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

### Football For 1954 At Cortland

East Stroudsburg State Teachers College from Pennsylvania will attempt to complete one of their best seasons in recent years as they do battle with Cortland on the College Field in the finale for the Red Dragons. "Chugger" Davis and his green team will be out to salvage a mediocre season and cut down the Keystone State team which has always been a tough nut to crack.

To date the Pennsylvania eleven has won five and lost only one with victories over Millersburg, Ithaca, Mansfield, West Chester and Kutztown with their only loss coming at the hands of Shippensburg.

Cortland shows only one win against Buffalo, losses to Alfred, Bloomsburg (Pa.) and Hofstra and ties against Ithaca and Brockport.

Last year the game against Stroudsburg was cancelled because of miserable weather conditions and in late years all of the games with Stroudsburg have been played in snow, rain and mud. Unless the weather man relents, it appears at this writing that another typical Cortland-Stroudsburg day is in the books.

In their opener Cortland scored a 20-6 win over the University of Buffalo. Cannella, Cortland guard, set up the first score as he recovered a Buffalo fumble on the Bull's 25 yard yard line. Six plays later Al Emmi, hard-running fullback, scored from the one yard line.

Cortland scored again in the first period with Don Quinn running off tackle from the 10 yard line for the tally and Bruce Allison converted to make it 13.

Buffalo scored their lone six-pointer in the final quarter on a nice pass play, Kennedy to Nero, good for 12 yards and the score. Cortland made their final score on a Powell to Burns pass with Hugh Bentley kicking the extra point.

In the second game Alfred proved why they remain undefeated to date by showing a fine offense and a rugged defense to wallop the Red and White by a 32-12 score. Cortland was never in the ball game as the Saxons scored through, around and over the Cortland defense. Stellar line play by the Alfred forward wall stalled the Cortland ground attack while rushing Bob Hoppey so effectively that he was unable to get off many passes.

Riddled with injuries, losing Lou Pettinelli at tackle for the season and Al Emmi at fullback from the starting line-up, Cortland found a predominately veteran Bloomsburg (Pa.) a rough, tough team who stayed in the ground for the most part to grind out a 26-13 win.

Homecoming Day was perfect in every way except for the disappointing 13-13 tie with the Ithaca Bombers. Dworski of Ithaca made all his team's points while Dan Dyer was the big gun for Cortland with two touchdowns. Hugh Bentley converted to tie the score.

Brockport's Golden Eagles tied the Red Dragons in the last 30 seconds of play after blocking a Cortland punt and recovering on the Cortland 49.

Brockport drew first blood late in the first quarter with Loiacono bucking over from the one yard line. Cortland pushed over two scores in the second and third periods after Brockport fumbled punts with Cortland recovering deep in Brockport territory. Clarence Powell scored the first sixpointer and a pass Dick VanValkenburg to Pete Palleschi was good for the second.

Hofstra scored their first touchdown in 30 seconds and their second a few minutes later to give them a running start in their 20-13 win over the Dragons. Hugh Bentley and Bob Hoppey scored for Cortland and Powell converted for the extra point. Cortland made 15 first downs to the Dutchmen's 10 but time ran out on the Cortland team as they played their hosts to a standstill for the last three quarters.

This will wind up the Fall sports season for Cortland teams. Cross country and junior varsity football have already posted fine season's records with the cross country team missing an undefeated season by one point as they dropped their last dual meet to Brockport 29-28. Sam Cario, Bob Baumer and Paul Gigliotti have been the backbone of the team which has posted their best record in recent years for cross country. The junior varsity football team has only a tie with Morrisville to mar their season, three wins and one tie to their eredit. The game today with undefeated Manlius will be their toughest to date and a win will establish them as the best junior varsity team in recent years and should forecast well for the varsity next year.

Seniors John Arcaro, Al Chase, Bob Hoppey, Tony Lembo, John Millett, Don Quinn, Frank Soldwedel, Pete Trainor and Ray Cosens will don football uniforms for Cortland for the last time today. Lou Pettinelli and Joe Valletta will say their farewell to college football from the sidelines as both have been out for most of the season due to injury. We will miss you next year. BETA PHI

Coach Carl "Chugger" Davis has held the reins as head football coach at Cortland State Teachers College for twenty years. His record up to this season has been close to the .650 percentage in the win column as his teams have been victorious in 74 games, while losing only 42 and tieing 10. One of the outstanding records of college football was made by his 1932-1935 teams who tasted defeat only once. In 1948 his team lost only one contest. Chugger has been a consistent winner in baseball and his 1954 undefeated nine was only one of his year-in-and-year-out representative small college teams which have always been good. The basketball teams which he coached until 1950 played and defeated some of the outstanding small college teams in the East. Coach Davis graduated from Springfield (Mo.) College and did his graduate work at Springfield (Mass.) College. He was an outstanding performer in high school and college athletics.

Robert (Doc) Weber is working with the line for the third year. A graduate of the University of Iowa, Weber played football as an undergraduate and on service teams. He coached and taught in the public schools of Iowa and at the University of Iowa. Last spring he coached the Cortland State golf team to a fine season's record.

Ed Bosse, backfield coach, is no stranger to the football fans of Cortland. A 1951 graduate of Cortland State Teachers College, he turned in some fine football as a back for Sampson and for three years at Cortland. He also saw considerable service with the varsity basketball team. Since 1951 he has taught and coached at South Huntingdon High School on Long Island. His football and basketball teams have gained prominence and for two years his golf teams were county champions. Ed served on a destroyer during World War II.

Robert Bub, a senior at Cortland, is assisting as a student coach. He has played on Cortland's varsity football squads and was a member of the wrestling team last year.

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

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### The Football Code

Traditionally, football is the game of the schools and colleges. As such, only the highest standards of sportsmanship and conduct are expected of players, coaches, and others associated with the game.

Football is and should be an aggressive, rugged, contact sport. However, there is no place in the game for unfair tactics, unsportsmanlike conduct, or maneuvers deliberately designed to in-

flict injury.

Through the years the Rules Committee has endeavored by rule and appropriate penalty to prohibit all forms of unnecessary roughness, untair tactics, and unsportsmanlike conduct. But rules alone cannot accomplish this end. Only the continued best efforts of coaches, players, officials, and all friends of the game can preserve the high ethical standards which the public has a right to expect in America's foremost collegiate sport. Therefore, as a guide to players, coaches, officials, and others responsible for the welfare of the game the Committee publishes the following Code:

#### Holding

Holding is prohibited by the rules because it does not belong in the game of football. It is unfair play. It eliminates skill. The slowest and clumsiest man on the field could run for a touchdown on every play if his teammates held their opponents long enough. The object of the game is to advance the ball by strategy, skill, and speed without holding one's opponent.

Perhaps a good game could be invented, the object of which would be to advance the ball as far as possible with the assistance of holding, but it would not be football. It would probably become a team wrestling match of some kind. If your coach cannot show you how to advance the ball without holding your opponents, it is fair to assume that he does not understand the basic

strategy of the game.

#### "Beating the Ball"

"Beating the ball" by an unfair use of a starting signal is nothing less than deliberately stealing an advantage from the other side. An honest starting signal is good football, but a starting signal which has for its purpose starting the team a fraction of a second before the ball is put in play, in the hope that it will not be detected by the officials, is nothing short of crookedness. It is the same as if a sprinter in a hundred-yard dash had a secret arrangement with the starter to give him a tenth of a second warning before he fired the pistol.

#### Illegal Shifting

An honest shift is good football, but shaving the one second pause, shifting in such an manner as to stimulate the start of a play, or employing any other unfair tactic for the purpose of drawing one's opponent offside can be construed only as a deliberate attempt to gain an unmerited advantage. Such tactics cannot be tolerated in collegiate football.

#### Feigning Injuries

An injured player must be given full protection under the rules. However, the feigning of an injury by an uninjured player for the purpose of gaining additional, undeserved time for his team, and other practices of deceit such as falsely claiming that one's playing equipment is in need of repair, are dishonest, unsportsmanlike and contrary to the spirit of the rules. Such tactics cannot be tolerated among sportsmen of integrity.

#### Talking to Your Opponents

Talking to your opponents, if it falls short of being abusive or insulting, is not prohibited by the rules, partly because it ought not to be necessary and partly because no rules can make a gentleman out of a mucker. No good sportsman is ever guilty of cheap talk to his opponents.

#### Talking to Officials

When an official imposes a penalty or makes a decision, he is simply going his duty as he sees it. He is on the field representing the integrity of the game of football, and his decision, even though he may have made a mistake in judgment, is final and conclusive and should be accepted. Even though you think the decision is a mistaken one, take your medicine and do not whine about it. If there is anything to be said, let your captain do the talking. That's his business. Yours is to keep quiet and play the game.

#### Coaching Ethics

Deliberately teaching players to violate the rules is indefensible. The coaching of intentional holding, beating the ball, illegal shifting, feigning injury, interference or illegal forward passing, such as the "forward fumble", will break down rather than aid in the building of the character of your players. Teaching or condoning the intentional "roughing" of an opponent is even worse. Such instruction not only is unfair to your opponents but is demoralizing to the boys entrusted to your care. It has no place in a game which is an essential part of an educational program.

#### Sportsmanship

The football player who intentionally violates a rule is guilty of unfair play and unsportsmanlike conduct, and whether or not he escapes being penalized, he brings discredit to the good name of the game, which it is his duty as a player to uphold.

Starting his 17th season as head coach of Varsity Soccer at Cortland State Teachers College, T.
