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

PRATT-ically Speaking

As the days grow shorter, and autumn leaves fill the air, along with footballs and soccer balls, the Cortland State Teachers College Football team and its staunch supporters extend a hearty welcome to the University of Buffalo Bulls to help raise the curtain of the 1956 football season.

Also, at this time, we wish to extend a warm welcome to those hyperactive wearers of the red and white "beanies", the "frosh". Since this is probably your first visit to College Hill Field, the den of the Red Dragons, we sincerely hope that you will go torth, thrilled by the action that will be evident

here today.

The Buffalo Bulls, coached ably by Dick Offenhamer, will field a strong and clever team this year, with 13 lettermen returning from last year's squad. An outstanding array of sophomores and freshmen will definitely add youth and determination to the already revengeful Bulls. Offenhamer is fortunate in having two former outstanding football players from Colgate University as his assistants. Karl Kluckohn, one of the greatest all-around athletes in the history of Colgate University, is Offenhamer's chief assistant and line coach. Fred Dunlap, another great alumnus of Colgate's mighty football wars, is the end coach at Buffalo. With these star-studded coaches in mind, and the fact that they use a fine split-T formation with very fast halfbacks, leads us to believe that the Red Dragons are going to have their hands full in this initial game of the season.

Adding still more color to this game as far as Buffalo is concerned, is the fact that they are sending three cameras down here, to record on film this game. These cameras, located at strategic positions on College Hill Field, will record on film the events of the game for coaching purposes, alumnae and tele-

vision.

An interesting and informative attraction to you spectators here this afternoon, will be the number combinations on the backs of the Cortland jerseys. The N.C.A.A. has devised a number system according to position on the team. Quarterbacks are identitiable by the 10 series. The 20 series goes to the left halfbacks, while the 30 and 40 series will identify fullbacks and right halfbacks in that order. The forward wall, centers, guards, tackles and ends will be numbered in the 50, 60, 70 and 80 series respectively. This is the first time Cortland has used this system and we hope that it will be of value to you fans. We feel that this system of numbering will be an aid to you in picking out particular players and positions during the course of the game and throughout the season. We are very sure that it will be a particular asset to the spotters, as it will make their work easier.

Coach Carl "Chugger" Davis, in his 25th year at Cortland and his 22nd year as head football coach, has been busy since September 1, getting the Dragons in shape for this big opener. Assisted by Robert "Doc" Weber, line coach, Robert Wallace, backfield coach, and "Tony" Tesori, end coach, Davis has been sharpening the Dragon offensive attack, as well as alerting our defenses. Coach Davis is confident that

his team will provide many thrills this season. He is also aware of the fine record sported by last year's team, and is hopeful that this year's team can do as well. Last year's record, incidentally, was six wins against only one loss. That loss, coming at the hands of the powerful Alfred "Saxons", who will come thundering into town next Saturday, September 29.

In winning six out of seven games last year, the Davismen piled up 145 points as opposed to 38 scored by their opponents. Cortland beat Buffalo 28-7 last year at Rotary Field in Buffalo. Since coach Davis has nineteen lettermen returning from last year's squad and a fine array of freshmen and sophomores to fill the gaps, this game should prove very interesting as should the entire season.

It is interesting to note the comparative records of these two football teams over the years. The series started back in 1950 and has been uninterrupted to date, with Cortland holding the edge, three wins, two losses and one tie. With this in mind and the fact that Offenhamer's split-T will be working much smoother, in this second year of use, we know that the fans out here today are in for a thriller from start to finish.

Many of us remember such stand outs in the Buffalo Bull line up as Fran Woidzik, 240 pound tackle, who was a menace to Cortland backs a year ago, and Joe Kubisty, sharp shooting quarterback, who was ranked fifth in the east in passing last year. Also among quarterbacks, we find a familiar name in Dick Van Valkenburg, who transferred to Buffalo from Cortland a year ago. Other stand-outs in the Buffalo line up include Co-captain, Dick Doll, Chuck Daniels and Cliff Miller, all stellar backs.

Cortland will field a well balanced team, with such work horse backs as Al Emmi, Pete Pelleschi, Roger Kane and Don Guido to carry the mail. Out in front of them are such line stalwarts as Frank Dawson, one of the leading punters in the east a year ago, Jim Sellars, Herm Wyld, "Butch" Burns, Jack Burroughs, Bill Wilson and a host more of equal

ability and determination.

From statistics and various reports, Cortland should be stronger than Buffalo, depth wise. On the other hand, Buffalo has very fast break-away backs, which give them an advantage. From where we sit, this game sure looks like a toss-up. Defense will play a decisive role in determining victory and watch for that one big break, which will tell the story. It will be a rough and tough game, and will be having you fans talking about it for some weeks to come.

We should like to call your attention to the story in the back of your program on the National Foodball Foundation and Hall of fame. The directors of this Hall of Fame, all famous coaches and athletic directors, have compiled an excellent report for us to share with you on the Hall of Fame's aims and

objectives.

Don't forget next week! Alfred will be here for more gridiron thrills. We sincerely hope that everyone will enjoy this, our first game of the 1955 football season. BETA PHI

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The Coaching Staff

Coach Carl "Chugger" Davis has held the reins as head football coach at Cortland State Teachers College for twenty-two years. His record up to this season has been close to the .650 percentage in the win column as his teams have been victorious in 82 games, while losing only 46 and tieing 12. One of the outstanding records of college football was made by his 1932-35 teams who tasted defeat only once. In 1948 his team lost only one contest. Chugger has been a consistent winner in baseball and his 1954 undefeated nine was only one of his year-in-and-year-out representative small college teams which have always been good. The basketball teams which he coached until 1950 played and defeated some of the outstanding small college teams in the East. Coach Davis graduated from Springfield (Mo) College and did his graduate work at Springfield (Mass.) College. He was an outstanding performer in high school and college athletics.

Robert (Doc) Weber is working with the line for the fifth year. A graduate of the University of Iowa, Weber played football as an undergraduate and on service teams. He coached and taught in the public schools of Iowa and at the University of Iowa.

A graduate of Syracuse University, Albert Watrel is starting his third season as coach of the junior varsity football squad. He is well qualified for this position in that he has played under such names in the coaching world as Biggie Munn, Floyd Schwartzwalder and Forest Evascheski and has had coaching experience at Syracuse University, Bolles Military School, Jacksonville, Fla. and Eastwood High School, Syracuse.

Anthony Tesori, a former graduate of Cortland, is by no means a newcomer to the football ranks, as he has assisted Mr. Davis on a number of occasions in his colorful years at Cortland. Mr. Tesori is working with the ends this year, having played end for Mr. Davis during his undergraduate days on the Hill. Mr. Tesori has also coached basketball and golf here on the Hill and had a fine record at Tully Central School, before joining the Physical Education staff here.

A 1953 graduate of Cortland State Teachers College, Robert Wallace is definitely no stranger to fans here at Cortland. Having played quarter-back for Coach Davis for three years, Wallace is working with the backfield this year, taking Ed Bosse's place. Before coming to Cortland, Wallace was in the Physical Education department at Painted Post High School and coached its football team to two co-championships. Wallace expects to be coaching junior varsity basketball this winter and golf in the spring.

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

THE NATIONAL FOOTBALL FOUNDATION AND HALL OF FAME

New Brunswick, New Jersey

The National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame, composed largely of former football players, was organized in 1947 to honor those men, who as players and coaches, have made amateur football the game of American youth.

Since then, its aims have been expanded to include offering those directly responsible for the conduct and administration of the game, assistance to help preserve intercollegiate football in its rightful position as a beneficial and necessary function of our educational system.

The Foundation feels strongly that there is a demand that these aims continue to be realized. It is engaged in a program designed to answer that demand and looks to those who share its determination for support.

This support comes largely from its members, organized in chapters stretching from coast-to-coast, whose dues range from five dollars annually. Through these chapters, the Foundation unites, in one group, the varied forces responsible for the conduct of the game with the man who has played it and made it what it is today. For him, the exfootball player, the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame is particularly an opportunity for expression, perhaps for the first time in a national way.

Chapters are organized with the help of the national organization and elect their own officers. In addition to their activities locally, they elect state officers, who in turn, attend the Foundation's annual Football Congress, during which players and coaches are elected to the Hall of Fame. Nominations are submitted by Foundation members. There is selective voting by the press, and final selections by a national Honors Court.

To date, out of the thousands who have participated in the game, 99 players and 45 coaches, representing 52 colleges and universities, have been so elected. In many cases, they have been honored at Hall of Fame game ceremonies conducted on the very fields of their success in view of thousands of spectators. This Fall, approximately 11 such games have already been scheduled to honor recent nominees.

The Foundation's future plans include the erection of a Hall of Fame building, land for which has already been made available and plans for which have already been drawn, on the Rutgers University campus in New Brunswick, New Jersey, where its headquarters have been located since 1949. Until such a building is completed, space is

not available for the library, museum and reference files, which will be established to augment an intensive fact-finding and informational program designed as a much needed and constructive contribution to the game as a whole.

Guiding all it activities is the continuing belief of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame, that amateur football is one of the principle breeding grounds of that typically American phenomenon known as "the winning spirit". This spirit finds its truest expression in the amateur athlete whose greatest reward and chief goal is the development of his own excellence. Football properly played and properly administered, sets this standard.

The Foundation believes, and critics of the game have tacitly agreed, that there is nothing wrong with football the way it is played on the field but there is something wrong with the way in which it is conducted off the field if educators allow their institutions to bid for students and if playing "for the love of the game" is replaced by "What's in it for me?".

These trends toward professionalism in amateur sport have been the motivating factors behind the recent actions by various governing bodies within the game itself to bring football back into proper perspective and, as such, have had the Foundation's unqualified support.

In this connection, the Foundation's efforts have been directed toward mobilizing the constructive forces in the game to create a greater national awareness of the basic and irreplaceable values which the playing of football contributes toward the best education of American youth.

The Foundation also endorses without reservation the increasingly high standards being set in the classroom to answer the country's demand for better trained citizens. It believes just as strongly however, that educators must support the same standard of excellence on the playing field.

In other words, the Foundation feels that football, properly played and properly administered, must be emphasized as an essential adjunct to the values obtained through a formal education. Its work has, and will continue to be directed toward this end.

Besides JV soccer, Dr. Counsilman is head coach of the Cortland Swimming team, which is tops for the size of the school, in the country.
