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

As Seen From The Press Box

The University of Buffalo Bulls take the field this afternoon against Cortland State Teachers College's Red Dragons with but one thought — revenge.

In last year's football game at Buffalo, the Bulls were two-touchdown favorites, but an inspired Cortland eleven paid no attention and blanked Buffalo, 20-0, in a heavy snowstorm.

For today's encounter the east, with few exceptions, is almost identical. Nineteen lettermen are on the Buffalo roster, while Cortland has fourteen.

At presstime both squads were at full strength' neither team suffering injuries in opening game victories.

The Bulls already have tasted revenge this season. They opened the schedule by surprising Harvard, 6-3, at Cambridge last Saturday, thus atoning in some degree, for a humiliating 66-0 setback suffered at the hands of the Crimson in the only previous meeting between the two schools in 1932.

Today's starting left end and co-captain Nick Bottini, came through for the Bulls against Harvard. He blocked an attempted punt at the Harvard two-yard line, fell on it in the end zone for the touchdown.

Buffalo displayed a stout defense against Harvard, holding Crimson scoring drives twice in the second half.

In addition to Bottini, end Bob Adams, tackles Bernie Fagan and Sam Sanders, guards Chuck Tirone and Joe O'Grady, center Lou Reale, quarterback Jim Allegretto, fullback Ken Born and halfback Willie Evans, were all starters in at least half of Buffalo's 1957 games.

Evans was the team's top ground gainer during the 1957 season, but will have competition this year from fullback Bill Brogan, who was injured last season.

Starting right end, Dave Brogan, no relation to the fullback, is expected to be quarterback Gordon Bukaty's most consistent pass target.

Head football coach, Dick Offenhamer, one of Colgate's all-time backfield stars, brings a big, fast and deep squad to College Field today as the Bulls seek to even the series between the two schools at four games each. There has been one tie.

Carl 'Chugger' Davis, now in his 27th year at Cortland, will send much the same lineup a-

gainst Buffalo, as the one that laced Alfred, 36-0, last Saturday.

The Red Dragons won't be as heavy as the Bulls, but plenty of speed is evident. The Red and White line contained the Saxons last week, limiting them to a meager 45 yards on the ground and only two first downs, both by passes.

All-Eastern College Athletic Conference center, Jim Sellars, was a thorn in the Buffalo side last year, both in the line and with his booming punts.

He is ably assisted in the forward wall with such stalwarts as ends Don Guido, who was voted to the Bulls' all-opponent team in 1957 as a fullback, and Chuck Prettyman, a converted guard who scored one of the touchdowns against Alfred.

Tackles Herman Wyld and Norman Preston, guards Jim Weinman and Ron Benizio, will see a lot of action against Buffalo today. Wyld, Preston and Weinman played with last year's varsity while Benizio starred for the 1957 junior varsity gridders.

Quarterback Dick Beams will direct the Dragons attack, although Chuck Thompson and Gene Fitzpatrick will be called on often.

Plenty of speedy backfield talent is available. Tom Decker, who starred against Alfred, once with a 53-yard gallop the first time he got his hands on the ball, will be in the lineup throughout this afternoon's contest.

Joe Cuozzo, Jack Radzavicz, Tom Major, Ed Polanis and Art Smith also will be sharing the backfield assignments.

Major and Polanis both proved bulwarks on defense, while Smith emerged one of the heroes against the Saxons. He passed to Prettyman for the first touchdown, ran for the two extra points and scored later on a line plunge.

Davis used all his squad in the Alfred game and may need all of them again today against Buffalo's heavily-manned team.

The Red Dragons go on the road next Saturday, traveling to Bloomsburg, Pa., seeking their fourth victory against one defeat in their series with the State Teachers College Huskies.

The following Saturday, October 18, is Homecoming Day at Cortland, and the Ithaca College Bombers will be in town for that clash. October 18 is also National Football Hall of Fame Day at Cortland.

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The Coaching Staff



Davis Weber Wallace

Carl "Chugger" Davis begins his 24th year as Cortland State head football coach possessing one of the outstanding records in small college gridiron circles. His overall record is close to the .600 mark and he ranks 13th in the country in years of service. After Coach Davis took charge in 1932 his teams lost only two games through the 1936 season. Since then Chugger has had four seasons, 1942, 1948, 1955 and 1957, when the Red Dragons suffered only one setback. Davis was graduated from Springfield (Mo.) College and took graduate work at Springfield (Mass.) College before starting his coaching career. An outstanding scholastic and collegiate athlete, he still keeps himself in top physical condition. His nickname grew out of an admonition he frequently used for his players, "Keep chuggin' in there." Chugger is also the golf coach, giving up baseball this spring after guiding that sport and basketball many years.

Dr. Robert Weber, Director of Athletics, also brings plenty of experience to his post as line coach. Now in his seventh year at Cortland, Weber played center at the University of Iowa and on service teams. After graduation from Iowa, he coached and taught in the Iowa public schools and at his alma mater. His last two scholastic teams lost only one game and won the conference championship. His success with the Cortland line coaching duties is aptly demonstrated by the reputation of Cortland's defensive ability. Last year's forward wall was particularly stingy, giving up only an average of nine points per game.

Robert Wallace, a Cortland graduate and youngest member of the Red and White staff, handles the backfield. He is well qualified for this assignment as one of the outstanding quarterbacks to play for Cortland. After graduation he became football coach at Painted Post High School where he guided two successive teams to championships. He joined his alma mater's physical education staff in 1956. He subbed for Whitey Corey as varsity basketball coach last winter and next spring will take over the varsity baseball coaching chores. On the opposite page is Albert Watrel, who starts his fifth season as junior varsity football coach. The Syracuse University graduate directed his jayvee gridders to an undefeated season last year. Watrel played football for such well-known football coaches as Biggie Munn, Forest Evasheski and Floyd Swartzwalder. Al taught and coached at Syracuse and in Florida before coming to Cortland, where he teaches chemistry, anatomy and physiology.

Absent from last year's coaching staff are Anthony Tesori, now field coordinator for the college, and Fran Woods, who is coaching junior varsity soccer. Tesori, also a Cortland graduate, drilled the ends on last year's squad, a position he played here for Coach Davis. He also was a standout basketball player and coached basketball and golf. Woods, assistant jayvee coach last season, was freshman football coach at Utica Free Acad-

emy after graduation from Cortland.







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Review of 1958 Intercollegiate Rules Changes

Here are the more important changes that should interest intercollegiate football fans:

- 1. The scoring for a successful try for a score following a touchdown has been changed. As in the past, if the ball is kicked successfully one point is scored. Added to this rule, if the offensive team chooses to run or pass, two points are awarded if the play is successful. Another change involves the yard line from which the try after touchdown is made. Last year, all extra points were attempted from the two yard line. This year all attempts will be made from the three yard line.
- 2. Last year, each team was permitted five time-outs per half. The 1958 rule has been changed to read as follows: Each team is entitled to four free time-outs during each half without penalty. Consecutive free time-outs shall not be allowed the same team. Otherwise, if the ball is dead and a team has not exhausted its four free time-outs the Referee shall allow a free time-out and charge that team: a) Only when requested by its Field Captain, or b) When an eligible substitute enters the field while the game clock is running.
- 3. Substitution A player is eligible to reenter the game except that after a player is withdrawn he is ineligible to return until at least one down has intervened.
- 4. Offensive blocking A teammate of a Runner or Passer may use only one hand or fore-

- arm in blocking or to supplement a shoulder or chest block. The hand must be in contact with the blocker's body and the hand and arm must be kept below the shoulders of the opponent throughout the entire block. In a crab or body block it is not required that the hand or arm be in contact with the body. In no block may the hands be locked.
- 5. Forward pass interference Forward pass interference regulations are effective whether or not the pass crosses Team A's scrimmage line. Interference by Team A players is prohibited from the time the ball is snapped until the pass is touched by any player. Interference by Team B players is prohibited from the time the pass is made until it is touched by any player.
- 6. Ineligible receivers When the ball is snapped, ineligible receivers may charge into opponents and drive them back provided contact is established at a point which it not more than one yard beyond the neutral zone but if contact is lost such ineligible receivers must remain stationary at that spot until the pass is thrown. Otherwise, no player who was an ineligible receiver at the snap shall be beyond the neutral zone until a legal forward pass is thrown.
- 7. Unsportsmanlike Conduct No player of the team on defense shall use words or signals which obviously disconcert opponents when they are preparing to put the ball in play.
