Phyllis D. Calogero '52 Barneveld, N.Y.

For four decades, Phyllis D. Calogero '52 was a driving force for junior and senior high school athletics as a physical educator, coach and athletic administrator in the Mohawk Valley and a Section III official for the New York State Public High School Athletic Association.

Born in Utica, N.Y., she graduated from T.R. Proctor High School. She earned both her bachelor's in physical education and master of science degree from SUNY Cortland. Despite not having intercollegiate athletic opportunities in college, Calogero devoted her life to athletics.

After graduating from Cortland, she returned to Proctor High as a physical education teacher and coach

for the next 18 years. From 1970-83, she was associate director of physical education and athletics for the Rome (N.Y.) City School District, where she served as director of physical education, health and health services from 1983 until her retirement in 1986.

The Section III president from 1986-88, she also served as a member of its Executive Committee, Athletic Council and Officials Coordinating Committee. Prior to Title IX, she was an

officer in the Association of Women in Physical Education in New York State (AWPENYS), which pioneered the involvement of high school girls athletic competition by scheduling interscholastic tournaments and meets.

Inducted into the Proctor High Hall of Fame in 1994 and the City of Rome Hall of Fame in 2004, she helped to organize and was later inducted into the Greater Utica Hall of Fame. She has been honored by Kiwanis International and the Salvation Army for her service to children.

An active community member, she chaired the Rome Mayor's Advisory Council on Sports, Recreation and Physical Fitness. She also chaired the local Salvation Army Board of Directors and the New York State Pupils Benefits Insurance Board of Directors. A past president of Zonta International of Rome, N.Y., she was an alternate delegate to two international conferences.

Calogero served on SUNY Cortland's Consortium to Change Competency based Teacher Education program, as well as the Utica Schools' Steering Committee for Middle States Association Accreditation, the Cancer Society Advisory Board and the Barneveld (N.Y.) Recreation Committee.

Named a National Women's History Woman of Merit in 1987, she received the Distinguished Service Award from the National Federation of Interscholastic Athletic Coaches five years later.

C. Glenn Stevens '54 Canastota, New York

Charles Glenn Stevens '54, a standout baseball and soccer player at Cortland, positively influenced the lives of two generations of students as a successful teacher, coach and administrator at Stockbridge Valley Central School in Munnsville, N.Y.

The Port Leyden, N.Y., native was a four-year goalie in soccer at SUNY Cortland. As a senior, he captained the team, earned honorable mention all-state honors and won the Red Letter Award. An outfielder and catcher for the Cortland baseball squad, he hit .439 as a junior and a .500 batting average during his senior season, when he was the team captain and the Red Letter Award recipient.

Stevens earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1954 and joined the Stockbridge Valley Central School staff that autumn. He remained there until his retirement 31 years later.

He taught K-12 physical education and 7-12 health. The athletic director from 1954-80, he coached varsity football, basketball and baseball. He started and coached the soccer and varsity track and field teams and was a junior varsity basketball coach. He supervised student teachers and advised the Varsity Club.

In 1995, he received the Excellence in Sportsmanship Award from the Stockbridge Valley Central School Booster Club.

Within the New York State Public High School Athletic Association (NYSPHSAA), Stevens chaired the Section III Basketball Committee for 10 years and served on the committee for a quarter-of-a-century.

For 10 years, he served as recreation director of Carlon Park in Munnsville. From 1960-68, he was elected mayor of the Village of Munnsville. He was active in both St. Therese Church in Munnsville and St. Patrick Church in Chittenango, N.Y. He was a member of the Chittenango High School Athletic Booster Club and a Connie Mack baseball coach for the Town of Sullivan Parks and Recreation Department in Chittenango during the 1970s and 1980s.

A member of the Chittenango Lions Club since 1974, he is a two-time past president. From 1955-85, he worked as a security guard at Vernon Downs Racetrack in Vernon, N.Y. Since 1986, he has operated his own financial services business.

Stevens and his wife, Ann, have eight children—Mack, Karen Stevens Diefendorf '79, Peter '81, Richard, Charles, Mary, Theresa Stevens Savery, and Thomas—and several grandchildren.

Robert Lalley '66 Brewerton, N.Y.

The best collegiate distance runner in New York during the mid-1960s, Robert Lalley '67 won an unprecedented four State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) cross country championships and captured three straight New York State cross country titles during his illustrious career.

The Binghamton, N.Y., native was an undefeated and New York State scholastic champion in the one-mile run at Chenango Valley High School.

A secondary social studies major at SUNY Cortland, Lalley shattered course and meet records in taking 33 first place career finishes for the Red Dragon cross country squads. He led Cortland to undefeated

cross country seasons in 1964 and 1965. An All-American, he placed 15th in 1963 and fifth in the 1964 NCAA College Division national meets.

In track and field, Lalley set the school records in the mile and two-mile runs and won the New York State and the NCAA Eastern Regional titles in both events in 1964. He won the Red Letter in cross country as a sophomore, junior and senior.

He earned both his bachelor's degree in 1966 and his master of science in education in 1968 from SUNY Cortland.

Lalley taught secondary social studies in the North Syracuse (N.Y.) School District from 1967-2002. He was chosen to participate on a statewide team of educators charged to prepare New York's ninth grade social studies Regent's Exam. He was named to a group of educators who developed the district and state economics curriculum.

He organized and coached the first junior high cross country team in the North Syracuse School District in 1967. He then coached the varsity boys cross country at North Syracuse High School and the Cicero (N.Y.) boys and girls track teams. He was the North Syracuse Teachers Union building representative for 32 years.

Since 2002, Lalley has been the assessment administrator for the National Assessment of Educational Progress.

Within his community, he has been active distributing food for the Brewerton Community Food Pantry, working with beautification projects for the Saddle Creek Neighborhood Association, assisting Brewerton Elementary School with its Science Fair and Career Day, and serving as a religious education instructor with St. Agnes Church.

In 1977, Lalley was inducted into the New York State Public High School Athletic Association's Section IV Hall of Fame. He becomes the second father-son combination inducted into the Cortland C-Club Hall of Fame. His late father, Ernest Lalley '33, was inducted in 1987.

He and his wife, Lauren, have four daughters, Noelle, Jennifer, Vanessa and Amanda.

Garth Tymeson '75
La Crosse, Wis.

An exceptional pitcher for the Cortland baseball squads during the mid-1970s, Garth Tymeson has distinguished himself as an outstanding professor and administrator at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse and Northern Illinois University.

He joined UW-La Crosse in 1990 as associate dean in the College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, one of the largest colleges of its type in the nation. He added the duties of director of university graduate studies from 1997-2001. He served as interim dean for the College of Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Teacher Education between 2000-03.

Tymeson teaches courses in adapted physical

education, research methods and grant seeking in the Department of Exercise and Sports Science. He has procured more than \$2 million in grants and contracts for many projects, including preparing physical educators to teach children with disabilities and educational enrichment programs for children from low-income families.

A native of Troy, N.Y., Tymeson attended Catholic Central High and Hudson Valley Community College, where he

earned an associate's degree in physical education and liberal arts.

He matriculated to SUNY Cortland in 1973 and excelled both on the baseball diamond and in the class-room. The right-handed hurler, who produced 14 victories in two seasons, still ranks fourth on the school's all-time list for best career earned-run average with his 1.56 mark. He threw 144 strikeouts in 155 2/3 innings to remain among Cortland's top 10 career best in that category.

Tymeson graduated cum laude with a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1975. He earned a master's degree in physical education at SUNY Brockport, where he assisted with International Special Olympics events and did research on the motor development of children who are deaf and blind.

He was an adapted physical education and special education instructor at the School of the Holy Childhood in Rochester, N.Y., from 1976-78. He earned his Ph.D. in kinesiology with emphases on adapted physical education and special education at Texas Woman's University in Denton, Texas.

Tymeson joined the Northern Illinois University physical education faculty in 1981 as an assistant professor and was promoted to associate professor in 1987. While there, he directed the Special Physical Education Teaching-Research Clinic, coordinated the graduate program in adapted physical education teacher preparation and wrote and directed U.S. Department of Education Teacher Preparation Grants.

The author of numerous scholarly works, Tymeson and his wife, Martha, have three children, Kyle, a sophomore at Clemson University, Ryan, a high school senior, and Marissa, an eighth grader.

Linda J. Case '77 Brockport, N.Y.

Linda J. "Lin" Case '77 has helped to guide SUNY Brockport's 23-sport intercollegiate athletic program to national prominence as its director of athletics

since 1995.

When hired, Case became only the second female athletic director in the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) and the only one in New York State to oversee an NCAA Division III intercollegiate athletic program offering both football and ice hockey.

Case was the SUNYAC president in 2003-04 and is serving a three-year term on the Eastern College Athletic Conference (ECAC) Board of Directors. She has served on a variety of NCAA Division III committees.

including the Financial Aid Task Force, the Financial Aid and Rewards Committee, the Football East Region Selection Committee, and the Infractions Commit-

The Canandaigua, N.Y., native and Canandaigua Academy graduate majored in physical education, with an emphasis in coaching, at SUNY Cortland. She competed in the long jump and high jump for the Red Dragon track and field squad. She later earned a master's degree in physical education from SUNY Brock-



Case began her professional career teaching physical education and coaching volleyball, basketball, bowling, gymnastics and cheerleading at Thomas A. Edison High School in Elmira Heights, N.Y. From 1981-87, she was assistant manager and program coordinator at the Penfield (N.Y.) Racquet Club.

In 1987, she joined the SUNY Brockport staff as assistant athletic director. She also handled the duties of senior women's administrator, NCAA compliance officer and coordinator of the Tuttle facilities at the campus. She has been tournament director for many state, conference, regional and national post-season championships.

Named the athletic director in 1995, she now oversees all varsity and junior varsity teams, 53 full- and part-time coaches, eight athletic administrators, three athletic trainers, three support staff and 65 student employees. She is responsible for management of the \$2.3 million athletic budget. Between 1995-99, she concurrently served as director of campus recreation.

Case was the catalyst behind SUNY Brockport's "College Athletes for a Winning Attitude" initiative, a three-year drug and alcohol education program run in conjunction with the Brockport Central School District's Brockport Against Chemical Abuse (BACA) program. She also reorganized the Golden Eagle Society, the athletic fund-raising program at the college.

The recipient of an Outstanding Young Woman of America Award in 1988, Case was the Josten's ECAC Administrator of the Year in 2003. A member of the Beta Pi Chapter of Phi Epsilon Kappa, the national physical education honor society, Case was inducted into the Canandaigua Academy Athletic Hall of Fame in 1996.

Maj. Jefferson D. Holden '84

Gainesville, Va. Maj. Jefferson D. Holden '84 USMC, a national champion diver for SUNY Cortland whose records still stand after two decades, has distinguished himself professionally during his 20-year career with the U.S. Marine

Corps.

The Avon. N.Y., native dominated the State University of New York Athletic Conference (SUNYAC) competition by winning every one-meter and three-meter championship during all four year at Cortland. He was one of the few divers to receive the James Fulton Award, presented by the SUNYAC coaches to the outstanding senior swimming and diving athlete in the league.

Holden, a six-time All-American, won the NCAA

Division III one-meter national title in 1984. He still holds the school records on both boards set during the 1983-84 season.

A communication studies major at SUNY Cortland, Holden hosted a radio talk show on WSUC-FM and acted in several Cortland theatrical productions.

Upon graduation, Holden accepted a commission in the U.S. Marine Corps. In 2000, he was named executive officer of the Defense Finance and Accounting Service Headquarters.

In 2000-01, he served as comptroller of the 3rd Marine Division and was commanding officer of the Service Company, HQ/Service Battalion, at Quantico, Va. from 2001-03.

Holden has been honored with the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Joint Commendation Medal, the NMC Commendation Medal with gold star, the Joint Achievement Medal, and the NMC Achievement Medal.

He earned an M.B.A. in finance from Averett University and graduated from both the Professional Military Comptroller School and the Marine Corps Command and Staff College. He is a certified defense financial manager.

Holden has raised funds for Habitat for Humanity and directed the Marine Corps' Toys for Tots program in Albany, Ga. He has volunteered as an adult Sunday School teacher and as a speaker for the Men's Chapel

Group in Okinawa, Japan.

He was the springboard coach for the Northern Virginia Dive Club, a diving coach at Mount Vernon (Va.) High School, and a member of the Northern Virginia Lacrosse Officials' Association. A student pilot, he belongs to the Quantico Aero Club and is a member of the Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association.

He has two children, Ashley, 17, and Kyle, 12.

James "Doc" Counsilman

Honorary


Arguably the world's greatest swimming coach, researcher and innovator of all time, the late James "Doc" Counsilman left his mark at SUNY Cortland as a physical education professor and swim coach in the early 1950s before becoming an NCAA and Olympic coaching legend at Indiana University.

Born in 1920, he grew up in St. Louis, Mo. and attended Ohio State University. He left to join the Army Air Corps, flying 32 missions as a bomber pilot during World War II. After the war, he returned to Ohio State and won national titles in the 200-yard breaststroke.

Graduating in 1947, he earned a master's degree

at the University of Illinois, writing his thesis on the breast stroke. In 1951, he earned a doctorate from the University of Iowa, where his dissertation focused on the crawl stroke.

Counsilman joined the SUNY Cortland Physical Education Department faculty and became the swim coach in 1952. Over the next five years, he employed some of his soon-to-be famous swimming techniques to develop George Breen, a Cortland student athlete and future charter member of the C-Club Hall of Fame, into one of America's top swimmers, a world



By 1954, Counsilman was attracting national attention for his publications about the importance of improving the muscular strength of swimmers.

After leaving SUNY Cortland in 1957, he built Indiana University's swim program into one of the greatest dynasties in collegiate athletics. Over the next 33 years, Counsilman's squads posted a 285-41 record, including 18 undefeated seasons — 12 in a row — while winning 20 Big Ten titles and six straight NCAA national championships. His student-athletes included Olympian Mark Spitz, who won a record seven gold medals in 1972.

Counsilman coached the USA men's swim team to 9-of-11 gold medals at the 1964 Olympics in Tokyo and 12-of-13 gold medals at Montreal in 1976. The two other golds won at Tokyo were by international studentathletes on his Indiana team.

His research and innovations in stroke mechanics and training technique led him to write *The Science of Swimming*, now considered the bible of swimming instruction. He invented several swimming apparatuses that are staples in the sport today.

The Indian University-Bloomington's Counsilman/Billingsley Aquatic Center and the Counsilman Center for the Science of Swimming bear his name. The Indiana University Natatorium, located on the Indiana University-Purdue University of Indiana campus, was designed by Counsilman in 1982 and is one of the fastest pools in the world.

Counsilman died on Jan. 4, 2004 at the age of 83. He and his wife, Marge, had three children, Brian, Cathy and Jill, and five grandchildren.

Established in 1969, the C-Club Hall of Fame recognizes Cortland alumni who competed as athletes at the College and who have since distinguished themselves in their professions and within their communities. SUNY Cortland Today

Located atop one of the rolling hills in central New York's "City of Seven Valleys," the State University of New York College at Cortland was founded in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School. Over the years, the campus expanded and in 1941, by an act of Legislature and the Board of Regents, the institution officially became a four-year college providing courses leading to the bachelor's degree. In 1948, Cortland was a founding member of the State University.

In Fall 2005, a total of 7,210 students — 5,935 undergraduate and 1,275 graduate students, including 290 Certificate for Advanced Study students — are pursuing degrees within the College's three academic divisions — Education, Arts and Sciences and Professional Studies. Twenty-three academic departments with a faculty of more than 500 offer the SUNY Cortland student body some 100 programs from which to choose.

The College's main campus covers 191 acres and includes 38 buildings. Fifteen of these structures are residence halls providing on-campus housing for 2,800 students. Cortland also operates its Outdoor Education Center at Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks, which became SUNY's first National Historic Landmark in 2004, as well as Hoxie Gorge Nature Preserve near Cortland, and Brauer Memorial Geological Field Station near Albany.

At Cortland, athletics are viewed as having an important role in the educational mission of the College. During the fall, winter and spring seasons, Cortland participates

in 25 intercollegiate sports – 14 women's and 11 men's – in an attempt to provide a broad program which meets the needs, interests and abilities of its students.

The College offers its student-athletes excellent athletic facilities, including the nation's



finest small college outdoor stadium complex. Opened in 2002, the stadium has two artificial surface fields, seating for 6,500 at the main field and for 1,500 at the auxiliary field, a towering two-story press box, locker rooms, the Karel Horak Athletic Training Facility and the Carl "Chugger" Davis Building with administrative and ticket offices at the entrance. An eight-lane track and jumping pits surround the auxiliary field. State-of-the-art lighting serves the entire facility.

The Bessie L. Park '01 Center for Physical Education and Recreation features a main gym with seating for 3,600; an Olympic-sized swimming pool with gallery seating for 1,500; Alumni Arena which can accommodate 2,500 spectators for ice hockey; racquetball and squash courts, a wrestling room, the John L. Sciera '52 Athletic Training Room and the Francis Woods '56 Fitness Center. Lusk Field House, with its tartan-textured surface, is home to the indoor track teams. Cortland soccer teams play on Holloway Field. The College has 22 outdoor tennis courts.
