Views From the Press Box

Today's homecoming game marks the 18th renewal of the football rivalry between Cortland College's Red Dragons and the Ithaca College Bombers. Cortland has won 10 games, lost four and there have been three ties in the series which began in 1930.

Ithaca comes to town with the same record as Cortland's for this season. The Bombers have won two games and lost three, beating Brockport and King's and losing to West Chester, C. W. Post and Southern Connecticut.

The Dragons have also defeated Brockport and King's and have lost to Alfred, C. W. Post and to Bloomsburg. A comparison of scores doesn't seem to indicate anything significant and usually in this rivalry the previous records of the teams don't mean much.

Ithaca has another fine football team this year. The Bombers have excellent speed in the backfield and probably have the fastest runners Cortland will see this season. The Ithaca linemen also move quickly and specialize in getting the jump on the opposition.

The Bombers display lots of hustle, make plenty of noise and seldom delay long at the line of scrimmage, favoring the quick snap from center to lengthy signal-calling.

Ithaca is led by quarterback Charles Brady, a fine passer who is also the Bombers' best defensive back. Brady is backed up by Larry Karas, who started in the victory over King's and who can also throw the ball well.

Among its speedy backs are Nick Annotto, Bob Valesente and Gary Hill, who can cover a lot of territory in a hurry. Valesente and Hill are both veterans and the latter is a top-flight pass receiver. Hill is a cousin to Gerry Hill, regular left end on the Cortland varsity.

Ron Serapilio is the Bombers' regular fullback and the six-foot, 190-pounder is a standout ground gainer with an average of almost five yards per carry. He is backed up by Ronald Bouchier, who saw a lot of action against King's.

Two veterans hold down the end positions with captain John Cashman on the right side and Ron Segal on the left. Laurence Grego backs up Segal, while Ben Morselli relieves Cashman and also does the kick-offs for the Bombers.

James Rafferty, an end for Ithaca last season, has been converted to a guard and holds the No. 1 left guard assignment. John Miller is his opposite number on the right side with Jim Bowles in relief and Dave Wales spelling Rafferty.

Clarence Raymond and James Wilson have

been used most often at tackle with Albert Wilde also seeing a lot of action at tackle until he was sidelined recently by an injury. Vincent Carbonaro, another veteran from the 1959 season, is the Bombers' No. 1 center, with Ray Spadafora standing by for relief duty.

One change is expected in today's lineup for the Red Dragons with Bill Perry moving into the starting left tackle assignment to replace the injured Gene Magurno, who hurt his knee in the victory over Brockport last Saturday. Perry performed well against Brockport and seemed to have earned the starting berth late this week.

Gerry Hill, Ed Thomson and Ron Benizio are expected to perform most of the work at ends for the Dragons today. Thomson appeared to have recovered from an injury received earlier this season and played well against Brockport.

Norm Preston will be at the other tackle post, with Americk D'Addio and Ed Lamb at the guard spots and Sal Bentivegna over the ball at center. The backfield of George Tucci at quarterback, Fred Kirschenheiter and Bob Zigrossi at halfbacks and Frank Borst at fullback is expected to hold up for today's contest.

Today's game is the next to the last on the Cortland schedule with the final game of the season next Saturday here at 2 P.M. against Cortland's oldest rival, East Stroudsburg State College of Pennsylvania.

Today Cortland College joins with colleges and high schools throughout the country in observing National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame Day. By their participation, educators, athletes and football fans are saluting the National Football Foundation, an organization which not only serves but officially represents all major national groups concerned with furthering the game in our colleges and high schools.

The Foundation is currently raising funds toward construction of the Football Hall of Fame on the Rutgers University campus at New Brunswick, N.J. The site overlooks the field where Princeton and Rutgers met 91 years ago to play the first intercollegiate football game.

This building will house great historical exhibits on football's past and will be amateur football's national rostrum, the headquarters and operating base for all who seek to safeguard the game.

At the start of the second period, spectators here today will have an opportunity to support the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame. Your generosity will be greatly appreciated.

CARL "CHUGGER" DAVIS has been the head football coach at Cortland since 1932 and holds the distinction of being the second oldest in years of service among the 121 members of the Eastern College Athletic Conference. He also ranks 13th in the country in the number of years in football. During those years his teams have won 96 games, lost 55 and tied 17. In his first five seasons at Cortland the Red Dragons lost only two games out of 33. A losing season, such as last year's 2-3-2 record, is a comparative rarity for Davis-coached teams. Four of his teams, those of 1942, 1948, 1955 and 1957, lost only one game during the season. Davis graduated from two Springfield Colleges, one in his native Missouri for his undergraduate work and the other in Massachusetts for a master's degree. He was an outstanding athlete in both high school and college. He gave up playing baseball only a few years ago after he had managed and played for the Homer Braves, a team that included some of today's Milwaukee Braves. Davis also coached basketball and baseball at Cortland for many years. He gave up the Cortland baseball team in 1958 to take over the golf team which was a pleasant move for Davis who spends many of his free hours on the golf course.

ROBERT J. WEBER contributes a wealth of experience to the Cortland line coach's job. Now in his ninth season on the Cortland staff Weber also has been the director of athletics for the past four years. A native of Iowa he coached high school football there after his graduation from the University of Iowa were he played center for Dr. Eddie Anderson. His final two years of high school coach-

ing saw his teams lose only one game and win the conference championship. Weber also played for service teams at Fort Benning, Georgia, and in Germany and he has also coached basketball and golf. He does most of the scouting of Cortland opponents

ROBERT WALLACE once played in the backfield that he now coaches. A 1953 graduate of Cortland Wallace played quarterback for Davis for three years and was rated one of the college's top signal callers. Before joining the Cortland staff in 1956, Wallace coached two championship teams at Painted Post. He filled in one year as the varsity basketball coach at Cortland and since 1958 has been the baseball coach, his teams winning 28 and losing 10.

ALBERT WATREL moves into a new assignment this season as the end coach for the varsity. Watrel has been the junior varsity coach for the past six seasons. A graduate of Syracuse University Watrel played football for some of the country's outstanding coaches during his career including Biggie Munn, Forest Evasheski and the current Syracuse Coach, Floyd Schwartzwalder. Before joining the Cortland faculty Watrel taught at Syracuse and in Florida.

DONALD SAZIMA takes over the junior varsity football coaching assignment this season. Sazima joined the Cortland faculty this year after six years at Lincoln Park High School in Michigan where he coached football, basketball and track. He is a graduate of Bowling Green where he competed in football and track and also of the University of Michigan where he earned a master's degree.







Review of 1960 Intercollegiate Rules Changes

Here are the more important changes that should interest intercollegiate football fans:

- 1. A player who starts any period, or one who enters subsequently during that period, shall be charged with having entered the game and he is eligible to re-enter once during that period. Exceptions: After a player is withdrawn he is ineligible to return until at least one down has intervened. Otherwise, the first substitute of each team to enter at any time between successive downs may enter regardless of previous entries. His entry does not affect the game clock nor interrupt a 25-second count and he shall not be charged with an entry unless, in addition to the player he replaces, anyone other than one injured player of his team is replaced. In that event, if he had two previous charges in that period the penalty for illegal return applies. Entry under any other circumstances shall be charged.
- 2. No player of Team A shall touch a free kick before it reaches Team B's restraining line or touches a Team B player. Thereafter, all players of Team A become eligible to touch, recover, or catch the kick except that no Team A player who goes out-of-bounds during the kick may touch the kick until after it has been touched by an opponent. Illegal touching of a free kick is a violation which, when the ball becomes dead, gives the receiving team the privilege of taking the ball at the spot of the violation. However, if a penalty incurred by either team before or as the ball becomes dead is accepted (except for unsportsmanship conduct enforceable from spot of violation), this privilege is cancelled.
- 3. There shall be no communication in any form with players on the field except by substitutes entering the game.
