would follow the fortunes of Cortland athletics for the next half-century.

In fact, Randall's 48 years as a local sportswriter spans nearly half of the first 100 years of the College. It is fitting, then, that Randall becomes the 100th C-Club Hall of Fame inductee because during his decades as sports editor he wrote about nearly all of the Cortland Hall of Famers, competing on the many great Red Dragon teams, who preceded him.

A native of Cortland, N.Y., Randall followed the professional footsteps of his father, also a newspaperman, and began as a general assignment reporter and a part-time sportswriter for the Standard in the 1920's. In 1940, he became wire editor and, three years later, added the sports editor title to his chores as front page editor. For the next three decades, he covered the Cortland sports scene as a "one-man" sports department.

Beyond Cortland State sports, Randall wrote about and helped promote the athletic careers of many Cortland scholastic standouts, including such locals as former National Football League players Gary Wood and Jack Call.

A charter member of the Cortland Bowling Hall of Fame, Randall served on the New York State Bowling Association Board of Directors for 30 years and was secretary of the Cortland Bowling Association for 37 years. His daily sports column, "Down the Sports Alley," grew from strictly a bowling news column to eventually encompass the wide gamut of sports topics.

In 1977, Randall became the 23rd recipient of the Cortland County Sports Award for his many contributions to the local sports. A former secretary in the Kiwanis Club, Randall, for many years, served as a national weather observer for Cortland.

Randall, a widower, has three children, David, Judy and Karen.
