

EDITORIAL

THE NETD OF A CONSTRUCTIVE PROGRAM

Our fraternity has been in existence for about twelve years. It perhaps is well to reflect somewhat upon the accomplishment of the organization in that period. From a mature point of view it would perhaps be difficult to write anything encouraging in answer to a number of questions which might be stated as follows:

That outstanding contribution has the organization made towards the general improvement of the college?

That is the record of scholarship standing of the various members of the fraternity?

That constructive program has been followed during twelve years of existence?

How interested has the organization been in the welfare and improvement of its members?

That is the program for the next four years?

These and many other questions are naturally in the mind of one who is for the moment looking at the fraternity in a historical way. Unfortunately the answer to these questions is not a pleasing one.

A fraternity, to exist and to grow, must apply itself rather diligently to a constructive program. Unless it does so, eventually it will go into decadence and cease to exist as a fraternity.

For many years, as faculty advisor, the writer of this article has presented at various times the need for a reorganization of the fraternity both in its local aspects and in its relationships with its associate chapters. Frankly, most of the suggestions have made little impression and as a last appeal through this article, the suggestion is made that at the next annual convocation some definite steps be taken to build up an organization which will make a very definite impression upon the lives of the young men associated with it.

It is particularly disappointing to one who has for many years held the interest of the organization at heart, to see a relatively new and undeveloped fraternity suddenly spring into existence and from the very outset accomplish things which are specially noteworthy such an instance has just come to mind and since organizations are more or less in competition with each other, it will be necessary for the TRI-KAPPA fraternity to become concerned with its own policie and future outlook.

As a final word I ask this question. What can you offer prospective members as a return for their pledge of loyalty and acceptanc to your forthcoming bid? Unless you can point to a record of achievement and to a future program which inspires their respect you can expect no response from the student who is serious in regard to his educational program and personal growth.

Two surveys are being made;; one to determine the jobs faculty members, organizations, and students have to be done and one to secure the best prepared student for the desired work. Of course, there is no charge for this service, so it is felt that both employer and employee will be better satisfied as to wages and working conditions by hiring through this central agency where certain standards are set. Some of the jobs that have come to our attention are ; typing, cutting stencils, printing and developing films, building scenery for stage productions, acting as doorman for College dances and Mectures, selling towels in the locker room, assembling and disassembling bleachers for basketball games, morning and general handiman work about the college and individual homes. Wages are intended to be slightly lower than those of people in the particular line of work, and at the same time be sufficient to satisfy the students taking the jobs.
