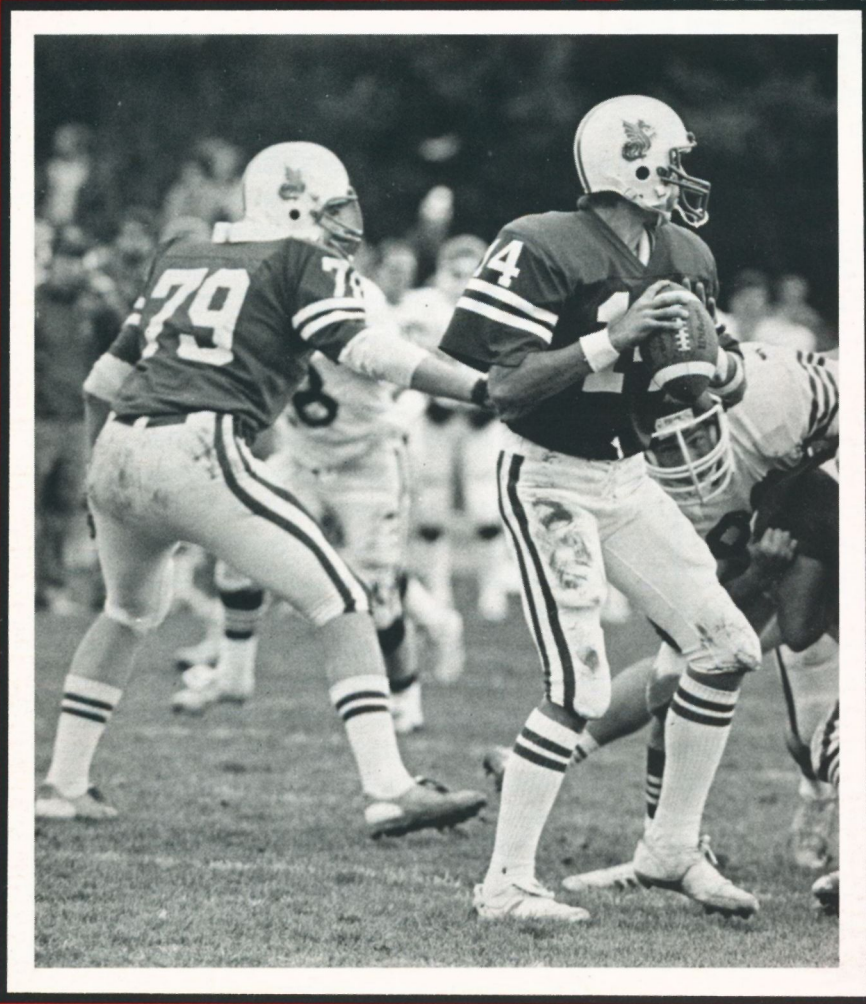
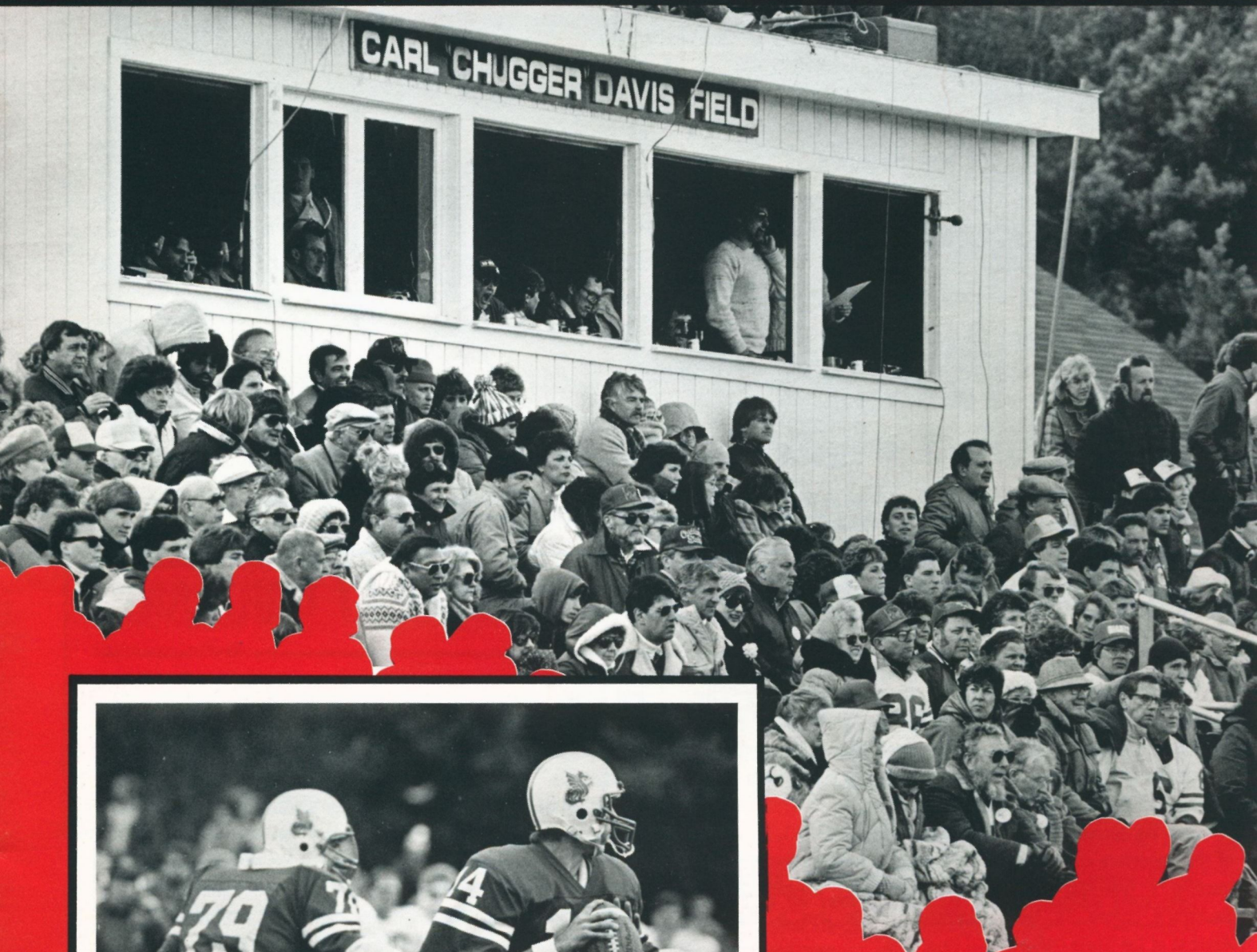

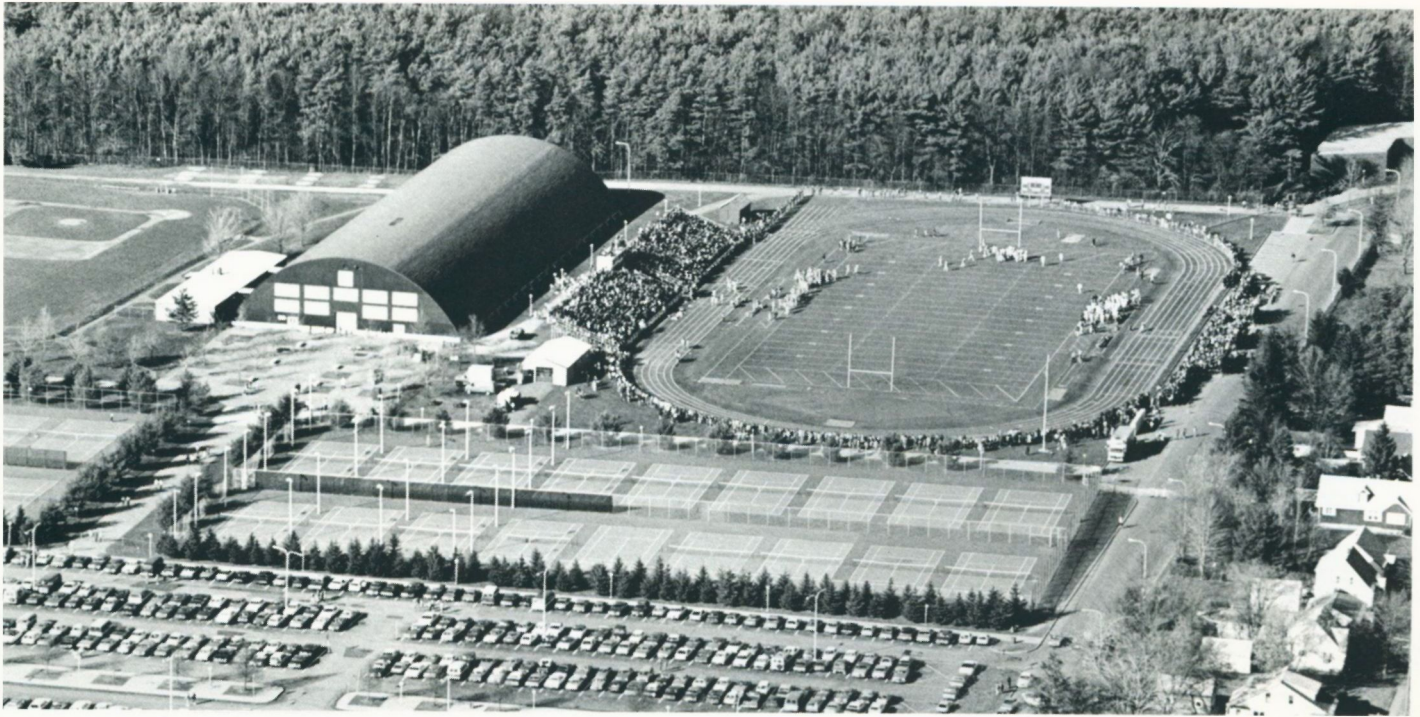

CORTLAND STATE FOOTBALL

Last autumn 19,485 people — an average of 3,897 per game — watched the Red Dragons play football at Davis Field. The home attendance figures, well over the national average, ranked Cortland State 16th among the 197 NCAA Division III football-playing institutions in 1984.

STATE UNIVERSITY OF NEW YORK COLLEGE AT CORTLAND

Located atop one of the rolling hills in central New York's "City of Seven Valleys," the State University of New York College at Cortland was founded in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School, which included among its earliest students inventor and industrialist Elmer A. Sperry of Sperry-Rand Corp. fame.

Over the decades, the campus expanded and in 1941, by an act of the legislature and the Board of Regents, the institution officially became a four-year college providing courses leading to the bachelor's degree. In 1948, Cortland College was a founding member of the State University of New York.

Today, more than 5,600 undergraduate and 600 graduate students are pursuing degrees within the College's two academic divisions — Arts & Sciences and Professional Studies. Twenty-three departments with a faculty of more than 30 offer the Cortland State student body some 40 majors from which to choose, including economics, biology, sociology, elementary and secondary education, physical education, health education and recreation to name a few.

The College's main campus covers 191 acres and includes 30 major buildings. Fourteen of these structures are residence halls providing on-campus housing for 2,600 students. Cortland also operates its Outdoor Education Center at Raquette Lake in the Adirondacks, the Hoxie Gorge Nature Preserve outside Cortland, and the Brauer Memorial Geological Field Station near Albany on the Helderberg Escarpment.

At Cortland State, athletics are viewed as having an important role in the educational mission of the College. During the fall, winter

and spring seasons, Cortland participates in 24 intercollegiate sports — 12 men's and 12 women's — in an attempt to provide a broad program which will meet the needs, interests and abilities of its students.

The stated objective of the College's athletic program is the development and welfare of the student. In the coaching of individual sports as well as in the direction of the overall athletic program, the College endeavors to provide a high calibre of professional leadership consistent with the goals of the institution.

Cortland State is particularly proud of its long tradition of intercollegiate athletics and its high standing in small college athletic circles. In support of this heritage, the College offers its student athletes — some 800 annually — a number of outstanding indoor and outdoor facilities for intercollegiate competition, as well as for educational and recreational purposes.

The Park Center for Physical Education and Recreation, opened in 1973, features a main gymnasium with a 3,600 seating capacity; an Olympic-sized swimming pool with gallery seating for 1,500; an ice arena which can accommodate 2,500 spectators; raquetball and squash courts, a wrestling room, and modern athletic training facilities. Nearby Lusk Field House, with its new tartan-textured surface, is home for the indoor track teams, varsity practice sessions and recreational activities. The Red Dragon football and lacrosse squads compete on Davis Field, with its 5,000 seating capacity. Cortland's soccer teams play on Holloway Field, which has lights for night contests. The College has 50 acres of athletic fields and 24 outdoor tennis courts.

HEAD COACH LARRY CZARNECKI

Beginning his third season as Cortland State head coach, Larry Czarnecki will stress the value of "team play" to his Red Dragon charges in 1985.

"It's important that this year's squad works on establishing a team concept," said the 34-year-old coach. "I was very disappointed in that area last year. We had great individual performances and efforts, but didn't play well as a team. As a consequence, when injuries came, we weren't able to compensate as a good team should."

Czarnecki demands a commitment, by both players and staff, as the cornerstone for a successful football program.

"My goal is for our student-athletes to get the most out of their participation in the Cortland State football program," said Czarnecki. "The commitment is now greater than it's ever been. The players have accepted the demands and have put forth the effort. Those who haven't have eliminated themselves. We now need to put together that commitment with the idea of a team concept."

As an Ithaca College defensive tackle in the 1970's, Czarnecki became a barometer of excellence. Czarnecki, in his senior year, was voted Kodak All-America, Associated Press All-America and the ECAC Upstate Player of the Year. He was an All-ECAC selection for two years, All-Upstate for three years, and all-conference for four seasons.

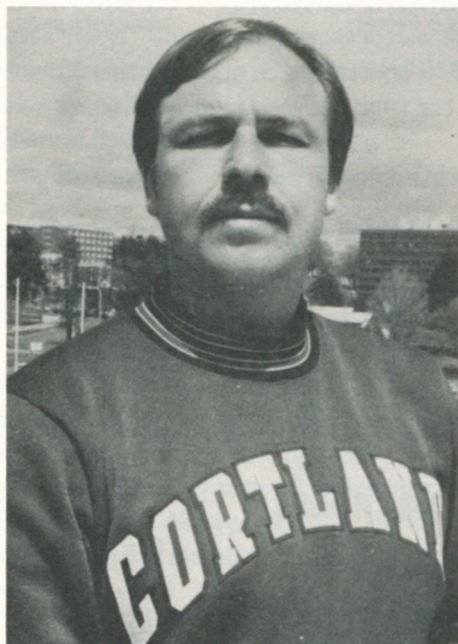
A native of Nanticoke, Pa., Czarnecki served two years in the U.S. Navy before attending Ithaca College. The 6-3, 240-pound tackle aided the Bombers in winning two Lambert Trophies while making two NCAA Div. III Championship game appearances. Czarnecki played semi-pro football with the Scranton Stars from 1976-78 and with the Binghamton Jets from 1979-80.

In 1976, Czarnecki graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in sports psychology from Ithaca College. The next year he earned a master's degree in sports psychology from the same institution.

Czarnecki, after graduation, joined the Ithaca College coaching staff as a defensive line coach and recruiter for northeastern Pennsylvania. In 1977, he became assistant varsity offensive line coach at Dartmouth, where he also coached the freshman defensive unit.

In 1978, Czarnecki joined the Cortland faculty as physical education instructor. He coached the Red Dragon defensive line before being named defensive coordinator in 1979. While at Cortland, Czarnecki established the Weight Training Club, served as interim head track coach, and has been an assistant track coach for seven seasons.

Larry and his wife, Deborah, their daughters, Jill, 4, and Kelly, 3, and newborn baby reside in Cortland, N.Y.

RED DRAGON COACHING STAFF

Matt Steenberg Offensive Coordinator

Matt Steenberg, starting his second season on the Dragon staff, moves from receiver coach to direct the Cortland offensive scheme in 1985. A Cortland State physical education department instructor, Matt posted impressive records as football and baseball coach between 1979-84 at Lansing High. He was selected as the Ithaca Journal's "Coach of the Year" in 1983.

Born in Sydney, N.Y., Matt attended Nottingham High in Syracuse. He attended Ithaca College, where he played on two NCAA Div. III national championship football teams. Matt also competed on the Ithaca baseball squad and was named the college's "Outstanding Scholar Athlete" in his senior year.

Matt earned a B.S. in Physical Education in 1977 and an M.S. in Physical Education in 1981 — both at Ithaca College. He assisted coaching football at Ithaca College in 1977 and at Chenango Forks High in 1978, prior to teaching health and driver's education at Lansing High in 1979.

Matt and his wife, Lynn, and their children, Chrysa, 4, Ryan, 2, and newborn Sara reside in Ithaca.

Jerry Casciani Linebackers

A member of the Cortland State faculty since 1970, Jerry Casciani played offensive and defensive back for Springfield College in the late 1950's. The Niagara Falls, N.Y., native earned his bachelor's degree from Springfield in 1959, his master's degree from Penn State in 1960, and his doctorate from West Virginia University in 1980.

Casciani played semi-pro football in Pennsylvania for two years and was an assistant coach at Manhasset (NY) High. Between 1964-67 he was head lacrosse coach and assistant football coach at Baltimore (MD) Junior College. Before coming to Cortland, Casciani served as Chairman of Health and Physical Education of the Northeastern District of York County, Pa.

The head men's lacrosse coach at Cortland for the past two seasons, Casciani has taken the Dragons to the NCAA Tournament twice while being named SUNYAC Coach of the Year in 1985. Casciani has also been both head and assistant wrestling coach at Cortland. He has coached linebackers from 1970-1975 and 1980 to the present.

Jerry and his wife, Judith Lee, and their children, Christopher, 16, and Jennifer, 13, reside in Cortland.

Gary Cassell Defensive Backs

Gary Cassell begins his fifth season on the Red Dragon football staff. A 1972 Cortland State graduate, Gary teaches physical education in the Cortland City School system.

The Cortland High golf coach since 1979, Gary previously directed the high school's lacrosse team between 1974-77 and was assistant football coach from 1973-79. While at Cortland State, Gary played football and lacrosse and later earned his master's degree from Cortland in 1973. He has assisted coaching the Red Dragon's men's varsity lacrosse teams.

Gary and his wife, Rita, and their children, Jim, 9, and Karen, 6, reside in Cortland.

Craig Reopell Junior Varsity

For the second consecutive season, Craig Reopell will coach the Red Dragon junior varsity. The newly-appointed athletic director and men's basketball coach at Tompkins-Cortland Community College in Dryden, N.Y., Craig was athletic director at St. Mary's School in Cortland last year.

A native of North Adams, Mass., Craig grew up in Hoosick Falls, N.Y. He served in the U.S. Air Force, then assisted coaching football at Salem (NY) High in

1979. He was assistant football and basketball coach at Hoosick Falls in 1980-81. During the next two seasons, Craig was assistant grid coach at Troy (NY) High and Laney High in Wilmington, N.C.

Craig earned an A.A.S. degree from Hudson Valley Community College in 1982 and a B.S.E. in Physical Education from Cortland State in 1984. During his senior year, Craig was a member of the Red Dragon basketball team.

Craig and his wife, Mary, who are expecting their first child in October, reside in Cortland.

Craig Cheplick Offensive Line

Joining the staff this season, Craig Cheplick will coach the offensive linemen. Since 1980, the Bath, N.Y., native has posted a 22-12-2 record while capturing a league title and statewide mention as Watkins Glen High head football coach. Craig was the offensive coordinator for two seasons prior to becoming head coach.

Craig attended Haverling Central High in Bath before matriculating to Dickinson College, where he lettered in both football, as a running back, and lacrosse. Craig earned his bachelor's degree from Dickinson in 1978 and an M.S. in Education from Elmira College in 1984. He has taught history at Watkins Glen High for past six years.

Craig and his wife, Libby, reside in Watkins Glen.

Edward Redmond Receivers

Returning to his alma mater, Ed Redmond joins the Red Dragon staff as the receiver coach. A 1981 Cortland State graduate, Ed lettered three seasons as a Dragon third baseman, winning All-SUNYAC honors as a senior.

A native of Amsterdam, N.Y., Ed attended Ithaca High, lettering in football, basketball and baseball. He earned a B.S.E. in Health Education from Cortland State in 1981. From 1982-83, Ed coached football and taught health at Candor (NY) High where he instructs health and driver's education. Ed assisted with football and coached the Lansing baseball squad to the league championship.

Ed and his wife, Amy, who are expecting their first child in February, reside in Ithaca.



CORTLAND 1985 OUTLOOK

At the outset of the 1985 season, the Red Dragons will be an enigma to their gridiron foes. In recent years, opposing defenses geared themselves for one all-consuming task — to stop Dave Cook. For the first time since 1980, Cortland must pattern an offense that doesn't include its All-America ballcarrier.

"We're not going to try to replace a Dave Cook," said third-year Dragon mentor Larry Czarnecki. "He was a super player who responded to every challenge placed upon him. He can't be replaced."

"It's a challenge for us to really open up the offense. When you have a talent like Dave Cook, you use it. When you don't, you open up and utilize the offensive tools you have. And we have a lot of those tools to tap. We feel our greatest strength is in our receiving corps. Although we didn't throw much last year, we learned alot about throwing. Our offensive line is solid and we plan on passing much more this season.

"Certainly our philosophy of controlling the offense by running the ball isn't going to be abandoned. We've got a number of backs who want to prove themselves. We need someone to step in and show the confidence needed to be a standout. Along with the glory comes pressure. It takes a special individual to be able to handle it.

"Defensively, when we played well, we won. When we didn't, we lost. My background is in defense. I feel strongly about it. We will be a good defensive team this year. We lost a few people in the secondary. Our strength is certainly up front. We're looking to fill some linebacker positions. Our biggest problem defensively last year was we lost confidence. To dominate on defense, you have to be confident and aggressive."

The Dragons, who drop to a nine-game schedule in 1985, will be in search of a winning season.

"You've got to start somewhere," said Czarnecki. "There's only been one winning football season at Cortland since 1972, so, consequently for us, the starting point is a winning season. Last year we were buzzing right along but then didn't have the depth to handle injuries. We expect to have better depth at key positions this fall. We've only been a game away from winning seasons in the last two years. We have our sights set higher, but winning season would be a very realistic goal for this team."

And in-depth look at the '85 Dragons follows:

OFFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Dave Cook is gone. Junior RB Brian Altmann, who averaged 7.4 yards-per-carry before an injury against Buffalo State ended his season, returns. Todd Hobin, an exceptional athlete who punted and played WR and QB in '84, moves to the backfield. Junior RB Jeff Austin, who averaged 21.8 yards-per-return on kickoffs in '84, also is back. Sophs Mike Vela and Dave Pitcher both saw some action last autumn in the backfield. Brad Romens, a LB a year ago, will try his hand at carrying the ball. Steve Pisciotta, a Dragon track sprinter, will make his RB debut. The starting QB spot is up for grabs. Juniors Joe Ruyack (34-of-91 for 518 yards, 2 TDs, 9 INT's) and Paul Grazioplene (24-of-52 for 328 yards, 3 TD's, 2 INT's) have split the starting role — because of injuries — for two years. Grazioplene was the better of the two in '84, but his season-ending injury at Brockport hurt the Dragon attack. A healthy Grazioplene could have the inside track in pre-season. Junior QB John Dargle showed leadership qualities as QB in the win against SLU. Soph Rich Keefer, who owns the strongest arm among the hopefuls, sat out the '84 campaign with an ankle injury.

RECEIVERS

Without a doubt, the best athletes on the '85 Dragon unit are found in the receiving corps, says Czarnecki. The Dragons didn't pass much last autumn, but return excellent targets this year. WR Phil Lane (19 for 301 yds.), WR Paul Bearup (7 for 128 yds.), and WR Mike Pohleven (5 for 40 yds.) combine great speed, outstanding hands, and excellent strength. Cortland basketball standout David Goodridge will also be seeking a WR spot. At TE, senior Reid Raleigh will be competing for a starting berth with Bill Murphy, a QB last season, JV product Dave Falco, and Albany transfer Paul Gugerty.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Cortland has viewed its offensive line as a mainstay for years now. That picture won't change with an experienced unit in '85. OC Bob Hotaling (6-1, 240) is one of the best in Div, III, says Czarnecki. A premier one-on-one blocker who played the entire '84 season injured. Senior OT Alan Wohlford (6-6, 250) and OT Craig Millard (6-3, 230) who started as a soph, will receive help from Jim Mangano and Greg Puccia. Three experienced OG's — Dino Dutcher (5-11, 230), Jim Mango (5-10, 225), and Jim O'Connell (6-2, 218) — will compete for the starting positions. Other OG's include junior John Nichols and Bob Sala, a jayvee player last year.

DEFENSIVE LINE

The Red Dragons return intact at defensive line. Senior DT Paul Falsone (6-1, 260), an All-ECAC and All-America selection over the past two campaigns, felt he had an "off-year" with 10 tackles-per-game in '84. Senior DE Mark Cowdery (6-3, 242), in only three years of organized football, has pro scouts interested in him. Cowdery led the Dragons with eight QB sacks last fall. Vying for the other DT will be: Tim Felicia (6-1, 220), Jim French (6-0, 215), and Jeff Dunning (5-11, 215). Senior DE Jim Spanbauer (6-0, 202) must stave off soph Dave Moskov (6-3, 230) and Eric Hartz (5-11, 225), both on the JV's a year ago, for a starting role.

LINEBACKERS

Senior All-America LB Tony Zawadzki (6-0, 195), the Dragons' leading tackler in both '83 and '84, had 136 stops last year. An instinctive LB, Zawadzki will move from MLB to the strong side LB, a shift he made in the final '84 contest. The Dragons must find a MLB replacement. Bob Caldarelli, Larry Mooney and Clyde Hawley are leading candidates. The weak side LB spot will be competitive, with Dave Oddo (5-10, 190) the frontrunner here. Jeff Kisloski, an experienced player, Brockport State transfer Bob Viscardi, and Jim Combs provide the competition.

DEFENSIVE BACKFIELD

Cortland has lost some veterans here, but Czarnecki still has good athletes remaining, most with valuable experience. SS Tom Addy, despite an injury, played in five games last year. Senior CB Zeke Zilka, who had 48 tackles in '84, moves back to the secondary after a year's stint at LB. Two outstanding athletes, FS Adam Schumacher and CB Jerry Irion, will compete with seasoned CB's Tom Dexter and Russ Davis, the latter a starter two years ago who didn't play in '84, and UB transfer Jim Romano.

KICKER/PUNTER

The Dragons must find a kicker during the pre-season. But Todd Hobin, who last year was sixth among Upstate New York punters with his 34.9 yds-per-punt average, has given Cortland stability in its punting game.

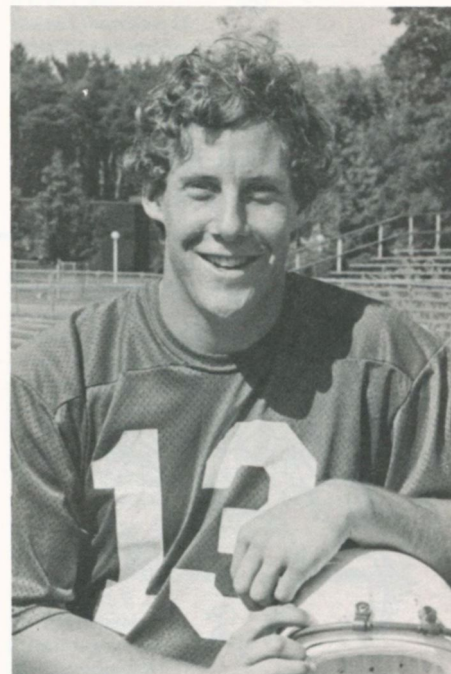
