From 1984 until 1987, Murray was an assistant football coach directing the linebackers at Dartmouth College. Murray served as the defensive coordinator at Cortland from 1987 until his appointment as head coach in 1990.

Personal: A lecturer in the Cortland College Physical Education Department, Murray was born January 17, 1958 in Schenectady, N.Y. He graduated from Scotia-Glenville High School. He and his wife, Karin, and their daughters, Chelsea, 6, and Kailea, 2, reside in Cortland.

On Cortland College: "Prospective student-athletes should come to Cortland, number one, because of the academics, and that's what we tell our recruits. This school has so much to offer in all the majors that we have here. Our players love Cortland College. They enjoy the academic part of the college. They enjoy the football part of the college. SUNY College at Cortland

Located atop one of the rolling hills in central New York's "City of Seven Valleys," the State University of New York College at Cortland was founded in 1868 as the Cortland Normal School, which included among its earliest students the inventor and industrialist Elmer A. Sperry of Sperry-Rand Corp. frame.

Today more than 5,600 undergraduate and 600 graduate students are pursuing degrees within the College's two academic schools - Arts & Sciences and Professional Studies. Twenty-three departments with a faculty of more than 300 offer the Cortland College student body some 100 major programs from which to choose.

At Cortland, athletics are viewed as having an important role in the educational mission of the College. During the fall, winter and spring seasons, Cortland participates in 23 intercollegiate sports - 11 men's and 12 women's - in an attempt to provide a broad program which meets the needs, interests and abilities of its students.

The College offers its 800 student-athletes who participate each year excellent athletic facilities. The Park Center for Physical Education and Recreation, opened in 1973, features a main gymnasium with a 3,600 seating capacity; an Olympic-sized swimming pool with gallery seating for 1,500; an ice arena which can accommodate 2,500 spectators; racquetball and squash courts, a wrestling room, modern athletic training facilities and the state-of-the-art Francis Woods Fitness Center.

Nearby Lusk Field House, with its tartan-textured surface, is home for the indoor track teams, varsity practice sessions and recreational activities. The Red Dragon football and lacrosse squads compete on Davis Field with its 5,000 seating capacity. Cortland soccer teams play on Holloway Field, which has lights for night contests. The College also has 50 acres of athletic fields and 24 outdoor tennis courts.

The 1993-94 academic year marks the 125th anniversary for State University of New York College at Cortland.

Founded in 1868 as a State Normal School preparing elementary school teachers, Cortland expanded to a four-year college in 1938 and 10 years later became a charter member of State University of New York. In 1961, Cortland undertook a new role as a comprehensive college offering degrees in liberal arts and sciences in addition to those in professional studies and teacher education.

1993 Cortland Coaching Staff

Greg Burton Defensive Line

Greg Burton begins the second season of his second stint as a Red Dragon coach. The 1986 Cortland graduate served as a junior varsity assistant from 1983-1986, and was the Red Dragons' defensive line coach last fall. Burton also worked as an assistant at Cornell from 1981-82 and at Ithaca in 1988.

From 1989-91, he was an instructor and associate chair of physical education and wellness at Wilkes University in Pennsylvania. While at Wilkes, the Homer High alumnus also served as a football assistant coach and head men's tennis coach.

Currently pursuing his master's degree at Ithaca College, Burton is self-employed and resides in Homer, N.Y. with his wife Lisa.

David Falco Receivers

David Falco, after finishing his playing career as the all-time reception leader at Cortland, begins his fifth season as Red Dragon receivers coach. Pursuing a master's degree in physical education at Cortland, Falco was an all-ECAC receiver in 1986.

Falco caught 101 passes for 1,132 yards and eight TD's as a flanker at Cortland. A native of Lake Grove, N.Y., he lettered in football, baseball and basketball at Sachem High. Falco earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Cortland in 1989. He is single and resides in Cortland.

Tony Fruscio Junior Varsity Head Coach

Tony Fruscio, a defensive back for the Red Dragons the past four seasons, remains with the Cortland football program in 1993 as its junior varsity head coach.

Fruscio recorded 60 tackles for the Red Dragons in 1992, fourth-best on the team. He also intercepted two passes and tied a school single-season record with three blocked kicks. A versatile athlete, Fruscio also played on Cortland's varsity basketball squad during his senior year.

A native of Watervliet, N.Y., Fruscio was a football and basketball standout at Watervliet High School, graduating in 1989. He is single and resides in the Cortland area.

C.C. Grant Running Backs

C.C. Grant will serve as Cortland's running backs coach this fall after serving as the Red Dragon junior varsity head coach in 1992. C.C., a junior varsity assistant coach in 1991, was a star fullback for the Red Dragons, finishing his Cortland career in 1990. He was the team's leading rusher and scorer in 1989. He holds a B.S.E. degree in physical education from the college and is currently pursuing his master's degree.

Grant attended both Hudson Valley and Monroe County Community Colleges before matriculating at Cortland. A native of Marion, N.Y., he lettered in football, wrestling and basketball at Williamson High School. He placed fifth in New York at 215 pounds for a Williamson wrestling squad that won a state championship.

C.C., whose full name is Ulysses Montgomery Grant Jr., is single and resides in the Cortland area.

Mike Kemp Quarterbacks

Mike Kemp returns for his third season as Cortland's quarterback coach. The running back and strength coach at the University of Pennsylvania in 1990, Kemp is a lecturer in the College's physical education department.

The 42-year old native of Brockport, N.Y. attended the University of Notre Dame on a wrestling scholarship. A three-year starter and wrestling team captain as a senior, Kemp also competed for three seasons as a walk-on defensive back for the Fighting Irish football squad. Kemp majored in pre-med and graduated from Notre Dame in 1975.

He owned and operated the Nautilus Athletic Center in Brockport between 1978 and 1983. Meanwhile, he was also an assistant wrestling coach at Churchville (NY) High from 1975-78, assistant football coach at Rush-Henrietta Roth High in 1977, assistant football coach at Brockport High from 1978-79, and assistant wrestling coach at Spencerport High in 1979.

Between 1980 and 1983, Kemp was head wrestling coach at Monroe Community College as well as defensive coordinator and strength coach for the Brockport State football team. In 1984, Kemp entered graduate school at Springfield College. While there, he was an assistant football coach working with the quarterbacks and receivers and directed the strength and conditioning program.

Kemp earned a Master of Physical Education degree in Athletic Administration from Springfield in May, 1986. The following month, he earned his certification as a strength and conditioning specialist from the National Strength and Conditioning Association.

During the 1986-87 academic year, Kemp taught and coached at St. Lawrence University, where he was offensive coordinator and strength and conditioning coach. Kemp was head strength and assistant football coach at the University of Connecticut from 1987-89. At the University of Pennsylvania in 1990, Kemp worked with the running backs and placekickers in addition to his duties as strength coach.

A former state of Connecticut director for the National Strength and Conditioning Association, Kemp has been an instructor at numerous football camps. Kemp resides in Cortland with his wife, Katharine, and their three-year old daughter, Stephanie Lynn.

1993 Dragons Face ECAC's Toughest Division III Schedule, Aim for Sixth Straight Post-Season Bid

The 1993 season marks the centennial of Cortland's inaugural football program, and current head coach Dave Murray would like no better way for his Red Dragons to celebrate the occasion than with a sixth consecutive post-season bid.

"I think the centennial celebration means a lot to us," commented the fourth-year Cortland mentor. "It makes our players aware of the pride you have when you put on a Cortland football helmet. Just to be a part of this kind of tradition is special. We obviously want to make this year something to remember."

The most coveted 1993 momento, according to Murray, would be a trip to the NCAA Division III playoffs. Cortland made NCAA appearances in 1988, 1989 and 1990 before capturing ECAC Northwest titles the past two seasons.

"If we're going to be the caliber team we want to be," Murray said, "we need to work to get into the NCAA playoffs. It means we have to win at least eight games on this year's schedule."

That's no easy feat. In 1992, the NCAA football selection committee ranked Cortland's schedule the toughest in the East. The Red Dragons face the identical 10 teams as in 1992, when they posted a 6-4 regular season mark before defeating Bentley College, the nation's top-ranked defensive unit, in the ECAC playoffs.

Coming to Davis Field, where the Red Dragons are 30-3 since 1987, will be NCAA Division III runner-up Washington and Jefferson and NCAA quarterfinalist Buffalo State. Cortland also

travels to NCAA participant Ithaca for the annual "Cortaca Jug" clash, and battles with regional powers Ferrum, Montclair State and three Division II foes — Mansfield, Springfield and Southern Connecticut.

"I'm very happy with our schedule, and I think the players are too," Murray remarked. "What we learned last year is that there are no Saturdays off — we have to be a heck of a football team every week. We also learned that there's not a single team on the schedule that we can't beat. As a coach or as a player, you want to go against the best that there is. You find out how good you are when you do that."

This year's Red Dragon squad may only be as good as the player calling out the signals. For the first time since Murray came to Cortland as an assistant coach in 1987, the starting quarterback position will be wide open when the season commences.

Leading the pack of quarterback candidates are two players who saw most of their action on the junior varsity level last season. Sophomore Steve Sanzo started last season with the Red Dragon JV squad before taking over second-string varsity duties in late September, while sophomore Jimmy Berkowitz was the JV's starting signalcaller most of the season. Sanzo's varsity experience appears to give him a slight edge in the battle for the starting position.

"Steve has tremendous potential," Murray noted. "It's just a matter of quickly he can adjust to running the offense." Sanzo completed just 2-of-6 passes for 33 yards in three regular season games last year, but did toss a touchdown pass in the ECAC playoff victory over Bentley.

Three of last season's top four rushers return to make the Red Dragon backfield the most experienced component of Cortland's Multiple-I offense. 1992 ECAC Upstate New York "Rookie of the Year" Lamont McPherson comes off a freshman campaign in which he appeared in all 10 regular season games, starting seven, while leading the club with 551 yards rushing. The quick tailback ran for three touchdowns last year and also proved to be a capable short-threat receiver, gathering in 20 passes for 204 yards and a score.

Joining McPherson in the backfield are a pair of experienced seniors — tailback Mike Degnan and fullback Bert Conklin. Degnan gained 436 yards on 87 carries and led the Red Dragons with eight touchdown runs a year ago. Conklin, a short-yardage specialist, plowed into the end zone seven times last year despite rushing for only 154 yards.

Junior wide receiver Steve Ellis and senior tight end Jeff Matthews, both All-ECAC Upstate New York selections last season, return as the club's top two 1992 reception leaders. Ellis caught 49 passes, the most of any Upstate New York receiver, for 654 yards and one touchdown. In addition, Ellis returned a team high 15 punts. Matthews, also an excellent run blocker for the Red Dragons, hauled in 34 passes for 369 yards and two scores.

Chris Lafferty Offensive Line

Chris Lafferty begins his first season as a Cortland varsity coach and third year overall in the Red Dragon program. Lafferty will handle the offensive line coaching duties this fall after working as a junior varsity assistant in 1991 and 1992.

Lafferty was a standout offensive lineman for the Red Dragons from 1986 to 1990. He was a first team Champion U.S.A. All-America selection during his senior season and was a pre-season All-America honoree in 1989. He earned a B.S. degree in geology in 1990 and a M.A.T. in Secondary Science in May of 1993. A native of Warsaw, N.Y., Chris attended Cuba Central High School. He is single and resides in Cortland.

Dave Mancuso Secondary

Now in his fourth season with the Cortland varsity coaching staff, former Red Dragon team captain Dave Mancuso begins his second season as the team's secondary coach. Mancuso worked with outside linebackers in 1991, and in 1990 coached the Cortland State junior varsity.

A native of Bowmansville, N.Y., Mancuso graduated from Lancaster High School where he lettered in football, wrestling and track. He studied at Hudson Valley Community College before attending Cortland. A strong safety during his playing days, Mancuso was the fourth leading tackler with 51 stops during Cortland's undefeated 1988 season. He earned a B.S.E. degree in physical education in 1989 and a master's degree in physical education in 1990 from Cortland. A part-time lecturer in the Cortland Physical Education Department, Mancuso is single and resides in Cortland.

One receiving void to be filled is at flanker with the loss of both starter Kevin Hartman (32 catches for 554 yards) and backup Ross Ricco (six catches, 101 yards).

Cortland's success on the gridiron in recent years has been linked to a balanced offensive attack. "Our goal is to throw the football at least 50 percent of the time. We want to have a good mix of rushing and passing like last season (424 rushes, 305 passes)," Murray commented. "I think we'll be able to throw the football well. The thing that will be somewhat of a question mark is our offensive line."

Cortland's offensive line was considered perhaps the strongest area of the team heading into last season. However, the loss of four starters — including honorable mention Champion U.S.A. All-American Nino Corbo — leaves a number of gaps to be filled this autumn. Senior tackle Rob Hughes returns after starting much of last season. Bill Spicer saw limited starting duties at center and guard, while Matt Armstrong is a solid candidate to earn a first-string spot on the line. "We have a lot of quality transfers and freshmen coming in on the offensive line," Murray noted. "We think we have some people who can step up and play right away."

On the other side of the ball, the strength of the Cortland's 4-3 defense lies with a group of seasoned linebackers. Leading the charge in senior Sam Owens, the team's top returning tackler from last season with 73 stops, including a career-high 22 tackles versus Washington and Jefferson. Classmate Jason McCard registered 55 tackles last season, among which were a team-leading three sacks. Other linebackers in the mix will include senior Kevin Nace, who appeared in all 10 contests last season, and junior varsity promotions Drew Romanowski and Mike Williams. Returning starters Joe Florio, a junior tackle, and Sean Lynch, a senior end, look to bolster Cortland's defensive line this season. Both started all 10 regular season games last fall, with Florio recording 28 tackles and Lynch registering 22 stops. Junior tackle Kevin Jordan (16 tackles) also appears to be an early favorite for a starting assignment, with Romanowski, Kevin Long and East Stroudsburg University transfer Renny Spencer among a group of players battling for a starting position.

Junior free safeties Jason Dudek and Steve Dimitroff return to anchor Cortland's secondary in 1993. Dudek started every game last season for the Red Dragons, finishing sixth on the squad with 35 tackles in addition to intercepting two passes and breaking up four others. Dimitroff appeared in seven games, recording 13 tackles and one pass deflection. Starting positions at strong safety are open with the loss of J.J. Graham and Tony Fruscio from last season's club. Seniors Chris Dickson and John Conte are pre-season favorites to fill those roles in 1993.

Special teams will again be an important area to watch on the Red Dragons' squad this season. Junior All-ECAC selection Tom Bierworth (36.5 yds/kick) and sophomore Dave Aierstok appear to be the top two candidates at punter, while sophomore Adam Perry (23-27 PAT, 6-11 FG) returns after serving as the team's starting placekicker. Both positions are open for the taking according to Murray. "The nice thing about kickers is that we chart every kick in practice," Murray said. "Whoever has the best numbers for us is who we use in the games. We encourage competition among our kickers throughout the season."

Despite question marks in certain areas as the season opens, Murray is optimistic about his team's chances at another successful campaign. "We have a tremendous group of upperclassmen who are all excellent football players," Murray notes, "and now we just have to make sure we get the complement of the younger guys mixing in. I think we have the potential to be a pretty good ball club."

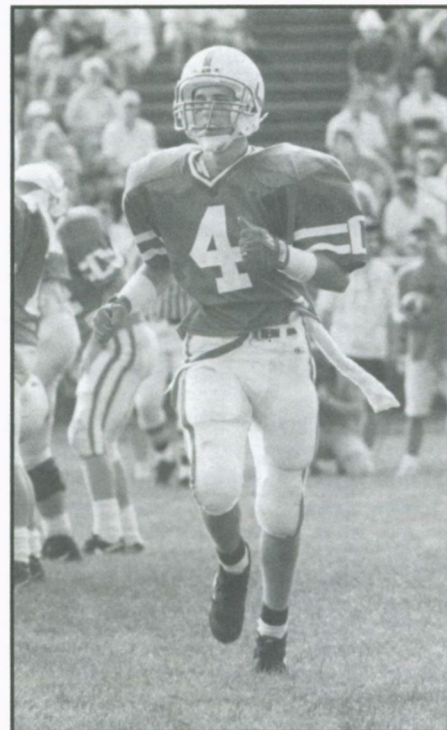

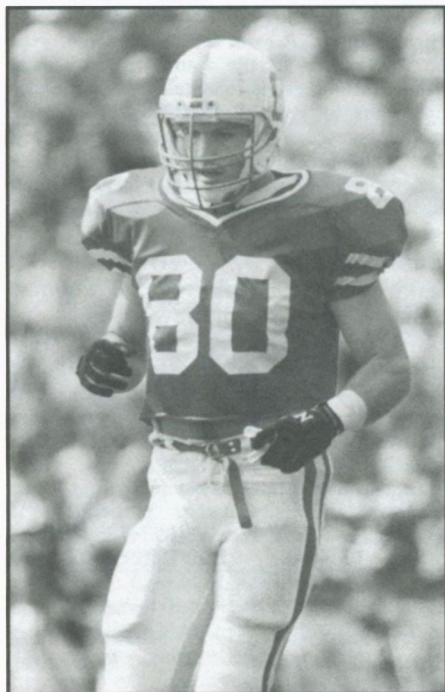

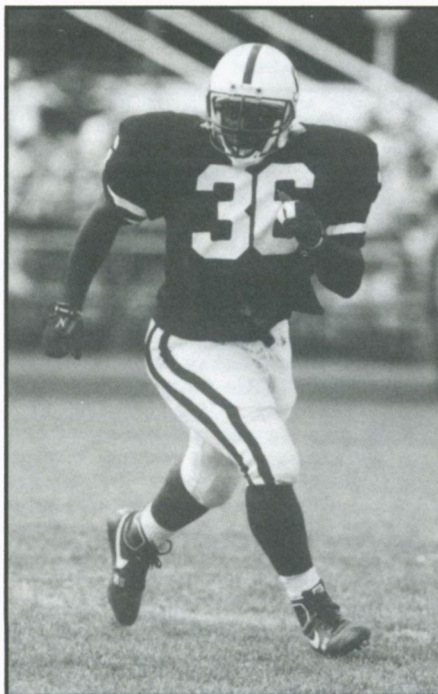

Cortland Football Celebrates Its First Century

The pounding of horses headed toward every corner of Dryden, NY, interrupted a quiet Monday afternoon on Sept. 18, 1893. Only an hour or so earlier, a group of boys clad in padded leather pants arrived in town after a 10-mile trek from the Cortland Normal School. These young men, members of the newly organized Normal football team, had come to play Dryden Academy.

Unfortunately, upon their arrival, the "Normals" discovered that the Dryden squad, which had challenged them to a game a few weeks before, had since disbanded. As a gesture of good will, the former Dryden team captain made an effort to regroup his charges. Scurrying to their steeds, the Dryden boys rode into the countryside in search of their erstwhile teammates.

By 3:30 p.m. that afternoon, the long history of Cortland football was about to unfold.

Founded 25 years earlier, Cortland Normal School, like other normal schools in New York State, attracted young men who wanted to attend college but could not afford expensive academies or prep schools. Normal schools both prepared students for college and qualified them to teach.

From the start, the Cortland Normal students took to athletics. By the 1880s, the school had a baseball team. In the 1890s, the school held physical culture exercises as part of its regular curriculum. The student newspaper extolled the virtues of a sound body as well as a sound mind. Thus, when one alumnus, A.D. Call '92, returned to Cortland Normal from Brown University in 1893, he found receptive ears to his interest in coaching a football unit.

During the first week of the 1893 fall term, the Cortland Normal Football Association was formed and officers were chosen — Henry E. Hubbard '94 of Dryden, NY, president; Thomas H. DeCourdes '95 of McLean, NY, vice president; Lew Fralick '94 of Cortland, NY, secretary; and Charles Wright '95, treasurer.

When the Cortland Normal team ventured to Dryden for its first game, the Normals faced one of the best academy football teams in the state — a squad that boasted former varsity players from Cornell and Yale Universities. Other Dryden starters were being highly recruited by local colleges.

On Cortland's first possession, the Normals moved 15 yards before losing the ball on a foul. Despite standout defensive play by Cortland's William E. Brown Jr. '95 of West Dryden, NY, Dryden scored four touchdowns — each counting four points — and added a two-point goal kick for an 18-0 halftime lead.

Normal team captain R.E. Corlew's spirited intermission pep talk centered on keeping Dryden from further advances upon the Cortland goalline. The Normals, however, were overmatched. Dryden scored twice in only a few minutes. Then, Cortland's Hubbard, behind a crushing lead block from Berton Landpher '96 of Freetown, NY, raced "like the wind" for the first touchdown in Cortland football annals. Neither team threatened a score in the final 30 minutes of play and Dryden emerged 26-4 victors.

The Cortland players, however, savored their first taste of football. There would be no turning back as their appetite for the game grew. On their very next outing, the Normals recorded their first victory — a 6-4 defeat of Binghamton High in ankle-deep Southern Tier mud. Football had found a home at Cortland.

Sharing a Football Tradition

Today, 100 years and many more hundreds of football wins, losses and ties later, Cortland itself has grown into a full-fledged institution of higher learning. In 1938, the Cortland Normal School became Cortland State Teachers College and in 1948 the institution became the State University of New York College at Cortland. Through every name change, one distinctive Cortland College trait has remained unaltered — the school's infatuation with the sport of football.

During the past century, thousands of Cortland students have proudly worn the school colors on the gridiron. The disastrous 1919 Normal School fire, a brief decline in male enrollment and World War II all presented brief obstacles to Cortland fielding a football squad. In each case, the effect was ephemeral. Football always returned.

This autumn, when the nationally ranked and defending ECAC Northwest champion Cortland State football team members take the field they will share a common thread that binds them with a century-old, colorful past. It's a history that includes triumphs and failures, unusual characters, exciting games, and memories that have endured lifetimes.

Those who played football for Cortland will, for better or worse, never forget that experience. During this Centennial Football Celebration on campus, we honor these individuals for their commitment and accomplishments as Cortland student-athletes in the sport of football. But we're also proud of their post-graduate accomplishments. Former Cortland football players have successfully pursued the full gamut of professions. Across the state, numerous high school football fields today bear the names of many Cortland alumni who carried an ideal that we hope, in some fashion, took shape in our classrooms and on our athletic fields.

Times change but the lessons of football remain the same. In 1964, then-Cortland College President Kenneth Young, sitting in the stands watching the Homecoming football game, told a Binghamton Press reporter his philosophy on football at Cortland College.

"In any athletic activity, we are thrown upon our own resources to succeed or fail in the face of a strong and immediate challenge," explained Young. "Games resemble life in capsule form, and the participant quickly learns that his performance depends upon the development of strength, stamina, self-discipline and a sure and steady judgement. Football exemplifies these qualities and that is

why State University College at Cortland includes football among the wide range of sport activities."

Cortland. The small college state school. One of the remaining bastions of the true spirit of collegiate football. There are no scholarships here. Never had them, never will. As a result, Cortland players aren't judged by the amount of an athletic scholarship, but by their desire to win. Cortland student-athletes play football because they love the game. That is just as true in 1993 as it was way back in the autumn of 1893.

1893-1916: The Early Years

As a Normal School, Cortland played the bulk of its contests against local high schools and academies until the 1920s. During the 1895 and 1896 seasons, the Normals posted a combined 10-1 record. The lone loss, a 6-0 decision in 1895 to Ithaca High, resulted in part, according to the Cortland Normal News, because the game was played under "Cornell rules" when Cortland had practiced using "Yale-Princeton rules."

Early in the 1897 season, the Normal recent record extended to 13-1-1 before Cortland faced its first collegiate competition – the Cornell freshmen. An 18-0 Cornell win was marred by accusations that someone passed along the Cortland signals to Cornell so that the Big Red knew each Normal play being called.

The next week, Cortland held powerful Syracuse to 24 points in a 24-0 loss at the Cortland Fairgrounds. Normal was led by its powerful ends, Clyde Griswold, who later starred at Amherst College, and the legendary William "Boogie" Mills. Normal guard George Moore would win seven letters in baseball and football at Syracuse, while halfback and team captain Arthur Robinson made his mark at Princeton. Cortland also tied Mansfield Normal 4-4 that season. Mansfield, the current-day Mansfield University, became a regular Cortland foe over the years.

The turn-of-the-century found Cortland football flourishing. The undefeated 1899 unit blanked Mansfield Normal 22-0. On Oct. 6, 1900, Cortland downed Colgate University 11-6 in Hamilton, NY. Cortland captain Frank Pierce would later make Walter Camp's All-America Team as an Amherst College tackle. The Normals, who featured Boogie Mills and quarterback C.J. Kelley of Cortland, NY, beat the Syracuse University reserves 16-6. The 1902 Normals, considered by contemporaries to be the best Cortland team to date, went 6-1 including an 18-6 win over an Onondaga Indian team. Its only loss, 31-0, was to the Alexandria Bay (NY) town team.

Without a uniformity of rules came a disparity in the length of the football contests during that era. In 1901, for example, Cortland

competed in one game that had a 20-minute and a 15-minute half. Another contest that same year was played in 20- and 25-minute halves, and another in two 20-minute halves. The various game lengths continued for some years.

Cortland's coaches during its nascent years were many. Rev. John T. Stone of Glen Haven, NY, coached Cortland in the late 1890s. A fellow named Davis was identified as the "coacher" in 1901. Amherst College graduate Layton S. Hawkins, who taught science at Cortland Normal between 1904-1912, coached football for several seasons. Myron J. Walter, another science instructor, and Cornell alumni and Cortland Normal agriculture instructors A. Kendall Green and Lee Crittenden, all followed Hawkins as head football mentors.

After the 6-2-1 season in 1904, Cortland's football fortunes, and its male enrollment, both began to sink.

"As tax-supported public high schools became available in more communities, the normal schools served that population less," reported Dr. Leonard Ralston in his history of Cortland College. "Furthermore, young men who intended to teach increasingly found that a college degree gave them access to better paying, more desirable teaching jobs."

A general student decline started in 1900 and fell 40 percent in the next five years. Women always outnumbered male students, but between 1905 and the early 1920s, male students comprised less than 10 percent of the annual Cortland student enrollment. As a result, the football team suffered.

In 1906, St. Lawrence beat Cortland 32-0. With their ranks decimated, the Normals wouldn't face another collegiate unit until the 1920s. Cortland did crush Oswego Normal in 1913 and 1914 and blanked a Mansfield Normal alumni eleven 13-0 in 1915. For the most part, though, the Cortland Normals focused on local high schools and academies. Between 1903 and 1916, the squad developed a spirited crosstown rivalry with Cortland High School.

After a series of mediocre Normal gridiron campaigns, the Cortland Standard in 1912 lamented the malaise which gripped the football program: "The Normals...seem to be at war with themselves, and it is impossible to get a whole team together. The team started from this city Saturday morning with but ten players and where the other was to be secured was a puzzle to most of the players...It is too bad with an agricultural school and fully fifty men to pick from that the Normals cannot have a good team. Ten years ago the Normals were considered as good as any team in the state...But today we have no Red Downs, Bill Gleasons or Dick Gleasons, not even a Dory Pearsons or Boogie Mills. These were boys who put their all in Normal. Some day perhaps, the Normal school will have a team that will equal that old team that won so many games for this city, but we will have to wait a number of years for it."

In 1915, the Normals went 3-4-3 without a coach. After beating Union-Endicott High 7-6 in 1916, the Cortland Normal football jerseys were packed away for the next eight years. Low enrollments, World War I and the fire which destroyed the Normal School in 1919 all combined to prevent Cortland from offering a football team between 1917 and 1923. When football finally did return, though, Cortland was ready to embark upon a new era.

1924-1931: Phys Ed Program Attracts Players

In 1923, Cortland Normal opened the doors on its newly constructed facility – which we call Old Main today – atop a hill used as farmland overlooking the city. Not only was Normal in a new location, it had a new mission – physical education.

Since 1916, the New York State Physical Education Law required "competent" teachers to spend an average of 20 minutes daily in

physical training for all students over eight years of age. Cortland Normal Principal Harry DeGroat and faculty member Bessie Park '01 successfully lobbied the State Commissioner to approve Cortland Normal's proposal to offer an innovative physical education curriculum. Cortland's reputation as a national leader in physical education had begun.

The three-year program in physical education – which would be extended to four years by the State Education Department in 1930 – brought men back to the campus. And not just the rank and file. A state-established annual quota in 1926 of 30 male admits, coupled with difficult academic and physical skills requirements added by the Cortland administration, presented the Normal School football program with a pool of exceptional student-athletes.

In 1924, Willard Ashbrook, a husky 5-11, 200-pound Springfield graduate whose specialty was gymnastics, joined the Cortland faculty and became the head football coach. His 1924 and 1925 Normal rosters teamed with former collegiate standouts now attracted by Cortland's new physical education certification. Sammy Eppolito had been a Little All-America at St. Bonaventure. Sid Covert played at Syracuse. "Jabber" Lynch competed with the Buffalo All-Americans basketball squad.

Ashbrook concentrated on coaching linemen, while Carlton Yost, a Gettysburg alumnus who played pro football with the Pottsville (PA) Maroons, assisted with the backs. Cortland finally had its own stadium, situated behind Old Main where the present-day Sperry Center, Bowers Hall and Library stand. Trees lined the field and its concrete bleachers could seat 1,100 spectators.

Cortland's schedule underwent changes with the rebirth of football in the 1920s. The secondary schools, which once dominated the annual slate, were replaced with other normal schools and college and university junior varsities.

"It was a rough game," recalled John Kress '28, a tough-as-nails, "pugnacious kid" from Rochester's Edison Tech whose teammates remember taking on pro wrestlers when the travelling shows would come to the Cortland Fairgrounds. "We played both ways. The rules allowed for timeouts but you never called them.

"I never played with a helmet until 1927 when they put in the rule. I never got hurt, I just taped down my ears. When I was forced to wear a helmet, I went down to the Army-Navy store and bought one of those old aviator helmets. I cut it up so it was pretty well aerated. I'd go out on the field and the referee would ask, 'Is that a helmet?' And I'd say, 'Yep, that's a helmet.'"

Employing the single wing attack, Ashbrook's "experienced" Normal charges posted an impressive 13-4-3 record for a fledgling program of undersized players between 1924-26. When that first wave of physical education students departed, Ashbrook, aided by local attorney and former Pennsylvania gridder Bill Maher, endured a 0-6-1 season in 1927.

In 1928, another Springfield alum, George Hendrick, replaced Ashbrook as coach. The winless skein continued. Cortland, despite superlative play on both sides of the ball by captain George "Buttsie" Butts, finished 0-5-1.

Principal DeGroat, on one of his many faculty recruiting forays to Columbia University, persuaded Oregon native Howard Hobson to come to Cortland in 1929. Hobson, who a decade later would lead the University of Oregon to the first NCAA basketball championship, faced a different problem as the Normal football coach.

In 1929, the New York State Physical Education Department instituted a plan that forbid head coaches from coaching on the sidelines once a football contest had started. The scheme lasted but one season and Hobson admitted to scrapping the rule after opening with three consecutive losses.

Weighing the facts...

In 1911, the Cortland Normal-Cortland Central High football rivalry was reaching its peak. A pre-game article that season in the Cortland Standard focused on the supposed "size" advantage of the "Normals." Below, that 1911 Cortland roster is contrasted with last season's ECAC Northwest Championship Cortland offensive squad.

"If I was quarterbacking, I'd have to make all the substitutions," remembered Leo "Red" Meldrim, the 1929 team captain and signal-caller, about the rule. "We had signals coming from the bench." Meldrim, with Allen "Chiz" Frye and Ozzie Winters in the backfield, helped the Normals outscore their final four opponents 98-43. A game-ending touchdown drive in the season finale gave Cortland an uplifting 13-12 win over Mansfield.

Henry W. Kumpf, Jr., a Columbia University and New York University product, coached the Cortland gridders to a combined 6-5-1 record in 1930 and 1931.

Two noteworthy happenings took place during the 1930 season. Cortland's season opening 67-0 victory against Hartwick remained the most lopsided Cortland win during the next 61 years. Secondly, the Cortland-Ithaca rivalry – which has emerged today as the greatest small college rivalry in the country – got its start. The Normals toppled Ithaca 12-0 in that opener, but the game was a prelude to some real donnybrooks between the two institutions, only 18 miles apart and both offering physical education programs.

1932-1936: Chugger Davis and The Golden Era

Like the Midwestern farm boy in the Bernard Malamud baseball novel, Carl A. Davis, Cortland Normal's new football coach in 1932, was a "natural." A natural-born coach. The best there ever was, many former players say. In his Southern drawl, he constantly chided his Cortland players to "keep on chugging." They, in turn, affectionately labeled him "Chugger."

"This guy was brought up on a farm in Missouri," explained Dave Miller '36, who both played on Chugger's first teams and later taught and coached with him as a Cortland faculty member. "His dad would take a baseball and a glove with him and, when they got sick of plowing, they'd get out the baseball and practice."

Chugger excelled at all sports. "Whatever was a challenge to him, he took it up and perfected it," said Miller, who learned the "giant swing" in gymnastics from Chugger. Davis played and coached baseball with the Homer (NY) Braves into his fifties. Asked to teach a bowling class, Chugger went home and set up a mattress at the end of the upstairs hallway one Friday. "By Monday," said Miller, "you'd thought he had been using the three-step approach all his life."

As an undergraduate, Chugger lettered in baseball, football, basketball and track at Southwest State Teachers College in Missouri.

After graduating in 1926, he went to Catawba College in Salisbury, N.C., where he coached football, basketball, baseball and soccer between 1928 and 1931. The next year, he was a Springfield College graduate assistant coach while earning his master's degree.

Arriving in Cortland in 1932, the 30-year-old Davis would lead Cortland into a "golden era." During his first five seasons, his Cortland teams had a combined football record 24 wins, two losses, and seven ties — including three undefeated seasons.

In contrast to the 94 points allowed during the six-game 1931 season, the Davis-led 1932 unit attracted attention by giving up just 26 points in seven outings. In fact, the stalwart Cortland defense would not allow 94 points in the next four seasons combined!

Powerful blocking by the likes of Myril Hall, Harold Streubing and Leo Donovan opened holes for backs Wilbur Bergstrom, Ollie Cook and George Ockershausen during that 4-0-3 season in '32. Locals started filling the bleachers as excellent area athletes dotted the Normal roster — Joe Addressa, Jerry McDonald, Richie Ross, Milt Latimer, Harry Brosius, Jerry Dexter, Joe Cummings, to name a few.

In 1933, Cortland extended its unbeaten streak to 15 games by outscoring its foes 165 to 16. In a 54-0 win at Trenton, Bergstrom ran the opening kickoff back for a score and later returned a punt 95 yards for another touchdown highlighting the 5-0-2 campaign.

The Cortland football program, flushed with its new-found successes, also sought an appropriate nickname. Ernie Lalley, the student athletic manager at that time, recounted how the Cortland teams first became known as the "Red Dragons" in 1933.

"(Athletic Director) Francis Moench was greatly upset that year when one of the Syracuse papers listed the Cortland team as the 'Embryo Teachers,'" recalled Lalley. "He asked me to come up with a better title. Passing the Mobil gas station, I noticed the dragon figure and we presented the title to Chugger Davis' squad before the Ithaca game. It was accepted with great enthusiasm and has been used ever since."

The Red Dragons victory skein expanded to 20 straight contests early in the 1934 season. Addressa, who returned a kickoff 100 yards against Oswego later that year, scored three times — by pass, run and off an interception — in a 20-0 win over Arnold in game two. However, in a cold October drizzle in Ithaca, the Red Dragons lost 7-0 at Ithaca. A late-game fumble at the Ithaca five sealed the first

loss for Chugger at Cortland. For the juniors on that team, it would be their only loss in four years as Red Dragons.

"It got to the point where nobody would play us," remembered Harry Brosius, a four-year regular at fullback. "We had to play the junior varsity of Colgate and Syracuse (in 1935). And we beat them badly. (31-0 over Colgate and 39-6 over Syracuse). Syracuse has great team and they put everybody against us except for their varsity starting line-up. We only played them that one time.

"We had some pretty good guys. We were all going to be coaches. Whatever Chugger taught us, we did. He was one of the best around. Boy, if things weren't going his way, he'd keep ya'. We didn't have any lights so we go over by the Court Street corner and practice past seven o'clock under the streetlights."

In the 1935 season opener, Hiker Joy, head coach of "Little Three" power Canisius, scheduled Cortland Normal as an easy opener. The Dragons stunned Canisius 10-7. One of the best Dragon units ever, the 1935 Dragons outscored the opposition 188 to 19. The next season, Cortland tallied 136 points. Its famed "Dutch Right Side" and "League of Nations Left Side" crushed St. Lawrence, Mansfield, Arnold, Bergen and Stroudsburg. Gaining yardage against Cortland was an accomplishment; scoring points a major feat. Those five foes mustered 16 points total.

The stage was set for the 1936 finale against Canisius. A grudge match a year in the making. Cortland football dominated the sports page all season. Red Dragons Harold Stone and Harry Brosius were among the top scorers in the East. Nearly 5,000 fans engulfed Cortland's field and witnessed a 13-6 Golden Griffin win — only the second Cortland defeat in five years.

1937-1942: Advent of the T-formation and WW II

In 1937, a record 59 men came out for Chugger's football squad. Battling early season injuries, the Red Dragons lost to Lock Haven and St. Lawrence, but then shutout their final four foes. Honorable mention All-Upstate honors went to veteran pass receiver Tony Tesori and sophomore ballcarrier Merlin Hathaway. The 6-1, 182-pound Hathaway led Cortland scorers with 45 points in both 1937 and in 1938, when Cortland finished with a 2-4 record - Chugger's first losing season.

Behind Hathaway's brilliant open field running, the Red Dragons marched to a 5-2 mark in 1939. An inaugural member of the C-Club Hall of Fame, Hathaway's school scoring records wouldn't be

equalled for the next 40 years. In an unusual 3-2 win over American International in 1939, Hathaway drop-kicked the ball 47 yards — the longest in the country that year — for the winning three points.

With eight starting slots needed to be filled, the 1940 Red Dragons labored through a 2-5-0 rebuilding campaign. In 1941, Chugger had an idea a new formation might help his charges. He envisioned a football

attack popular out West but novel to the Eastern campuses.

"The T-formation came out of George Halas from the Chicago Bears and Clark Shaughnessy from Stanford," recounts Whitney T. "Pete" Corey, a Cortland basketball standout who was coaxed out to the gridiron by Davis. "Chugger went to one of their workshops in the summer of '41. That's when he wrote me at home and said he might have room for a fifth string quarterback." Corey "scrubbed" football, that is, helped out as part of his academic requirements as a freshman, and would play catch during the low points at practices. "I could throw the ball 50 or 60 yards and I didn't know it, but I guess Chugger had seen me throw."

At that time, the Red Dragon defense might encounter the single wing, the "Notre Dame Box," or the short punt offense, the latter a gambit that had been the basic weapon in Chugger's arsenal in the late 30s and early 40s.

"It looked like a punt formation - it was all squashed up," explained Corey. "They'd have two backs on the right side behind the guard. They'd have a blocking back and a fullback behind him. The left wing would play behind the left guard. The tailback - that was Merlin Hathaway's position - would be about eight yards back. It was very strong. They would use all kinds of 'buck laterals' where one guy would fake up in and then toss a lateral."

Midway through the 1941 season, though, Chugger turned less to the short punt and more to the "T-formation." By season's end, Cortland was firing on all pistons. The Dragons crushed Mansfield 40-7 with quarterback Laurens "Joe" Dietz throwing pinpoint passes to Ed Purcell and John Moiseichik, while Maurice Page, Howie Dingman, and Buel Reagan found gaping holes in the defense.

In 1942, the Dragons, with Corey calling the signals, went exclusively to the man-in-motion "T-formation." Cortland outscored Clarkson, St. Lawrence, Hartwick and the Cornell Junior Varsity 107 to 13, but was trounced 27-0 by a strong Canisius team.

With its explosive new offense, Cortland was ahead of its foes and the light shone brightly on the Red Dragon football horizon during the mid-1940s. Unfortunately, the United States had a more pressing concern - World War II - that would seize transportation, resources, and, most importantly, manpower to the battle against tyranny on foreign shores. When football resumed in 1946, the Cortland student body, like the world around it, had changed.

1946-1948: The Boys are Back in Town

When World War II ended, Cortland State suddenly found its classrooms swelling with a mix of traditional undergrads and "veterans" pursuing their educations on the G.I. Bill. That eclectic band of young and old students in the post-War era forged what remains one of the College's most loyal alumni groups.

In 1946, Chugger's squad finished 4-3 - blowing out Bergen (NJ) and Hartwick, while wresting close wins over St. Lawrence and Springfield for a winning season. In fact, a decade later, Chugger told a Cortland student newspaper reporter that the 14-13 come-from-behind win over St. Lawrence was his greatest Red Dragon coaching thrill. The favored Larries led 13-6 with under a minute remaining, however, Cortland was marching downfield. In the final 30 seconds, Red Dragon back Bob Westerman broke through three defenders on an 18-yard run but fumbled the ball just shy of the St. Lawrence goalline. The pigskin rolled into the endzone where Cortland end Lloyd Baker pounced on it for the tying score. On the extra point attempt, Cortland botched the snap but a poised Hugh "Automatic" Jack split the uprights for the upset win.

In 1947, the Red Dragons upped their mark to 5-3 - shutting out Sampson, Hartwick and Alfred. A potent Cortland offense scored

146 points that year behind its formidable front wall which possessed the likes of 6-3 George Fuge, 6-2 Hugh Lipsius, and a feisty 5-8 sophomore guard, Marcus Martone. The 1947 Homecoming Game marked the first appearance of the 50-member Cortland State Marching Band, under the direction of Andrew Banse, and the first time that a radio station, the newly established WKRT, broadcast an entire Red Dragon football contest.

The 1948 Dragons, paced by second team All-Upstate back Earl "Dick" Keefer, won its first five games by a combined 121-19 margin. A 19-0 win over Ithaca during that stretch signalled the renewal of that bitter rivalry last played in 1934. Chugger's hopes of an unblemished campaign were dashed in the final two outings - a 0-0 draw with Stroudsburg and a 28-6 loss to Springfield.

1949-58: Cortland State Heads into the '50s

During the 1948 academic year, Cortland became a charter member of the State University of New York. In 1949, Chugger's unit became his fifth straight winner but not without a strong finish. Overcoming losses to Springfield and West Chester, Cortland again topped 100 points in crushing Clarkson, Ithaca, Hartwick and Brockport. Dragon back Herb Collins led the way with his seven touchdowns in the 4-3 season.

In 1950, the University of Buffalo - a school three times the size of Cortland - became Cortland's season opener and would remain an almost insurmountable first or second game foe for the Dragons throughout the Fabulous Fifties. With the 50s came recreational nuances like television and home movie cameras. It was a home movie camera that left Chugger and his charges smoldering after a 7-6 loss to Ithaca, a game decided by extra points made and missed. Lawrence Corser, a local carpenter and amateur cameraman, filmed the game in color. Weeks later when the film was processed, the "Corser Film" revealed that Dragon kicker John Castell's point-after cleared the uprights. Little consolation in a 3-4 Cortland season.

Cortland duplicated its 3-4 mark in 1951. Halfback Norm Foster, in Cortland's 35-13 win over Brockport that year, scored on an 80-yard punt return, a 40-yard interception return, and kicked five PATs.

The war in Korea drew a few Dragon lettermen away from College. Still, Cortland, which had failed to score in its previous two games with Buffalo, produced an easy 33-13 season opening victory in 1952 on Randall Field. Cortland 6-4, 203-pound senior end Whitney Armstrong, who later under the stage name Michael Whitney would become a television star and marry the model Twiggy, grabbed two touchdown passes. Before 4,000 Hofstra fans on Long Island the

next week, the Dutchmen beat Cortland 34-6. In a shootout between the top two upstate teams, Alfred edged Cortland 33-28. Led by quarterback Art Riedel and halfbacks John Arcaro and Norm Foster, the 1952 Dragons outscored Ithaca and Brockport 84-12 and finished with 179 points in a 4-2-1 season.

The 2-3-1 Dragons shutout Ithaca and Brockport by a combined 94-0 mark in 1953. That year, the Cortland team bus braved drifting snows and a blizzard only to have its season finale in Pennsylvania cancelled after arriving at their East Stroudsburg destination. The Stroudsburg-Cortland games of that era always seemed to be played in rain, mud or snow. In 1954, the injury-riddled Dragons directed by quarterback Bob Hoppey managed a 2-3-2 season.

Chugger had a powerhouse unit that was one game away from a perfect season in 1955. Offensively, the Dragons used a number of tools – the running of halfback Pete Palleschi, the passing combo of frosh quarterback Roger Kane to back Al Emmi and the 40-yard punting average of Frank Dawson, to name a few. Defensively, bruisers like Ed Gollwitzer, Jack Radzavicz and Jim Sellars gave Cortland three straight shutouts – over Ithaca, Brockport and Hofstra – and allowed just 32 points all year. Only a 12-0 loss to unbeaten Alfred spoiled an otherwise perfect autumn.

During the 1956 campaign, the Dragon defense, spearheaded by senior Jack Burroughs, again whitewashed Ithaca, Brockport and Stroudsburg. A 6-3 win at the expense of Bloomsburg's nationally ranked defense produced a 4-3 finish. Soph fullback Don Guido had a school record 136 yards against Stroudsburg.

Cortland unfurled two explosive running backs who were scoring machines in 1957. Junior Art Smith and freshman Tom Decker were unstoppable at season's start. Smith scored twice against

Alfred, three times against Bloomsburg and twice against Ithaca, while Decker added a few long TD runs of his own. With 107 points in four games, Cortland ran into Hofstra's top-ranked defense buzzsaw and fell 15-6, despite a trio of interceptions by Dragon back Dick Beams. In the 19-6 season finale win over Stroudsburg, Joe Koesterer hit Radzavicz with a 55-yard TD pass on the first play, while Smith carried for his ninth touchdown of the 4-1-2 year.

In 1958, Chugger's charges notched a 36-0 win over Alfred – their first over the Saxons since 1947 – by unleashing their now-familiar offensive arsenal of Smith, Radzavicz and Decker. The next week, Buffalo, coming off a 6-3 upset of Harvard, barely escaped against Cortland. A missed PAT, in the first year where PAT kicks counted as a single point, provided the winning margin. A 16-0 loss to Bloomsburg was followed by a four-game win skein to end the season. Joe Cuzzo's fourth quarter TD against Hofstra gave Cortland an 8-0 win that overshadowed six Dragon fumbles in the muddy clime. A few days later, six Cortland players complained of burns that were traced to the wrong lime used by Hofstra to line its field.

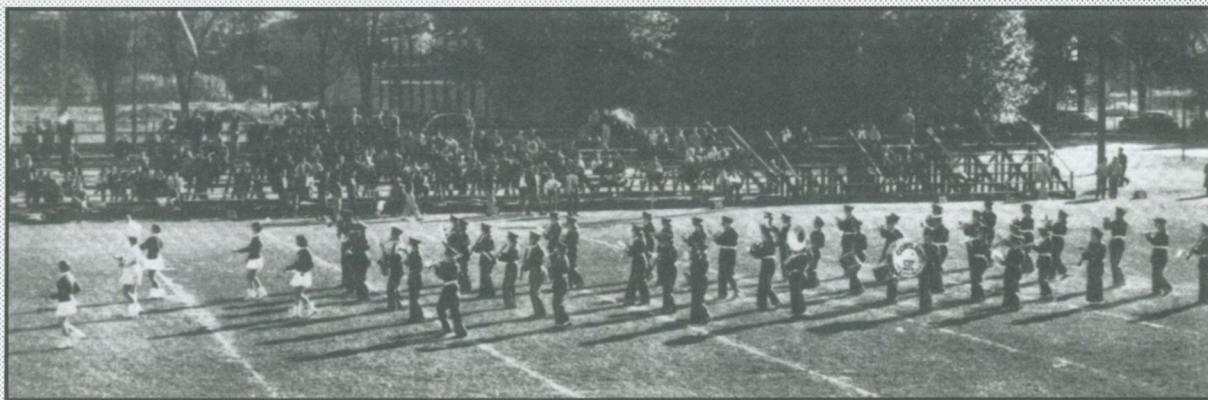
As a footnote to the 1958 season, four Dragons – Jim Sellars, Jack Radzavicz, Dick Beams and Herman Wyld – were chosen to play in the Gem City Bowl Game, on Thanksgiving Day in Erie, PA. Reportedly a small college all-star classic, the Gem City Bowl featured players from schools like Michigan State, Wooster, Youngstown, Akron. Interestingly, the Dragons were on the West team, apparently because of a lack of "West" representatives in this East-West Classic. Sellars, an All-America considered by many to be one of the finest Cortland defensive players of all time, started at center and Wyld at tackle. Radzavicz intercepted a pass and Beams, in the closing seconds of the game, tossed a 25-yard TD pass.

The Day the Music Died: The Rise and Fall of the Cortland State Marching Band

Formed in 1947, the Cortland State Marching Band -- annually some 40 to 50 members strong -- added color and sparkle to the Red Dragon football games for 16 seasons. Originally clad in red sweaters and white slacks and later red uniforms with gold stripes, the band led Homecoming parades through city streets, provided the musical pep at football rallies and played for the Cortland State Rockettes routines. The band supplied halftime entertainment and brought the Cortland students to their feet by forming a block "C" on the field to the sounds of The Alma Mater.

Over the years, many Cortland Music Department faculty members -- Andrew Banse, Carl Evans, Sam Forcucci and Vincent Picerino -- directed the marching band through a variety of original arrangements and intricate formations. On occasion, the band travelled with

the Cortland football team to places like Hofstra and Brockport. For a few years, the Cortland and Ithaca College bands would join ranks to perform at halftime of that football rivalry.



During the 1960s, though, the Cortland State Marching Band, like the College's tradition of "Moving Up Day," fell victim to student apathy. A letter in the Hilltop Press in 1962, the year after the marching musicians disbanded, cited outdated uniforms and music as two causes for the band's demise. In actuality, the band had always struggled for a spot to practice on an overcrowded campus. Devoted faculty members and student musicians, with the support of President Donnal V. Smith, kept the marching band active as long as possible. In 1963, the College Music Council, hoping to revive the Marching Band, polled the Cortland student body. While 96 percent favored the Marching Band's return, only 12 percent of the student musicians on campus were willing to participate. With that, a colorful chapter in Cortland football annals came to a close.

1959-62: A New Field, Chugger Bids Farewell

In 1959, the Red Dragons began playing at their new football facility – popularly referred to as Jenman Field after the family from whom the College purchased the 25-acre tract. The site, which was referred to as College Field in the mid-1960s, is the present-day Davis Field. Cortland, in road games, downed Alfred 12-2 but fell 68-2 in its last meeting with Buffalo, which was making its move to a large school schedule. The first Jenman Field game resulted in a 6-6 draw with Bloomsburg.

More memorable in that 2-3-2 season, however, was the following week's game against Ithaca. Dragon co-captain Tom Decker and Ithaca co-captain Dick Carmean developed the idea of a trophy for the annual winner of the Cortland-Ithaca football game. The prize, known as the Cortaca Jug, resembles a rather large "moonshine" container on which are painted the Cortland-Ithaca game scores. Over the years, a second jug was introduced after the available writing space on the first had become filled. The Red Dragons took that initial Cortaca Jug game with a 13-7 come-from-behind win. After Cortland's Charles Prettyman recovered an Ithaca fumble at the Bomber 49, senior halfback Ron Riccio covered that distance on his go-ahead TD scamper.

A litany of injured players and a dose of misfortune resulted in a 2-5 finish in 1960. When Ithaca beat Cortland for the first time in nine years, the "Monday morning quarterbacks" questioned Chugger's ability to coach. In his defense, a student sports reporter wrote, "He has forgotten more football than his critics will ever learn."

The Red Dragons returned to their winning ways and Chugger reached a coaching milestone in 1961. QB Mickey Nugent fired two TD passes to end Bob Hudak in a 13-6 season-opening upset of Alfred that helped Cortland finish 4-3. In the third game of the season, Cortland beat Bloomsburg 16-8 – the Dragons' first Jenman Field victory and Chugger's 100th as the Red and White mentor. Ex-Marine Dom Capozzi, an All-East guard, had a 72-yard punt and a pair of field goals against Kings College, while defensive standout Steve Gold's interception and TD-stopping tackle preserved a shutout of Brockport.

In 1962, the Red Dragons christened their new red-and-white scoreboard, which would be used until the early 1980s when Coca-

Cola donated the one currently in use on Davis Field. Cortland also welcomed its sophomore scoring whiz, Paul Duda. In the 19-12 opening win over Alfred, Duda ran for two TD's and threw for the other. He later had two TDs against Kings and had a 62-yard scoring run against Bridgeport. Mickey Nugent threw a school record six TD passes for the 3-4 Dragons that season. Defensively, lineman Rich Gnida was exceptional. He and co-captain, Rick D'Addio, played on the victorious West team in the Erie-based Gem City Classic at Thanksgiving.

On January 10, 1963, Chugger officially resigned as the Cortland State head football coach. The man who guided the Red Dragon gridiron fortunes from the Great Depression to the Space Age was stepping down. In 28 seasons Chugger had a 105-66-17 record – a mark that ranked him among the nation's top coaches in years of active service. But his Cortland legacy extended beyond wins and losses and the football field. "Chugger's greatest testimonial," wrote Ross Allen, the College's Health, Physical Education and Recreation director, "is the high esteem and respect in which he is held by the hundreds of students he has coached and by his colleagues in the profession. His popularity among alumni is enviable – in fact, 'Chugger' and Cortland State have become synonymous."

1963-1967: There's No Place Like Home

As a Syracuse University back, Roger Robinson was one of the standouts in the 1946 East-West Shrine Game. He later honed his coaching skills under the legendary Andy Kerr at Lebanon Valley College. Since 1957, Robinson had been directing defensive backs at Harvard. Filling Chugger's shoes at Cortland in 1963 meant a return home to Central New York for the Endicott, NY, native.

The concept of "home" took on an extra special meaning for Robinson's earliest teams. During the next three seasons, the Red Dragons were invincible on the Cortland turf.

In the 1963 opener, Jim Perrott's three field goals helped Cortland defeat host C.W. Post for the first time in four tries. Perrott hit 7-of-7 PATs and Duda scored a trio of touchdowns in a 49-0 win over Brockport. Arizona transfer Tim Sullivan led a Cortland defense that posted three shutouts that year. Quarterback Tom LaPuma guided the Dragons to a 27-13 upset of Bridgeport and a 4-3 final record.

The year 1964 was a magical one for Cortland players, for whom the momentum of an undefeated campaign grew with each weekend conquest. From the outset, Cortland's defense was menacing. Dubbed the "Fearsome Fivesome," Cortland's defensive wall of Tim Sullivan, Gene Gnida, Pat Vartuli, Doug Parsons and Bob Knapp feasted on opposing offenses – shutting out four foes and allowing only 62 points in nine outings. Offensively, the Red Dragons packed heat. "Golden Boy" Duda scored on long punt returns and from the line of scrimmage. Signaller Richie Speckmann hurled long TD bombs to Tom Sharp and Rick Page. After outscoring Alfred, Trenton, Bridgeport and Ithaca 85-6 in the first four games, Cortland nipped C.W. Post 30-27 on Speckmann's 36-yard TD pass to Sharp with two minutes left. The Dragons followed with a 54-8 win over Brockport and 41-0 dispatch of Glassboro. The 7-0 Dragons then faced East Stroudsburg – a team they had not scored a point against in five years – before 5,000 screaming Homecoming fans on Jenman Field. Stroudsburg returned the opening kickoff 96 yards for a TD and opened a 14-0 lead by the end of the first quarter. Cortland, sparked by a 45-yard Ken Fougner TD run, came back to tie the game. With two seconds left, Perrott's 17-yard field goal gave the Dragons a 17-14 win and kept Robinson's Jenman Field unbeaten streak alive. But Cortland's hopes of a post-season small college bowl game were dashed with a 7-0 loss to unbeaten Montclair in the season finale. Montclair converted a first quarter fumble – one of many Dragon turnovers in the game – into the game's lone tally. Cortland, at 8-1, was the best team in Upstate New York that year.

able aerial target for Speckmann and LaPuma. Bob "The Bear" Schiller was a short yardage TD threat. Another player broke into a starting role because of injuries that season. He was junior kicker Bill "Butterball" Shear.

In 1966, in a matter of a few seconds, Shear put Cortland on the national football map and into the all-time annals of the sport. On Oct. 15, 1966, amid strong gusts on College Field, Shear became the first player at any level of organized football to kick a 60-yard plus field goal. His first quarter 61-yarder, which shattered Jan Stenerud's record 59-yarder at Montana State, helped Cortland beat Hobart 15-8 in the first-ever regular season meeting between the two schools.

"(Robinson) tells me to make it look like a punt," recalled Shear, who successfully converted 55-yarders in practice. "When I got in the huddle, I said, 'Let's not get it blocked in the middle of the field or Robinson will kill me.' I kicked the ball and my job after I kicked it was to run where the end is and head down the sideline and force a runback toward the middle. Well, I kicked the ball and made my follow through. My first instinct is to head toward the line. As I got to where the defensive end was and was getting ready to turn downfield, I looked up and the ball was still in the air. For the rest of the half, I was completely in shock."

Shear, a 10th round draft pick of the first Super Bowl champion Green Bay Packers, was an All-East selection along with running back Harris Silver, offensive end Rick Page and defensive end Jack Cooper for the 6-2 Dragons in 1966. Quarterback Speckmann completed 53-of-114 passes for 784 yards and six TDs as Cortland was a Tangerine Bowl hopeful that autumn. A 3-0 defeat in the slop at Bridgeport and a 14-7 defeat to Northeastern quelled those playoff hopes. But, by season's end, Cortland's College Field win streak — all under Robinson's tutelage — reached 16 consecutive victories.

The most unlikely opponent to end that streak, Brockport, halted it after 17 games with a 27-20 Homecoming upset in 1967. Two season ending losses meant a 4-4 final mark. However, a bright spot that autumn was 6-4, 215-pound end Rod Verkey. He caught 34 passes for 514 yards and nine TDs as a tight end but landed a spot on the American Football Coaches Association Small College All-America Team as a defensive end — joining All-America teammates

The infectious Red Dragon winning attitude carried over to 1965 when Cortland finished 7-2. A tough defense held seven foes to 25 combined points and had many moments, like Tom Nugent's endzone pass deflection against Brockport or Dick Lassar's blocked punt and subsequent fumble recovery in avenging the previous year's loss to Montclair. On the attack, All-ECAC end Pete Warner provided an

Greg Landry, Haven Moses and Marvin Upshaw. Verkey was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons and played a few years in the NFL.

1968-1979: Robinson Stiffens Dragons' Schedule

Little All-America center Ray Viladesau anchored an offensive line that aided a 5-3 Cortland mark in 1968. The Red Dragons, on the strength of Larry Buchoni's three TDs and Don Congdon's 173 passing yards, tripped Ithaca 34-13 to keep "The Jug" for a third straight year. A Congdon-to-Joe Bramante pass, coupled with a Jim Bensley PAT, gave Cortland a 7-6 win over Brockport. Earl Rogers, a favorite target, grabbed 23 passes for 317 yards and five TDs that year. Defensively, Stan Kowalski and Gary Feger were stalwarts. Top Ten Maryland State handed the Dragons one of their losses.

During the centennial of college football in 1969, the Red Dragon players wore the number "100" on their helmets but finished with a .500 record (4-4) — two defeats by just three-point margins. Leading Dragon ground-gainer Bramante topped 100 yards in the Springfield loss and netted 138 yards by halftime of Cortland's 73-6 win over Brockport. Al Rapp kicked 10-of-10 PATs for a school mark in that game. Mike White, Mike Cappelto and Dave Urlick were among the defensive leaders that year.

In the 1970 pre-season scrimmage, Robinson brought his Cortland charges up to his alma mater for a tussle with the Syracuse University Orangemen in Archibold Stadium. Losing three of its first four games, Cortland finished strong for a 5-4 record. In the last two outings, quarterback John Anselmo threw the winning two-point PAT to freshman Paul Besstak to beat Northeastern 8-7 and a 61-yard TD pass in a 17-10 win over Central Connecticut. As a footnote, Red Dragon Phil Grebinar played five different positions in the Northeastern contest — offensive tackle, offensive guard, center on the punts, defensive tackle and defensive guard. Tight end Earl Rogers, a honorable mention Little All-America in 1969, capped his three-year career with 85 grabs for a school record 1,544 yards.

Defensive star Paul Wehrum, in Cortland's 1971 season-opening win over Springfield, blocked a punt, recovered a fumble and returned an interception 32 yards. But the Dragons fell each of the next three weeks and Robinson suffered his first losing season — 4-5 — at the school. Alfred's Jim Moretti, who would become a Cortland graduate assistant and later the Saxon head coach, pulled out an Alfred victory in the last few seconds. It was the second time in three years that Moretti's waning game heroics felled the Dragons.

The Red Dragons came from behind to earn wins in five games during the 1972 season and posted a 6-3 overall record. First Team All-America end Gary Theobald caught 26 passes for 381 yards and seven TDs. QB Mark Hinsch completed 62-of-134 passes for 748 yards and nine scores. Defensive back and co-captain John Espey spearheaded a unit that kept four foes under 10 points.

Always playing a formidable schedule, Cortland could not keep up with the bulk of its scholarship-granting opposition during the mid-1970s — the majority of those units today competing at the Division II level.

In 1973, during a 10-0 loss on Sept. 23 to Indiana (PA) on "Dad's Day," Cortland officially dedicated its football field to Carl "Chugger" Davis who had passed away that spring. In a 1-7-1 season — the worst Cortland record since the 1920s, a trio of Dragon goalline stands helped produce a 0-0 draw with Stroudsburg. Offensively, Mark Jenks caught 26 passes for 523 yards and 4 TDs.

In both 1974 and 1975, Cortland finished with 2-6-1 marks — Brockport again supplying half the victories. The 1974 season started with Cortland downing Springfield 31-0. Gary Tiffany had a 65-yard punt return, Eddie Louiz a 68-yard punt and John Almonte a fumble recovery and interception in that game. But the following week, In-

diana (PA) intercepted a pass in the closing seconds and converted the turnover into a 7-6 win. Cortland then blew a 27-6 halftime lead in a 34-33 loss to rival Ithaca. Amid the disappointment on the field, Robinson made sure there was internal discipline. In a news report during the "long hair" days of the early 1970s, Robinson demanded that all Cortland players' mustaches must be trimmed and above the upper lip. In 1975, Dragon defensive back Steve Daly's eight interceptions ranked him second in the nation. Midway through the season, QB Ralph Boettger engineered a last minute 99-yard scoring drive, tossing a 14-yard TD pass to Tim Arden and a two-point PAT pass to Gary Tiffany to earn a 15-15 draw with Montclair. Tiffany's three touchdowns, including an 89-yard TD return, sparked a 56-0 win over Brockport.

Cortland's 6-0, 195-pound junior halfback Lyle Schuler ran over, around and through opponents while smashing school records with 857 yards, 15 touchdowns and 92 points for the 4-5 Dragons in 1976. After five games, Schuler had already equalled the school rushing TD mark of 10, including three in the 48-41 "shootout" loss to Central Connecticut — still a record for most combined points in a Cortland game. Schuler finished fourth nationally in scoring. Steve Daly had two pick-offs in the 20-16 upset of Alfred. The Red Dragons capped the year with a 50-6 win over Southern Connecticut. Four-year veteran Boettger, making his 28th quarterback start in that game, had completed 313-of-654 passes for 3,762 yards and 20 TDs in his career.

In 1977, Cortland's running tandem of Lyle Schuler and Mike Barbano were injured in pre-season. As Robinson would tell reporters halfway through the 2-8 season, "When you can't establish any running game, they just lay back and wait for you to throw." And pass they did. QB Greg Didio broke school records by throwing 211 times for 1,177 yards. On the receiving end, Frank Goroleski, Gene Gleeson, Tony Chambrovich and Tom Potter accounted for the bulk of Didio's 89 completions. Schuler, in the season finale, gained 110 yards in a 10-7 win over Merchant Marine.

Excitement abounded early in the 1978 season. In the rebirth of the Cortland-Buffalo series, Red Dragon defenders — led by Dan Reynolds, Gene Iozzino, Steve Tybur, Chuck Steuwe and Larry O'Leary — pressured, confounded and sacked the Bulls' quarterback 13 times. O'Leary had a 29-yard interception return. Sporting an entirely new defensive look the next week, Cortland stunned Springfield 14-6. Then Cortland dropped three straight until beating Brockport behind tailback John Devendorf's 131 yards and two TDs. QB John Simek, who had thrown for 363 yards against Ithaca, etched his name into the school record books in the 41-31 loss to Albany. Simek completed 34-of-67 passes for 436 yards in that game — Goroleski making 16 catches for 230 yards. Devendorf crossed the goal line four times in Cortland's 37-14 season-ending win over Central Connecticut. For Cortland, the 5-5 finish marked the first non-losing campaign since 1972.

In 1979, the Red Dragons never got on track. In pre-season, Robinson was hoping for a seven-win season. Instead, the Dragons labored through nine straight defeats before blanking New York Tech 27-0 in the final game. Halfback Jude Francois, the Dragons' top rusher in 1978 and 1979, set a school record with his 231 yards — 175 in the first half — in a 29-23 loss to Central Connecticut. The 1979 season was the last as head coach for Roger Robinson. In 17 years, his teams had a 70-77-3 mark and established many records. With the 1980s, though, came a new coach and a new schedule.

1980-82: An Alumnus and "The Jug" Return

A former halfback under Chugger Davis, 46-year-old Ed Decker had one primary aim in his new capacity as the Red Dragon head football coach in 1980. "It is my goal to restore Cortland to the ranks of the perennial winners — that list of teams who annually win more than they lose," said the incoming Decker, like Robinson, a Southern Tier native. "We must create a renewed feeling of en-

thusiasm among our players, staff, faculty and alumni for our program."

Decker, to date the only Cortland graduate to have returned to his alma mater as head football coach, had been an outstanding high school coach who later became an assistant at Columbia University and, most recently, Ithaca College. His reconstruction philosophy was abetted by a revised Cortland schedule — one that no longer included the scholarship-granting Division II teams Springfield, East Stroudsburg, Central Connecticut and Southern Connecticut.

The 1980 Red Dragons, while not bringing the long-awaited "winner" back to Cortland, did lay some groundwork during their 3-7 season. An up-and-down defense, was impressive — like forcing six turnovers in a 12-7 win over Hobart — when hitting on all cylinders. Linebacker Brian Mooney, end John Martens, and secondary mates Bob Mozzi and Pat Goodell were the leaders. Offensively, QB Jay Cieply threw for 997 yards while senior end Gene Gleeson eclipsed a school record with 1,554 career reception yards on 91 catches. The best surprise that autumn was sophomore halfback Mike Bowe. Finishing 16th nationally among Division III rushers, Bowe gained 900 yards and scored nine TDs. In the 35-0 win over Canisius, the 5-11, 180-pounder rushed for all five Dragon TDs then added a two-point conversion — the most points ever tallied in a single game by a Cortland player. An All-ECAC selection, Bowe finished the season with a school mark 244 yards on the ground against Marist.

As the 1981 season began, Decker was seeking another component to augment Bowe's talents in the Dragons' option attack. He found it in his bruising 5-11, 175-pound freshman fullback, Dave Cook. The Dragon tandem provided a 1-2 punch rarely seen on the Hill. Behind an offensive line led by Academic All-America tackle Paul "Chop-Chop" Alexander — now the New York Jets line coach, the Red Dragons gained a school record 1,989 yards in rushing offense. Bowe gained 719 yards and Cook, the ECAC Rookie of the Year, closed with 688 yards. Each scored eight TDs.

Defensively, the linebacking trio of Bob Bateson, Brian Mooney and Mike Greco accounted for nearly 300 tackles, while defensive back Jeff Wilcox picked off six passes. Up front, defensive tackle Steve Archambeau had 14 tackles for losses. Safety Steve Armstrong, who had a 94-yard interception return for a TD against New York Tech, kicked a 42-yard field goal with two seconds left for a 10-7 win over Canisius in War Memorial Stadium. Cortland gained 207 rushing yards — more than Alfred's previous six opponents combined — against the top-ranked Saxon defense, but lost

21-14 on two fourth quarter scores. However, a 51-6 decision over Marist gave Cortland a 6-4 record – its first winning season in a decade.

In Cortland's exciting 1982 season opener against Buffalo, Red Dragon receiver Frank Burm caught eight passes for a school record 267 yards – scoring twice – from QB Scott Zahn, a Brockport transfer. Tim Reynolds, a Cortland soccer player-turned-football kicker, booted a 37-yard field goal with 15 seconds left for a 31-28 victory. But Zahn was lost for the year with a broken ankle. Cortland, winning one week and losing the next, dropped five of its next seven games – three by a touchdown or less. Cook, who had a school record 91-yard TD run against Albany, and Bowe, who scored three times in the Brockport win, supplied the bulk of the offense. Injuries afflicted the Dragon defense, though All-ECAC middle linebacker Bob Bateson, one of the strongest players ever to wear a Dragon uniform, and defensive end Brian Moran and tackle Paul Falsone, were stalwarts. In a year of close contests, Cortland came-from-behind to defeat Ithaca 21-17 on Davis Field and reclaim the Cortaca Jug – defensive back Brian Kittner's fourth quarter interception ending a Bomber scoring threat and setting up Cook's winning score. An NCAA-playoff-bound St. Lawrence team beat Cortland 40-27 in the season finale spoiling a shot at a .500 season for the 4-6 Dragons.

1983-85: Czarnecki Helps Dragons Weather Crisis

In February, a few months after the end of the 1982 football season, newly elected Governor Mario Cuomo's proposed budget slashed financial support to the State University of New York. SUNY Cortland faced a \$900,000 loss in revenues. College President James M. Clark, in trying to meet this impending crisis, had to propose campus-wide job eliminations, staff and program cutbacks. "We do not have the luxury of overlooking athletics," said Clark, whose proposal included a "two-year suspension of football."

Within a few weeks, the fiscal situation had brightened somewhat and the Cortland football program was not affected. Emotionally and from a public relations standpoint, however, the longer term effects were more damaging. Just weeks before, Cortland players had been summoned to a meeting by athletic director Vince Gonino and told of an uncertain future. Now, despite the positive news, the morale of both coaches and players was low. Top recruits had been frightened away from attending Cortland. Rebuilding took on a whole new meaning.

In late spring, Decker stepped down as head coach. Larry Czarnecki, the Red Dragon defensive coordinator since 1978, accepted the difficult task of directing the dismayed Dragons. In doing so, Czarnecki provided Cortland football with continuity in a critical period – a smooth transition that historically cannot be overstated. A one-time Kodak and A.P. All-America defensive tackle for Lambert Cup champion Ithaca College, Czarnecki favored strong defenses and a grinding ground game.

All-ECAC fullback Dave Cook led Upstate rushers with his 100-yard-per-game rushing average in 1983, while Cortland's interior defense – linemen Paul Falsone and Steve Archambeau along with middle linebacker Tony Zawadzki – enacted Czarnecki's defensive credo. Cortland beat Pace, Brockport and Albany at home, but couldn't solve the mystery of winning on the road.

Cortland students, parents, alumni and fans watching Monday Night Football on ABC-TV in late October 1983 were startled when veteran sportscaster Howard Cosell told Frank Gifford the game he would be watching that weekend will be Cortland-Ithaca. In its last year of covering small college regional games, ABC-TV selected the Cortaca Jug match-up on the South Hill Field as one of four nationally. Regional sportscasters Jack Morris and Tim Fox from the ABC affiliate in Syracuse called the game which was broadcast throughout New York State. Red Dragon Alonzo Hooks returned

the opening kickoff 87 yards for a touchdown and Cook's 84 yards put him over 2,000 in his career, but Ithaca won 49-26. In the 28-0 season finale win over St. Lawrence, Cook ran for a school record 276 yards, scoring three TDs and becoming the first Red Dragon 2,000-yard career rusher.

The "Dave Cook Show" continued in 1984 with the fullback – the target of every Cortland opponent – posting successive 100-yard-plus games. Defensive back Sam Daniels picked off two passes in the opening 23-7 win over Buffalo. Jeff Austin scored on a 92-yard kickoff return in the 30-17 win over Buffalo State. In a physical game with NCAA-playoff bound Wagner, Cortland blew a 10-0 lead in a 27-17 loss. Cook scored five TDs in a 42-21 win over Brockport, but injured his leg in a pile-up. The Cook-less Dragons lost to Albany and Alfred. Wearing a special brace, Cook ran 39 times for a school record 212 yards and two TDs in a 26-15 loss to Canisius. He became the first Dragon to top 3,000 career rushing yards in that game. A then-record 6,635 fans crowded Davis Field for the 1983 Cortaca Jug game.

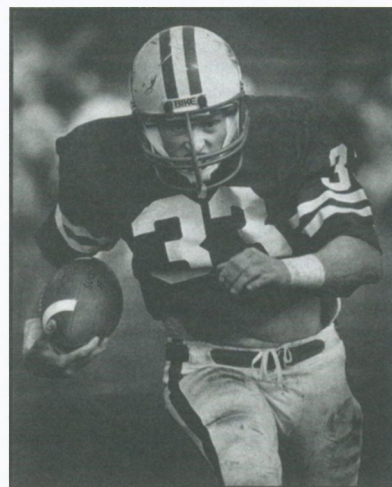
Ithaca had scheduled its Parents Weekend around an "away" game and used 41 charter buses to bring its parents to watch the victory over Cortland. In his final game, Cook scored all 22 points while carrying the ball a record 44 times for 208 yards in a 22-6 victory over St. Lawrence. The All-America and ECAC Upstate Player of the Year finished his career with 3,455 yards, 44 TDs and 268 points. Offensive tackle Terry Bitka and defensive tackle Paul Falsone were also All-ECAC selections for the 4-5 Dragons.

In 1985, Cortland played the opening game on Buffalo's new omniturf field. Dragon Jeff Austin returned a kickoff 100 yards but Buffalo won 31-14. Fullback Dave Pitcher, who would score 10 TDs during the season while running out of Cortland's "short yardage" formation, scored with 3:13 left to give the Dragons a 22-20 Homecoming win over Buffalo State. At home again, Cortland upset unbeaten Wagner 28-23 behind QB John Dargle's three scoring passes. Four Pitcher TDs gave Cortland a third-straight home win – 41-6 over Brockport. Behind Todd Hobin's 75-yard TD run and Howard Horton's 81-yard TD run, Cortland downed visiting Albany 21-16 and became the first Red Dragon team since 1966 to win four consecutive home contests. Cornerback Bob Viscardi had two key fourth quarter interceptions in that game. Cortland, outscored 106-20 in its final three defeats, finished a disappointing 4-5. Offensive tackle Alan Wohlford earned honorable mention All-

1986-1989: Kayser Ushers in the Glory Years

Cortland's new football coach in 1986 wasn't selected until August – two weeks before the start of pre-season camp. Dennis Kayser, an assistant coach at six different colleges and universities, knew his first year would be difficult. The 34-year-old first-time head mentor, who admittedly gleaned the best from all his coaching stops, wasn't worried about the future.

"We definitely want to have a successful program here, but we feel that we've got to take care of other things first and then the winning will come," explained Kayser. "And that's having a 'we philosophy.' Good people. That's more important to us than a guy just going out and doing a great job on the field. We want good

Bob Lewis: Cortland's Super Fan

In 1932, a spry 10-year-old Bob Lewis meandered from his Tompkins Street residence up College hill to watch the Cortland Normal football team and their new coach, Carl "Chugger" Davis. During the next 10 years, Lewis, who eventually attended Cortland State Teachers College, missed only one home Red Dragon football contest -- for a soccer game in which he was playing.

Lewis entered the service in 1942 and later taught health in Pennsylvania. He returned to Cortland College as a Health Department instructor in 1954 and never left. "I only saw five or six games during that time," he recalled. However, since 1954, Lewis has not missed one Cortland home football game. That's right, he's been to every Red Dragon home game during the past 39 years.



For a few years, Lewis was the team's cameraman. He coached the Cortland cheerleaders for 15 seasons. He and Fay Corey helped form "The Rockettes," a forerunner of the present-day "Kickline." For a few years, Lewis helped Doc Weber in the Athletic Department. For the past two decades, Lewis has been a regular in the Davis Field press box answering the phone during games.

"I've always felt a part of the institution," said Lewis. "When I was in the third grade at the Owego Street School, I was taught by Cortland student teachers and in elementary school by Cortland professors. We used to play sandlot football on the campus field. Then I went to college here and taught here."

The 73-year-old Lewis lists among his best Cortland football memories Bill Shear's 61-yard field goal in 1966 and something called "the spinning shift" used by Chugger's early teams. "All four backs pivoted as a shift and when they got back into position, the ball was snapped," he explained.

people here and we want them to fit into the whole campus environment. Football is for players to participate in and enjoy. As a coach, you want them to feel positive about their experience and you want them to be successful."

Kayser dubbed his 1986 squad "The Road Warriors" because the schedule had the Dragons playing five straight road games in early season. Although finishing 1-8, the team lost three of its first four games by a combined total of eight points. More importantly, Kayser started many young players on both sides of the ball. That experience would pay off in the upcoming seasons. QB Rich Keefer's 18-yard TD pass to All-ECAC flanker Dave Falco with 1:49 left gave the Dragons their lone victory -- 21-16 over Brockport in 1986.

Cortland football turned the corner toward success in 1987 and, to date, has never looked back. In the season opener at rainy Wilkes-Barre, PA, Cortland's goalline defense halted Wilkes College on three possessions in the final minute although the Wilkes scoreboard was inoperative. On a fourth try, the hosts put the ball over with 22 seconds left for a 30-28 win. Cortland lost 24-14 to Hobart on Davis Field -- notable because the Red Dragons wouldn't lose at home again in the next three years. The backfield tandem of fleet-footed tailback Steve Pisciotta and powerful fullback Gareth Grayson helped fuel wins over Buffalo State, Stony Brook, Brockport and Albany. In his first start of the year, QB Rich

Keefer tossed the decisive seven-yard TD pass to tight end Dave Kelly for a thrilling 37-35 win over the 18th ranked Danes. After losing to Division II Springfield -- back on the schedule after a seven-year absence -- Cortland downed once-beaten Canisius 29-23 behind Pisciotta's seventh 100-yard rushing game of the season. He became only the second Cortland 1,000-yard rusher in a season with 1,012 yards that autumn. Defensively, the Red Dragons held Canisius to minus one-yard on the ground. Overall, the Cortland offense, led up front by All-ECAC tackle Craig Millard, set a school record averaging 377 yards-per-game.

The memorable 1988 Red Dragon gridiron campaign created the kind of enthusiasm and flush of success that comes with an unbeaten, untied regular season and the school's first NCAA football playoff bid.

Mixing both a top-flight offense and defense, Cortland outscored Wilkes, Hobart and Buffalo State 96-13 in the first three games. Off to its best start in 23 years, Cortland was the first team since 1933 to keep its initial two foes out of the endzone. While Keefer lit the sky with touchdown rainbows to ends Dave Falco and Jeff Roberto and flanker Mark Houghton, Cortland's defense mauled its opposition. Junior linebackers Bob Keith and Rick Stauss, forced fumbles, sacked quarterbacks and kept Hobart to minus-24 rushing yards. Grayson gained 200 yards rushing in the Buffalo State win. Before 4,700 Homecoming fans, Cortland record-setting kicker Ted Nagen-gast booted a 35-yard field goal as time expired for a 24-21 win over Western Connecticut. Reserve QB Dick Puccio, replacing an injured Keefer, engineered a 28-13 win over Brockport that was bolstered by Eric Love's two second half TD runs. In Cortland's sixth win -- 31-14 over Albany -- Grayson carried hapless Dane defenders down the middle of the field with him as he scored three TDs and gained 215 yards - more than the entire Albany offense. The next weekend, five inches of snow fell on Davis Field the night before the Springfield game. Keefer's 16-yard TD pass to freshman end Matt Shell and a crossfield touchdown-saving tackle by linebacker Jim Taylor sparked Cortland to a 7-0 win over the Division II visitors. Grayson gained 105 yards to top the 2,000 career rushing yard mark. In a 41-7 win over Canisius, tight end Dave Kelly's caught passes of 45 and 67 yards, while defensively, strong safety Dave Mancuso had two QB sacks, an interception, and a slew of tackles.

Cortland's win over Canisius set up the greatest showdown of small college teams in the history of Upstate New York football. It was dubbed "The Upstate Game of the Century" and the contest lived up to its billing. Unbeaten Cortland versus undefeated Ithaca. No two Upstate teams, let alone bitter rivals, had ever brought 8-0 records against one another in the regular season. Add to that fact that no Cortland team since 1893 had ever won as many as nine games in a season.

Before 7,100 fans -- the then-largest crowd to witness a Red Dragon sporting event -- Cortland edged Ithaca 21-20 in a Davis Field thriller. Keefer threw for 267 yards, including scoring strikes of 45 yards to Kelly, 73 yards to Greg Sirico, and 13 yards to Houghton. Cornerback Greg Bearup led the spirited Dragon defense with his block of an Ithaca punt leading to Cortland first's score. The Red Dragons crushed St. John Fisher 48-10 the next week to finish the season with a 10-0 mark and equal the school's longest unbeaten, untied mark established in the mid-1930s. Cortland was invited to the NCAA Division III Playoffs.

In the NCAA playoffs, Cortland downed 9-1 Hofstra by a 32-27 margin on Davis Field. Grayson ran for a career-high 221 yards. Keefer threw for 234 yards. Bearup, in the fourth quarter, recovered a fumble and intercepted a pass to set up two scores. When visiting Ithaca beat Wagner in the other regional playoff, a Cortland-Ithaca rematch was set. Fans and players believed the game would be played on Davis Field because of Cortland's earlier win over the Bombers, but an NCAA rule was cited that no team, if possible, would have to travel two weeks in a row. On Ithaca's South Hill

Field, Central New York fans were again treated to a "national championship" calibre game. Ithaca took a 16-0 halftime lead but, within a nine-minute span, the explosive Dragon attack produced 17 points and the lead on two Keefer TD passes and a 26-yard Nagengast field goal. Ithaca went ahead in the fourth period, but the Cortland defense gave the Dragons the ball three more times — all drives ending inside the Bomber 40 — before time expired on a 21-20 Ithaca victory. Cortland longest football win streak stopped at 11 games. Grayson — the nation's premier small college fullback — gained 220 yards for a second straight week against an NCAA Playoff foe. Ithaca went on to the national championship. Its toughest two games and only loss that season came against Cortland. The Red Dragons, ranked second nationally in a final Football Gazette poll, left a sea of shattered records in their wake. Grayson, Keefer, Kelly, Keith, and offensive guard Tom "Rhino" Schmandt were named All-Americans. Grady and nose guard Blaine Morehouse landed All-ECAC honors.

After finishing as a national gridiron power in 1988, Cortland entered the 1989 season bubbling with enthusiasm. "Right now, we know how to win and that's the greatest boost to the team's confidence," said Kayser, voted the East Coach of the Year by his peers. "We're at the point that our kids expect to win. They believe they can win. We've got to play up to our capabilities. If we don't play well, anybody can beat us. We've got to play better because people are looking at us as the big game on their schedule this year."

Kayser's 1989 Dragons responded by putting themselves into the record books. An outstanding Cortland defense shut out six of its 10 regular season opponents to equal the NCAA Division III all-time mark set by Plymouth State. After defeating Wilkes 35-7 in the opener, Cortland shutout Hobart 17-0, Buffalo State 25-0, Western Connecticut 21-0 and Brockport 49-0. Following a 24-6 win over Albany, Cortland blanked Division II Springfield 10-0. The Red Dragons had outscored the opposition 188-13 after seven games.

Defense. Defense. Defense. After three games, Dragon foes had been inside the Cortland 30-yard line just twice. Buffalo State gained just nine yards rushing. Western Connecticut was stymied for minus-46 rushing yards. Brockport made it only to the Cortland 45. Albany — the fifth straight Cortland opponent unable to score a touchdown — settled for two field goals. By the time Cortland shut-down Springfield, the Red Dragons had gone 377 minutes without allowing a touchdown and had the #1 defense in the nation.

The Red Dragon linebacking corps stalked its offensive prey — veterans All-America Bob Keith and Rick Stauss were joined by Sean Trepeta, Jim Taylor and the most-feared pass rusher on the unit, All-America Vinny Swanda. Up front, there was Marc Syracuse, Blaine Morehouse, Jason Tyler and the Endieveri brothers — Scott and Mike. In the secondary, cornerbacks Dave "Mookie" Mancuso, Chris Roy and All-ECAC Steve McGowan, along with safeties J.J. Graham and Steve McCormick, knew how to deliver a hit.

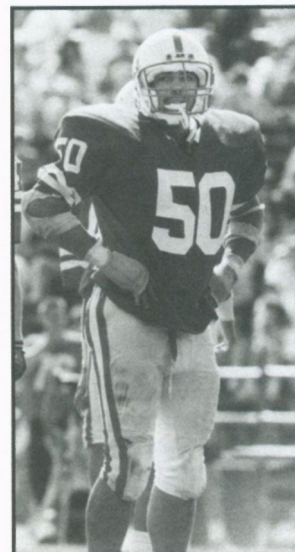
Cortland's QB successor to Keefer, sophomore Dick Puccio, an All-ECAC pick that year, threw four TDs in the Wilkes opener — two to Mark Houghton, who caught 10 passes in the Hobart win. Fullback C.C. Grant had 143 yards and two TDs against Buffalo State. Grant and halfback Ken Williams enjoyed a fine front line headed by Kodak All-America center Jim Cook. Puccio had many targets, among them wide receiver Greg Sirico and tight end Jim Andre. Ted Nagengast continued his march toward holding most every Dragon kicking record. He capped a comeback against Canisius in Buffalo by hitting a 23-yard field goal with 1:44 left.

Before 10,051 fans on South Hill Field, Ithaca regained the Cortaca Jug with a 28-0 victory over the Dragons — the first shutout for Cortland in 30 games. The next week, Cortland held St. John Fisher to minus-two yards rushing for an NCAA record sixth shutout. Invited to the NCAA Playoffs, Cortland travelled to Schenectady, NY. There, host Union College turned three early Dragon turnovers into scores and defeated Cortland 42-14.

1990-1992: Murray's Dragons Win ECAC Titles

After the 1989 season, Kayser left Cortland College to take a management position with Nike, Inc. The natural replacement as Dragon head coach, Dave Murray had played linebacker under assistant coach Kayser at Springfield and later coached with him at Dartmouth. As defensive coordinator since 1987, he helped direct Cortland's record-setting defensive units. Most importantly, he was "cut from the same cloth" as Kayser — a coach who wanted his talented players to be people with "exceptional character" first and foremost.

Ranked seventh nationally in pre-season, the 1990 Red Dragons used their offensive juggernaut to score 399 points that autumn (39.9 per game) and average 448 yards every Saturday. Puccio, a 60 per cent completion passer throughout his Cortland career, threw for 1,595 yards and 14 TDs. All-ECAC end Greg Sirico grabbed a school record 55 catches for 719 yards and Shell had 42 receptions for 486 yards. All-ECAC tailback Scott Berent, on the jayvees a year before, rushed for 1,181 yards and 12 TDs, while C.C. Grant added another 10 rushing scores. Offensive guard Chris Lafferty was a first team All-America.



Kodak All-America outside linebacker Vinny Swanda led the 1989 Red Dragon defense which tied the NCAA Division III record of six shutouts in a season.

Defensively, junior All-America outside linebacker Vinny Swanda led the team in nearly every category — total tackles, QB sacks, tackles for losses, forced fumbles and blocked kicks. His aggressive style of play earned him the 1990 ECAC Upstate New York Player of the Year Award. Another weapon was All-America punter Jim Cary, who had a school record 38.9 yards-per-punt average and often pinned opponents inside their own 20-yard line with his punts.

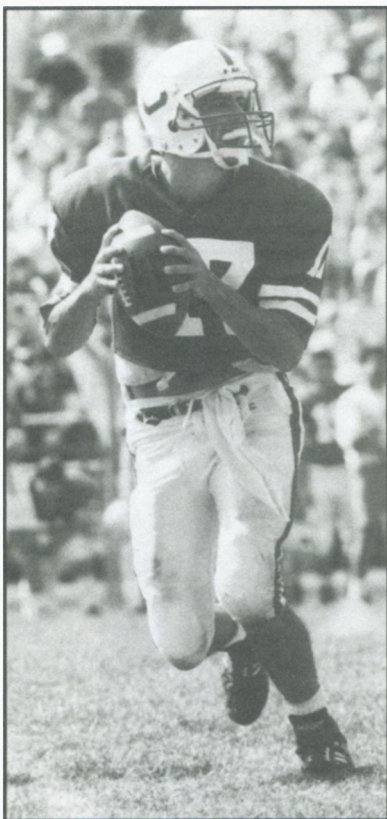
Cortland opened the season with a 41-7 win over Division II Mansfield. After victories over Wilkes and Buffalo State, Murray's Dragons beat Western Connecticut 45-14 on Davis Field – it was the 18th straight home win breaking the old mark set by Cortland in the mid-1960s. Springfield brought in the nation's top Division II offense that season, but Cortland won easily 41-14 to extend its streak to 19 home victories. The Cortland-Ithaca game, which Sports Illustrated magazine called "the best little college game in the country," drew 10,000-plus fans who filled every foot of available space surrounding the playing field. Ithaca emerged with a 28-14 win. Cortland beat St. John Fisher 61-0 with a record 663 total yards in the season finale.

Making the NCAA playoffs for a third straight year, Cortland travelled to top-seed Hofstra. The Dragons stunned the Dutchmen with five first half interceptions – two by Steve McCormick, who also blocked a Hofstra punt for a 2-0 Dragon lead. But Cortland, with a strong wind behind it in the third quarter, fumbled away three successive wind-aided opportunities. Then, trailing 16-9 in the fourth quarter, the Red Dragons were socked in deep in their own territory by those same strong winds and a tough Dutch defense. Hofstra took advantage in posting a 35-9 victory.

In 1991, the Puccio-led Dragons rushed to a 6-0 mark with plenty of offense. Ending the series with the two foes, Cortland beat St. John Fisher 71-0 and Wilkes 67-6. A third straight win over Division II Mansfield, 31-17, was followed with a shutout of Buffalo State, 35-0, and wins over SUNY foes Brockport, 52-14, and Albany, 34-12.

Springfield edged Cortland 20-13 to snap its losing skein against the Red and White. The Dragons bounced back with a 32-14 win over Canisius. Playing before 10,903 South Hill Field fans, Cortland failed to capitalize on numerous first half scoring chances while keeping Ithaca outside its 30-yard line in a 0-0 half. The Bombers regrouped in the second half and beat Cortland 23-14. Hofstra, which was upgrading its schedule to another division, downed Cortland 40-6 in the regular season final. Making its first-ever ECAC post-season appearance, the 8-3 Dragons toppled perennial New England power Plymouth State 21-7 on Davis Field for the ECAC Northwest Championship. Puccio and Shell were voted MVPs in the game. Puccio completed 19-of-31 passes for 283 yards, with Shell catching 10 passes for 159 yards and 1 TD.

The most prolific quarterback in Cortland history, Puccio, the 1991 ECAC Upstate Player of the Year, completed 62 passes for 1,817 yards and 12 TDs that year. He also set an NCAA Div. III single season record when he completed 20 consecutive passes over a two-game span. After four years, Puccio held Cortland's records with his 451-of-727 passes for 5,366 yards and 40 TDs. For a third straight year, a different receiver set a single season mark. In 1991, Shell grabbed 61 passes

for 719 yards and 3 TDs. His 130 career catches is a Red Dragon career best. Berent missed the first game in 1991 but averaged 102 yards-per-game to finish with 924 yards and 15 TDs. Nino Corbo was an All-ECAC offensive tackle. All-ECAC kicker Matt Pietrzak booted seven field goals and a school record 40-of-42 extra points. On the other side of the ball, Swanda, injured for a part of the campaign, repeated as a first team All-America linebacker. Safety J.J. Graham, annually one of Cortland's top three tacklers during his three-year career, was voted All-ECAC.

In 1992, Cortland State played the toughest small college schedule in the East, possibly the nation. An NCAA formula used to determine East Region playoff hopefuls – based on won-lost records, the won-lost records and level of competition that a team's opponents play, etc. – bore that fact out by 1992 season's end. There was no letting up on the Cortland schedule – Division II Mansfield, Springfield and Southern Connecticut. Defending NCAA Division III champion Ithaca. NCAA Division III runner-up Washington & Jefferson. NCAA playoff-bound Buffalo State, the defending ECAC Northeast champions. Ferrum and Montclair – no strangers to NCAA post-season play and perennial powers. Brockport and Albany – both coming off .500 seasons.

The Red Dragons, who beat Ferrum, Montclair, Brockport, Albany and Springfield, offered the 9,000 Davis Field fans their biggest treat with a 22-20 win over defending national champion Ithaca. The Dragon victory ended a 17-game Ithaca streak and postponed plans for Bomber Coach Jim Butterfield's 200th victory party. The Bombers' offense was limited to two big plays in the first three quarters – a punt return and a kickoff return both for touchdowns. The ball-control Dragon offense, led by QB Brian Wild, dictated the game's tempo. The game produced memorable plays like end Steve Ellis' one-arm catch from a prone position on the field. Wild engineered a 64-yard TD drive with under a minute left in the first half. A 28-yard pass to end Ross Ricco and a one-yard Bert Conklin plunge finished the effort and knotted the game at 14-14 six seconds before intermission. Dragon tailback Mike Degnan, who scored in the second quarter, capped a 16-play Dragon third quarter drive with his second one-yard TD for a 19-14 lead. Adam Perry's 25-yard field goal gave the Dragons a 22-14 fourth quarter lead. When the Dragons shanked a punt in the waning minute of the game, Ithaca used three plays to score from the Dragon eight with 0:13 left. Dragon safety Jason Dudek, whose interception set up the first Dragon TD, batted down the possible equalizing Bomber two-point pass attempt.

Wild set school single season records with his 171 completions and 2,098 passing yards. All-ECAC ends Ellis and Jeff Matthews caught 49 and 34 passes, respectively. Kevin Hartman had 32 catches for 554 yards and 5 TDs. Freshman back Lamont McPherson, who rushed for 551 yards and caught another 204 yards, was the 1992 ECAC Upstate Rookie of the Year. Corbo, who repeated as an All-ECAC tackle, earned All-America honors. All-ECAC punter Tom Bierworth averaged 36.5 yards-per-punt.

In the 38-20 ECAC Northwest Championship game win over New England power Bentley College, senior linebacker Barry Thornton shared co-MVP honors with Degnan. Thornton, who led the Dragons in tackles during regular season, had two interceptions – including one returned for a 59-yard TD. Degnan rushed for 117 yards and caught four passes for 35 yards. The Dragon defense limited Bentley's All-America rusher Greg Novarro to 19 yards on 16 carries.

Despite its formidable schedule in 1992, Cortland finished with a 7-4 record – earning its fifth straight post-season berth and a second consecutive ECAC Northwest Championship title. That post-season victory over Bentley came on Davis Field, which Murray affectionately calls "The Chugger Dome." It's the place where Cortland brings a 30-3 home win-loss streak into the 1993 season. And it's on that same hallowed football gridiron where the Red Dragon football team will begin its second century.

Finally, we used the Cortland Football Centennial forms, which appeared in the alumni news and were returned by responsive former Cortland football players, as still another avenue to double check our information.

Former Cortland Head Coaches Since 1924

Williard Ashbrook (1924-27)

Born April 18, 1900 in Richmond, VA, "Ash" graduated from John Marshall High School and taught at the Culver Military Academy. In 1924, he earned a B.P.E. from Springfield College, where he was known to classmates as "Rags." Ashbrook served as associate director of physical education at Cortland Normal from 1924 to 1927. During that time, he coached the football team and the men gymnasts for the annual Senior Demonstration — one of the school year highlights. A rising star in the higher education field whose heart always rested with those individuals with disabilities, Ashbrook attended New York University, where he earned his doctorate in 1933 while chairing the undergraduate Physical Education Department. After attending the Medical School of Virginia for two years, Ashbrook went to The Ohio State University in 1935 as associate chairman and professor of Physical Education for Men. Except for a two-year stint during World War II as a U.S. Army major helping with the physical reconditioning of disabled soldiers in Army hospitals, Ashbrook remained at Ohio State until his retirement in 1970. After the War, he returned as a adaptive physical education professor. He received Meritorious Awards from the Franklin County (OH) Society for Crippled Children for whom he was a past president. In 1959, Springfield College awarded Ashbrook its Tarbell Medallion - the highest award presented a Springfield alumnus for notable service. When Ashbrook retired in 1970, Dorothy Graves, a longtime Cortland staff member who taught with Ashbrook in the 1920s, wrote him, "I realize you have been 'Ash' for many years now, but to us in Cortland you will always be Bill...Cortland Normal's reputation for excellence was ably started by you and carried on by the men you trained who went out to teach from here...The motto you made for us - Here Let the Fires of Friendship Burn - has remained ours and we hope yours, too." On January 12, 1975, Ashbrook died in Columbus, OH.



George F. Hendricks (1928)

A 1927 graduate of Springfield College, Hendricks also attended Colby College and Columbia University. He coached football, gymnastics and baseball at Cortland during the 1928-29 year. Soft-spoken and unexcitable was how Red Meldrim described Hendricks. "He was a nice guy, we all liked him," remembered Red

Clement. "We weren't the greatest outfit, you know. Hendricks was a hypnotist. He'd come down to the Beta fraternity house and he'd hypnotize however many guys. Once, in swimming class, I was trying to get up enough nerve to do a half-gainer on the low board and he tried to hypnotize me so that I could go out and do it the next day." After leaving Cortland, Hendricks reportedly took a position in physical education and recreation for the State of Delaware. He died on Dec. 21, 1936 leaving behind a wife and child. He was buried in Washington, D.C., two days later.



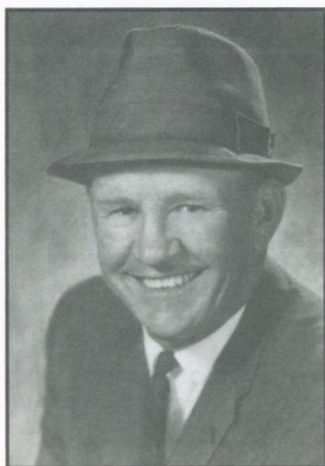
Howard A. Hobson (1929)

Best known as the man who coached the University of Oregon's "Tall Firs" to the first NCAA basketball championship in 1939, Hobson was born July 4, 1903 in Portland, OR. He was an all-state athlete at Portland's Franklin High and a basketball and baseball team captain at the University of Oregon. He coached at Kelso (WA) before earning two post-graduate degrees from Columbia University. During one of his famed "faculty recruiting" trips to Columbia, Harry DeGroat persuaded George and Jennie Hobson to come to Cortland. "We had spent all the money we had saved," Hobson told Cortland Standard sports editor Jere Dexter for a 1985 article. "I was playing baseball in Brooklyn and was supposed to go to Winston-Salem to play ball when President DeGroat asked me if I would come to Cortland. The truth of the matter was that Columbia was the informal program in physical education while Cortland had the formal program. Anyway, he talked to Jennie for 10 minutes and hired her to teach. I had to go along with the bargain. It was one of the happiest years I've had. I don't know any place I enjoyed more." In 1932, Hobson returned to Oregon. he coached at Benson High in Portland, at Southern Oregon Normal and, for 11 seasons, at the University of Oregon. After as a sports consultant with the U.S. Army in Italy and also with the Navy V-12 program at Columbia University, Hobson returned to Oregon for two years then coached at Yale. His collegiate record included 495 victories. In 28 years of coaching many sports, he had 725 wins and 21 championships. Hobson was the first major college coach to win championships on both coasts. He was inducted into several Halls of Fame — including the Naismith Memorial National basketball Hall of Fame. The 1952 U.S. Olympic Basketball Team manager, Hobson was president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches in 1948. After retirement from coaching, Hobson authored many texts and magazine articles on basketball. Hobson died on June 13, 1991 in Portland.



Henry W. Kumpf Jr. (1930-31)

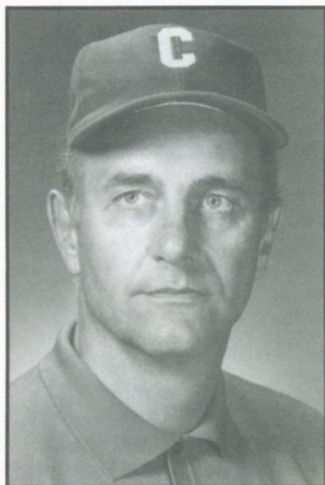
A punter and three-year letterman on the Columbia University football team, Kumpf also attended New York University. In addition to coaching football at Cortland, he also helped to direct baseball and served as a swimming instructor at Cortland Normal. During his two years at Cortland, Kumpf led the Cortland football teams to a 6-6-1 overall record.



Carl A. "Chugger" Davis (1932-62)

Born in Missouri in 1902, Davis graduated from Miller (MO) High School. In 1926, he earned a B.S. from Southwest Missouri Teachers College, which for many years presented one of the nation's first student-athlete sportsmanship medals named in honor of Davis to athletes from Greenwood (MO) High. He lettered in baseball, football basketball and track at Southwest Missouri. Davis earned a bachelor's degree in physical educa-

tion from Springfield College in 1928, where he also was a multi-sport star. From 1928 until 1931, Davis coached football, basketball, baseball and soccer at Catawba College in Salisbury, NC. In 1931, he returned to Springfield to pursue a master's degree. Davis assisted coaching football, baseball and frosh basketball. In 1932, Davis came to Cortland as an assistant professor of physical education. He remained until his retirement in June, 1965. In 28 seasons as head football coach, Davis had a 102-63-17 record. In 20 years as baseball head coach, his teams were 135-62. As basketball coach, Davis posted an 86-71 record in 10 seasons. He also served as golf coach. At a special retirement dinner, the College named its Outstanding Scholar-Athlete Award in his honor. After leaving the College, Davis and his wife moved to Hendersonville, NC. He passed away on May 22, 1973 in Sarasota, FL, and was buried in Nashville, TN. In 1973, Cortland officially named its football facility - Carl "Chugger" Davis Field.



Roger I. Robinson (1963-79)

Born in Endicott, NY, Roger Robinson earned bachelor's and master's degrees from Syracuse University. As an undergraduate, Robinson started at tailback, played defensive safety and was a nationally ranked punter for the Orange football squad. Robinson competed in the 1947 East-West Shrine Game in San Francisco. Between 1948-50, he was line coach for Andy Kerr at Lebanon Valley College. From 1951 to 1956, he

was head football and track coach at Port Jervis (NY) High. Robinson then spent six years at Harvard University where he was the backfield coach and the freshman track coach. As head football coach at Cortland from 1963 to 1969, Robinson's squads posted a combined 70-77-3. In the early 1970s, Robinson worked with 110 ECAC member institutions as part of an NCAA grant to research football head and neck injuries. A former NCAA All-America Selection Committee district chairman, Robinson was athletic director at Cortland from 1976 to 1979 and served as assistant track coach. He retired from Cortland College in June, 1985. He and his wife, Helen, reside in Jekyll Island, GA, and summer at Hatch Lake, NY.

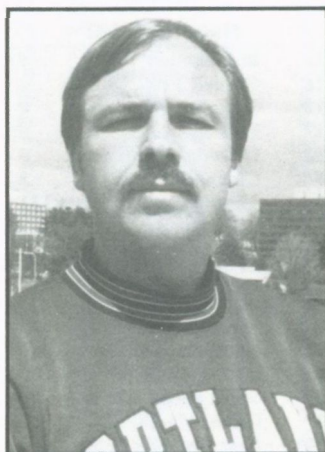
Edwin J. Decker (1980-82)

Edwin Decker, a Johnson City, NY, native, graduated from Union-Endicott High and attended Cortland State in the mid-1950s. A halfback on Chugger Davis' squads, Decker earned his bachelor's degree from Cortland in 1957 and his master's degree in 1966. After a two-year stint in the Army, Decker returned to Union-Endicott



High as a freshman football coach. There, his teams went 15-2-1 and earned two league titles. In 1965, he became head at Carthage (NY) Central. Decker was voted the 1966 Northern District "Coach of the Year" while at Carthage. From 1967-70 he was coach at Syracuse's Henninger High and from 1971-73 coach at Penfield (NY) High. His composite scholastic record was 62-27-3. In 1974, Decker joined the Columbia University football staff as offensive line coach. He was

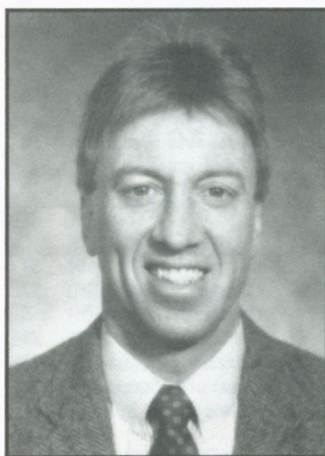
head track coach and linebacker coach for national football champion Ithaca College from 1977 to 1979. As head coach at Cortland from 1980 to 1982, Decker led the Dragons to a 13-17-0 record. He left Cortland College in 1984 to become administrative assistant and athletic director at Salmon River (NY) Central. In 1986, Decker became the athletic director at Waverly (NY) Central and, last year, added the responsibility of Lincoln St. Elementary School principal.



Larry R. Czarnecki (1983-85)

A native of Nanticoke, PA, Larry Czarnecki served two years in the U.S. Navy before attending Ithaca College. As a Kodak and A.P. All-America 6-3, 240-pound defensive tackle, he helped lead Ithaca to two NCAA title games. Czarnecki graduated cum laude from Ithaca in 1976 and earned a master's degree in sports psychology from Ithaca in 1977. He coached the Ithaca defensive linemen in 1976 and was assistant varsity line coach at Dartmouth in 1977. In 1978,

Czarnecki joined the Cortland Physical Education Department faculty. An interim head coach and assistant coach in track at Cortland, Czarnecki directed the defensive line for a season before taking over as defensive coordinator. The head football coach from 1983-85, Czarnecki led Cortland to a 12-16-0 gridiron mark. In 1986, he returned to Ithaca College as a physical education instructor, assistant football and track coach.



Dennis Kayser (1986-89)

Dennis Kayser, a Somers, NY, native, played both lacrosse and football at Ithaca College, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1974. The following year, he was a graduate assistant at Albany State helping coach the defense while earning a master's degree in education administration. From 1976 to 1978, Kayser was head lacrosse coach and defensive line coach at Union College. Between 1978 and 1980, he directed the lacrosse program and was an assistant football coach at Springfield College. From

1981 to 1983, Kayser was an assistant football coach at Lafayette College before becoming linebacker coach at Dartmouth College for two seasons. As Cortland head football coach from 1986 to 1989, Kayser led the Red Dragons to a 26-15 record, an undefeated regular season in 1988 and two consecutive NCAA playoff appearances. In 1990, Kayser left Cortland to take a position with Nike, Inc and is a Nike, Inc. account executive in Temecula, CA.
